Speaker at Dedication

Dr. Francis J. Michelini, president of Wilkes College, will deliver the principal address tomorrow afternoon at 3 at the dedication ceremonies of John S. Fine Senior High School at Nanticoke.

Dr. Michelini, was graduated from Seton Hall University in 1949 with a B.S. Degree in Chemistry and pursued graduate studies resulting in a MS Degree in Biological Science from Delaware University in 1950, and a PhD Degree from University of Pennsylvania in 1955.

Wilkes College obtained services of Dr. Michelini in 1955 as assistant professor of biology and by 1962 he was appointed professor of biology and dean of academic affairs.

A year's leave of absence followed in which Dr. Michelini served as associate program director, National Science Foundation, Washington, D. C.

In 1963 Dr. Michelini returned to Wilkes Campus as dean of Wilkes College.

SEMINARS SET ON RETARDED

Wilkes Institute Starts
Program Next Month

New concepts in the treatment of the mentally retarded will be explored in a forthcoming series of Seminars for family members of mental retardates which has been scheduled by the Wilkes College Institute of Regional Affairs, according to Dr. Hugo V. Mailey, institute director. They will begin sometime in September and conclude in May.

The seminars are funded under Title I of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and will be directed to parents who are most directly concerned with the retardate and who feel the need of basic training. Series will consist of ten evening sessions where a free exchange of ideas with well known authorities in the field will be encouraged.

In planning the program, consideration has been given to the fact that until recently, the mentally retarded generally have been neglected inasmuch as society has taken a hopeless attitude toward them. In the past, institutionalization has been the accepted pattern. Custodial care was the only type of assistance given by most states.

New concepts in the treatment of the mentally retarded are constantly being formulated.

Today, it is stated, the focus is on continued care provided in the community so that the handicapped individual may remain at home.

The problem, according to specialists in the field, is one of training parents, nurses, and even doctors together with those who will be working with the retardate so that they are capable of accepting new concepts of treatment.

Drills Begin Next Week

Wilkes College Must Find Offensive Line Replacements

Graduation has cut deep into the ranks of the Wilkes interior offensive line, taking three of five starting personnel. Lost via the June convocation were three-year stalwarts and All-MAC choices, Ed Burke and Les Loveland, plus captain George Conway, a four year starter and the center selection on the All-Time Wilkes grid team.

The search for their replacements will begin on Sept. 1, when the Blue and Gold will officially commence their pre-season camp. The Colonels will open their regular season at home on Sept. 26, with Lycoming.

Several outstanding offensive lettermen will return this fall, thus easing the loss of Burke, Loveland, and Conway but the unit must solidify quickly if they are to equal the ground game of recent years, which amassed 8,807 yards (5.0 miles), and 3.76 yards per carry average through five seasons.

Nate Eustis, a 6-2, 210-pound tackle, has one year of starting experience under his belt and has been baptized in the grid wars. The Binghamton senior has the speed and movement to compliment both a passing and running game. The other empty spot left vacant by Burke will be up for grabs between Steve Balla, a 6-1, 200-pound junior or Dave Mitchell, 6-3, 220-pound senior.

If any of the above should falter Bill Buss, a 6-3, 210-pound sophomore and Ted Frey, another sophomore checking in at 6-0, 210, stand ready and willing in the wings.

Battle at Guard

The stiffest competition for a permanent post will come at guard where no less than four veterans saw sizable duty last year. Bill Hanbury, a 6-2, 205-pound senior, started the season one year ago but was injured midway in the season. John Baranowski, another senior registering at 6-0, 195, filled in capably along with Ed Connors, a 5-11, 200-pound senior, and Mike Hughes, a 5-11, 190-pound junior.

The four will be pushed by sophomores Pete Barrows, 6-0, 195; Bob Hegyes, 5-7, 180; Tony Lorio, 5-10, 190; Larry Lally, 5-11, 200; Al Regner, 5-7, 185; or Tony Sciarpetti, 5-8, 190; and junior Len Matysczak, 5-10, 170.

Alton Kenney, after backing up Conway should finally get the starting nod at center. The 5-11, 200-pound senior, proved his versatility last fall by also and golf numerals.

Frosh to Challenge

A trio of freshmen who will add spice to the cake are Thomas Panetta, Thomas McGann and Peter Matechak.

Panetta, a 6-1, 190-pound center, comes to Wilkes by way of Dover High School, Dover, New Jersey. While at Dover the future Wilkes biology major earned two letters apiece in track and football.

A possible player to watch in the coming campaign is 6-3, 210-pound McGann. At Pennington Prep the versatile athlete won a total of nine letters with football accounting for three, wrestling two, and baseball four. McGann, a native of Pennington, N. J., will probably vie for a center spot.

Matechak, a 5-11, 170-pound end hopeful, is a graduate of Old Forge High School where he lettered for three years on the gridiron. He also earned baseball

One-third of Wilkes Graduates in Area

A survey of the records of Wilkes College alumni revealed almost one-third of those who attended the local school have remained in the area to work.

This is considerably higher than the national average of approximately 10 per cent and is attributed to the fact most of those who attended Wilkes, especially in its early period, were from families who had been long-time residents of the area.

The difference between Wilkes alumni and those of other institutions was uncovered recently when an effort was begun to revitalize the local chapter of Wilkes College Alumni Association.

Revealed was the fact that of the 7,100 members of the alumni association, slightly more than

2,300 are listed as residing in Greater Wilkes-Barre Area.

An effort to bring together a good many of the local alumni will be undertaken September 9 at 8 p. m. in Hotel Sterling.

Dr. Carl Urbanski is chairman of the plans for reorganizing the "campus chapter" of the alumni association. Again This Season

Wilkes College Will Field Formidable Defensive Unit

In a few short weeks the Wilkes College Colonels will begin a new decade of football activity. Already behind in the history books is the famine and glory of the 1960s which saw the Wilkesmen spend the early part of the decade as perennial losers and then suddenly emerge in the later part as one of the winningest teams in the nation, capturing 37 of 40 contests.

To dispel any apprehensions of the future, the 1970 Colonels stand on paper as one of the best teams in Wilkes' annals. Hard work and dedication will keep the Colonels' winning way alive. Unlike the uncertainty which prevailed one year ago, the Blue and Gold enter the first year of the 1970's with 31 lettermen, 15 of them starters from last season.

The MAC freshman ban has been lifted thus adding last year's "lost freshman generation" and this year's incoming crop of yearlings to the fierce battle for varsity and starting berths.

Coach Roland Schmidt sums it up in this way: "There may be a few surprises when our Fall sessions begin. All veterans would be wise to report in the best physical and mental condition."

If there can be surprises in the game of football, the Wilkes defensive alignment must be singled out for the greatest strides made in the shortest amount of time. With nine first-liners missing last year, Coach Schmidt displayed his skill and craftsmanship by taking two experienced starters, three converted offensive backs, and a host of untested and untried players and transformed them into a fine cohesive defensive unit.

"Pride and Poise" will be the cry again as seven of 11 defensive starters will be back in 1970. One of the most crucial spots to watch will be the front four. Here lies the defensive thrust of any football squad. A fast, hungry, and extremely mobile unit is a must if opponent offensive plans are to be nipped in a bud.

All-Stater defensive end, John Williamson, and tackle Charlie Fick, have departed via the graduation route leaving two spots vacant. Seniors Harry

Hoover and John Mazur, both three year veterans, form the heart of this year's squad. Hoover, a 6-0, 205-pound defensive end from Binghamton, N. Y., will serve as one of the two captains of the 1970 team. Whatever he lacks in size he makes up for in aggressiveness. Strength and power are the words to describe 6-2, 245-pound defensive tackle John Mazur. The Avoca resident has been coming on fast for the Wilkesmen.

No less than nine upperclassmen will vie for the two empty spots at hand. Pat Ratchford,

a 6-1, 195-pound sophomore from Pittston Area has all the tools to take control of the end position. Other leading aspirants are: Gary Moore, 5-11, 200-pound senior; Martin Sowa, 6-0, 180-pound senior; Dale Tabor, 6-0, 205-pound junior, or Bill Woronko, 6-1, 200 pounds.

The possible return of Pat Sweeney, a 6-3, 230-pound tackle would put a smile on the lips of Coach Schmidt. Sweeney returned to Wilkes this Spring after a three year stint in the U.S. Army. The former Coughlin High standout was an All-MAC selec-

tion as a Wilkes freshman in 1965.

Also contending for a steady tackle post are: Mario Zinicola, 6-4, 235-pound senior; Jim McDonald, 6-2, 200-pound senior; Al Crake, 6-2, 200-pound senior; and John Holland, 6-1, 210-pound sophomore. Holland looked very impressive last year as a freshman.

Freshman Crop Impressive

This Fall's incoming freshman crop also includes several defensive line possibilities. Three newcomers who will press hard are Stephen Adamchak, Craig Skolnick and Jeff Grandinetti.

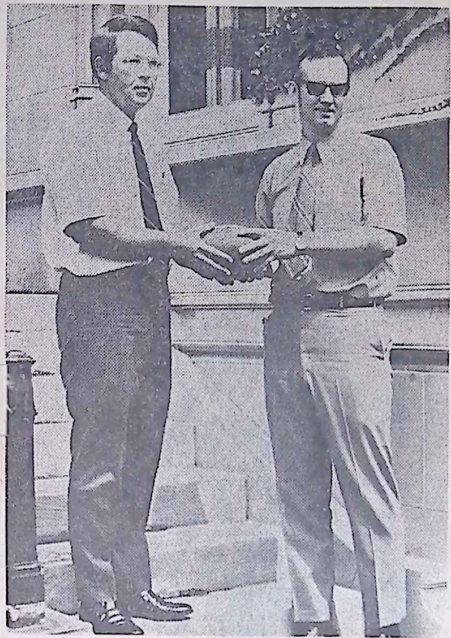
Adamchak, a native of Swyersville, did his high school apprenticeship at Central Catholic High School under Coach Bernie Popson. The 6-2, 240-pounder won four football letters as a Queensman. Adamchak will major in political science at the college.

Another potential lineman set to matriculate at Wilkes is 6-4, 220-pound Skolnick. He was a football, wrestling and track standout at Mastic Beach, Long Island, winning a total of eight letters. Skolnick will major in economics.

The third of the large trio of incoming frosh is 6-2, 215-pound Grandinetti. Last year at Lakewood High School in New Jersey he was named lineman of the year. He will be a psychology major.

Orlowski Named To Wilkes Grid Staff

The Wilkes College Football coaching staff will sport a new face this fall according to an announcement made this morning by the Director of Athletics, John G. Reese.

Richard S. Orlowski, a Kingston native and a Wilkes faculty member will join the Blue and Gold this September, increasing the Colonel brainthrust to seven members.

Head Coach Roland Schmidt was elated over the appointment of his new aid and stated: "At Wilkes we are constantly striving for balance in our coaching staff. We feel that Dick's past experience as a player and current role as a teacher will definitely be a big asset to our program."

The new Wilkes assistant is a lifelong resident of Kingston where he participated in basketball, track, and football for the high school huskies. He was a Wyoming Valley All-Scholastic tackle choice while at Kingston in 1958.

Moving on to Bucknell University, Orlowski earned three letters for the Bisons on the gridiron before graduating with an A. B. degree in 1963. The Colonel aide later continued his graduate work at the University of Delaware where he was awarded a Masters degree in Economics in 1964. Currently he is a candidate for his Ph.D. at Rutgers University.

A member of the Department of Economics at Wilkes, the Assistant Professor is also a Captain in the United States Army Reserves and Phi Kappa Psi. He is married to the former Virginia Zalowski. They reside at 102 N. Welles St. in Kingston.

The Colonels are slated to begin their regular practice sessions on September 1st with the first regular football game scheduled at home on September 27th with Lycoming. Other Assistants under Coach Schmidt returning are Gene Domzalski, Jonah Goobie, Robert Herman, Charles Adonizio and Robert Corba.

And Linebacking Corps

Wilkes Has Plenty of Talent In Defensive Secondary

A major reservoir of strength for the Wilkes College Colonels this Fall will come in the defensive secondary and linebacking corps where only two of seven starting personnel have been altered by graduation.

The Wilkes pass defense was as tough as usual last Autumn, pilfering a record total of 23 passes. If any one statistic could parallel the emergence of Colonel football in recent years it would be at pass defense where they gave up only 15 touchdowns during the five-year span between 1965-1969. During the same period of time the Wilkesmen nabbed 98 enemy aeriels!

All MAC choices Pat Malloy and Jerry Moser will be missing from the "back-seven," but a hard hitting group of holdovers, seasoned with some new recruits, should spell brightness in the years ahead.

Bob Ashton, Tony Cardinale, Frank Galicki, Charlie Graziano and Jim Loveland all thrive on enemy passes as well as stray quarterbacks. The five are the

ton runners for the two inside positions.

Ashton, a 5-11, 190-pound senior matured rapidly in his first appearance in the grid wars last Fall. The Hanover Twp. native was the team's hardest hitter, gaining the Black Star award for his stellar defensive play. Cardinale, 6-1, 195-pound junior also has a year of starting experience under his belt.

Many eyes will be focused on Galicki, a two time All-Scholastic and Pennsylvania "Big 33" participant, as he begins his first full year of varsity competition. The 5-11, 195-pound sophomore from Mocanaqua has all the essentials for success.

Loveland, a 5-10, 210-pound senior is a familiar sight in the lineup. An All-MAC first team selection last year, he was chosen by teammates to co-

caption this year's Colonel edition along with defensive tackle Harry Hoover. Graziano, a 5-11, 190-pound junior from Pittston Area recorded two interceptions

in 1969. He is rated as one of the most consistent players on the Colonel roster.

Other linebacking candidates competing for starting berths include: Emil Ditullio, 6-0, 200-pound senior; Kent Jones, 5-10, 185-pound junior; Tom Kology, 5-9, 180-pound senior; Joe Pavill, 6-0, 220-pound sophomore; and Bruce Gover, 5-11, 190-pound senior. Gover, a transferee from Delaware Valley and an Army veteran, could be the dark horse of the entire group.

The defensive backfield will be centered around two successful offensive transplants from the 1969 campaign and a host of hungry sophomores. Garf Jones, a 6-1, 175-pound senior from Scranton quickly learned his new trade after being a reserve offensive end for three years. Jones worked hard and led all interceptors with six snatches.

Dave Kaschak was chosen to fill the shoes of the departed Joe Wiendl and the former offensive back performed beyond

the expectations of many. The former 5-9, 175-pound Central Catholic ace made two interceptions and handled the Colonels' punt returning and place kicking chores.

Three lettermen—John Kerr, a 5-9, 150-pound junior; Ron Hillard, a 6-1, 190-pound junior; and Lenny Maree, a 6-2, 180-pound senior, all have the necessary credentials for the vacant position but will be pushed hard by sophomores Rich Letts, 6-0, 200; Gene Kruczek, 6-0, 195; Rich Mandigo, 5-10, 180; Scott Sherdon, 5-11, 180; and Robert West, 6-2, 195. The situation rates a coaches' nightmare—one that most coaches wouldn't mind to have.

Alan Bogdon, Dave Whiting and Robert McBride are three of the incoming freshmen who will be on hand to challenge the ability of the upperclassmen.

Bogdon is a 6-0, 165-pound defensive back from Larksville. The future Wilkes psychology major performed on the gridiron four years for the Spartans of Wyoming Valley West.

Whiting, a Binghamton North High graduate, will keep the North High to Wilkes express rolling. Harry Hoover, Nate Eustis, Dennis Brew and Aldo Farneti, are all former North alumnae wearing the Blue and Gold uniform. Whiting is a 5-11, 185-pound lin backer with four football letters behind him.

McBride is another localite and Coughlin High School graduate preparing for his future at Wilkes. The 6-0, 170-pounder was used at defensive halfback and won two letters apiece in football and baseball as a Crusader.

Wilkes Prof Authors Work For Nationally Known Book

Although the term "ecology" has become a household term only during the past several years, the Federal Government was expressing concern about pollution 90 years ago.

This was pointed out during the week by Dr. Hugo V. Mailey, chairman of the political science department at Wilkes College, in an article in the nationally distributed "Investment Dealers' Digest."

The local college professor—who is regarded as the "Father of the Wyoming Valley Sanitary Authority"—wrote: "Basic Federal water pollution control legislation goes back to the 1880s and has been augmented and strengthened many times since—notably and most recently by the Water Quality Act of 1965 and the Clean Water Restoration Act of 1966."

Dr. Mailey's article will receive exposure to thousands of investment men who influence the millions of investors and calls considerable attention to the part that Pennsylvania has assumed in the fight against pollution.

"Today, Pennsylvania ranks second in the nation in the number of new disposal plants under construction," according to the local educator.

He estimates that progress is expected to significantly increase as a result of the adoption by the Sanitary Water Board of higher quality standards for the Commonwealth's waters, resulting thus far in the issuance of more than 140 orders requiring higher degrees of waste treatment.

Turning to costs, Dr. Mailey points out that "limited appropriations from the Federal Government to Pennsylvania have restricted accomplishments in the State."

According to Dr. Mailey, "The limitations of the federal money is, amply illustrated in 1966, when \$5,280,000 of the \$5,800,000 allotted to the State was assigned to one large project—Wyoming Valley Sanitary Authority—in Luzerne County."

He wrote that Pennsylvania's average annual required capital outlay for treatment for the five-year period 1969-1973 is \$58,400,000. But he added, "It will need an annual increase of \$14,600,000 in State revenues to provide the necessary funds for 25% grants for municipal facilities."

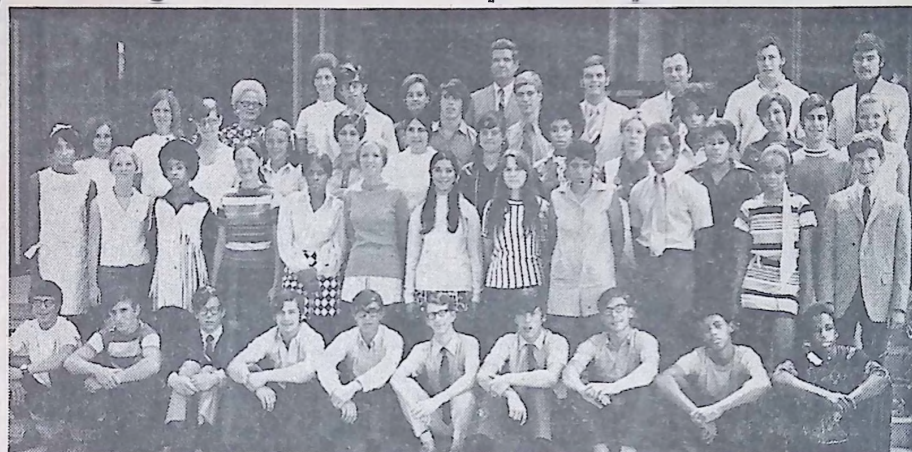
"The early 19th Century vista of pebbled streams and creeks running clear and swift, abounding with fish," he said, "persisted into the late 20th Century—but only as an illusion."

He admitted that the cost figures might seem large, but argued that the need is equally so.

"Water pollution," he concluded, "is steady and inexorable. And its impact on health is just now being measured. The preliminary findings suggest that disaster, in the shape of polluted streams and rivers, stalks the densely populated Northeast corridor, in which Pennsylvania is an integral industrial and residential link. Perhaps the problem demands bold solutions, on a regional basis, and an expenditure of tremendous sums of private and public funds."

Scranton to Address Inaugural Of Dr. Michelini as College Head

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. — Former Gov. William W. Scranton, chairman of the President's Commission on Campus Unrest, will be the principal speaker at the inauguration of Dr. Francis J. Michelini as president of Wilkes College on Nov. 21.

Louis Shaffer, chairman of the Wilkes College board of trustees, stated that he had received confirmation from Scranton that the former chief executive of the state would be available for the speaking engagement.

Currently, Scranton is heading a fact-finding commission at the request of President Nixon into the causes of campus unrest on the campuses of the nation's colleges and universities.

Dr. Michelini, a Clifton native, was named president of the 37-year-old independent college on July 1. He succeeded Dr. Eugene S. Farley, who headed the institution for 34 years — 10 of them when the school was known as Bucknell Junior College. Wilkes gained its status as an independent college in 1947.

In accepting the invitation to speak at the inauguration, Scranton did not indicate the nature of his topic, however, it is considered quite possible that he will include in his address some reference to the findings of the presidential commission which he is currently heading.

The event, which will be held in the college gymnasium, will include among the distinguished guests, representatives from major colleges and universities, professional societies and federal, state and regional government and civic offices.

The new president, who will be 45 in the same month as his inauguration is a veteran of World War II, having served with the U.S. Army Air Corps from 1944 to 1946 and received the Combat Service Star during the Rhine Campaign in the European Theater.

A 1949 graduate from Seton Hall University with a major in Chemistry, Dr. Michelini received his M.S. degree in Biological Science from the University of Delaware and his Ph.D. in 1955 from the University of Pennsylvania.

He has been affiliated with Wilkes College since 1955 when he joined the faculty as

an assistant professor of Biology. In 1962 he was named Dean of Academic Affairs, a post he held until his elevation to the presidency on July 1.

He is married to the former Ann Marie Sterner, Lansford, Pa., and the couple has three daughters, Lisa, Lucia and Michelle.

Dr. Michelini holds membership in the American Association for Advancement of Science; American Institute of Biological Science; Botanical Society of America; and the Ecological Society of America.

Inauguration College to Have 2nd President Of Michelini Slated Today

Scranton to Make
Investiture Speech;
300 to Pay Honor

This afternoon at 2:15, a line of some 300 robed dignitaries will leave Wilkes College Center for the Performing Arts and march in academic procession to the campus gymnasium to honor Dr. Francis J. Michelini as he is inaugurated as the second president in the history of Wilkes College.

Shortly after 2:30 the actual investiture and presentation of the college mace will be conducted by Atty. Louis Shaffer, chairman of the board of trustees.

This will be followed by the presentation of the presidential chain of office which the former president, Dr. Eugene S. Farley, will remove from around his neck and transfer it to Dr. Michelini.

The principal address will be delivered by former Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton, who heads the President's Committee on Campus Unrest. Scranton is expected to direct his talk at conditions on the American campuses today as determined by the findings of his committee.

The report on the information gathered by the fact-finding committee was made almost a month ago to President Nixon and since then has been a source of mixed interpretation.

Scranton's references to campus unrest and the recommendations of the committee will be one of few — if not the first — direct report to the public by the chairman of the unit.

It is anticipated that an overflow crowd of some 2,500 persons will attend the inaugural ceremony and many more line the streets leading from the Center for the Performing Arts to the gymnasium to witness the colorful academic procession.

Dr. Farley, who served 34 years as president of the institution and is its first chancellor, will give the welcoming address and introduce Scranton.

Following the principal address, greetings will be extended by Dr. David R. Goddard, provost, University of Pennsylvania, who also will represent American Philosophical Society, National Academy of Science and his university as the delegate; Congressman Daniel J. Flood, Aldo Farneti, president of Wilkes College Student Government; Charles B. Reif, faculty representative, and Atty. Joseph J. Savitz, alumni representative.

Invocation will be given by Rev. Msgr. John F. Boll; inaugural prayer by Rev. Dr. Jule Ayers, and benediction by Rabbi Abraham D. Barras.

Musical portion of the program will include: The processional, "Crown Imperial," by William Walton and arranged for band by W. J. Duthoit. This will be offered by Wilkes College Concert Band under the direction of

Raymond Nutaitis. Wilkes College Chorus, under the direction of Richard Chapline and accompanied by Julie Levoy, will offer a choral tribute, "Gird on Thy Sword," and the inaugural hymn, "Hymn to Joy," by Ludwig van Beethoven. Recessional will be the "Procession of Nobles from Mlada."

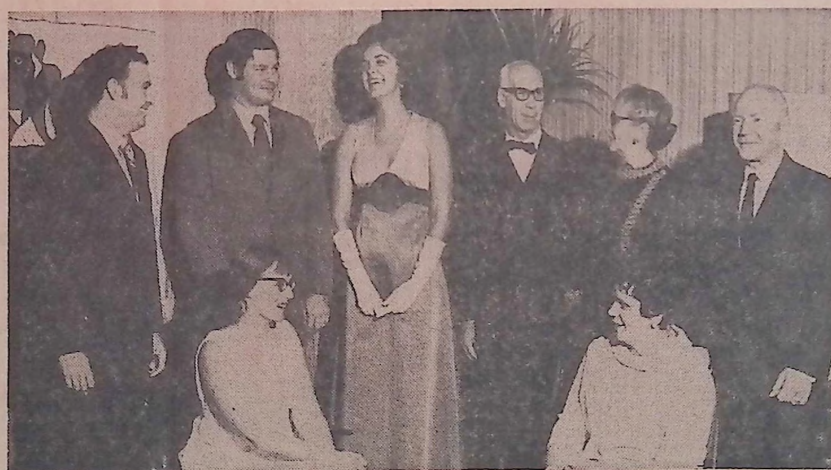

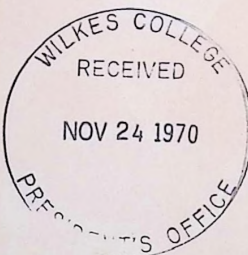
Mohr May Join Staff Of WVIA-TV

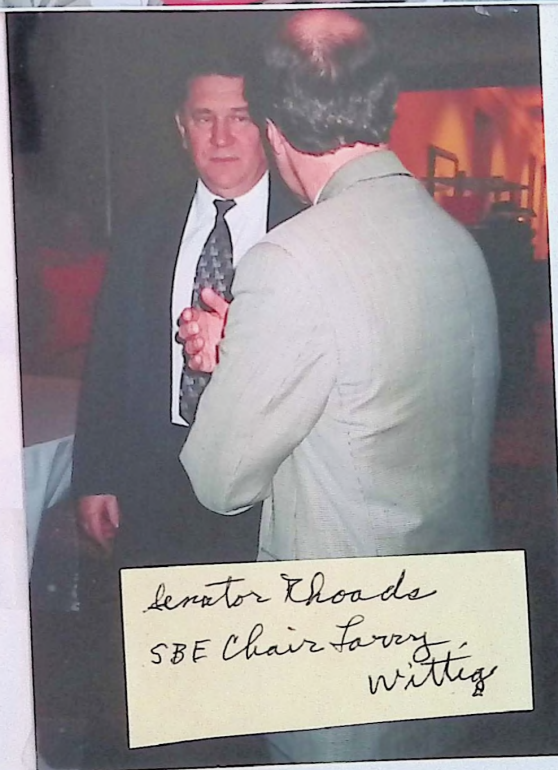
