Introduction

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The Life of Dr. Marts

Dr. Arnaud C. Marts was born in 1888 and died July 11, 1970. He was born in Easton, Ohio, the son of the Reverend William Gosse Marts. His father was the first to spell Marts. His father and his great grandfather George Marts. The Martses were early immigrants to the United States. The Martses first settling between Easton and Allentown in the year 1725. Later his grandfather would fight in the revolutionary war. Because of that Dr. Marts was long a member of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Young Arnaud attended Oberlin where he was a classmate of Martin L. Davey, later to become Governor of Ohio. Martin offered summer jobs to some of his classmates to help with their tuition expenses with his father's company the Davey Tree Surgery Company. Dr. Marts would later recall that, in the second summer of his work with that company, he found the company was advertising the work gang as graduates of the Davey College of Tree Surgery and he had to take some merciless ribbing from some of the clients.

After graduation, he went to work almost immediately for the YMCA in Pittsburgh as assistant secretary, advancing to general secretary of the Boy's Branch and then as chief of boys' work for all branches of the greater Pittsburgh YMCA. He remained there until 1914 when he accepted a position with the Standard Life Insurance Company in Pittsburgh. A success, he advanced to the position of vice president and director and may well have stayed in the insurance business had it not been for certain events of world war I. In 1917, at the request of the YMCA, he left the company and went to Indiana to help the state raise its share of the YMCA War Fund Campaign for special wartime services. A year later he was called to Washington where he was one of the leaders in two important fund drives. One of these was the War Camp Community Service Fund (later the USO) of which he was associate national director, and the other was the United War Work Fund. The former of the campaigns raised \$18 million and the latter, \$170 million. The techniques developed in these two campaigns helped to raise unprecedented amounts and resulted in requests from many eleemosynary institutions to apply the same techniques to their fundraising problems. As a result, in late 1918, Dr. Marts and several others established the firm of Ward, Hill, Pierce and Wells in which he was a partner from inception until 1926. It was one of the first firms to utilize the technique of highly organized, intense campaigns of short duration to raise large sums for specific purposes.

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It is hard to think that much, if anything, can be added to the story of Dr. and Mrs. Marts not already well known by Wilkes College which Dr. Marts served for many years. This first part then may be viewed simply as a recapitulatory reminder.

The Life of Dr. Marts

Dr. Arnaud C. Marts was born October 9, 1888 and died July 11, 1970. He was born in Reeds Corner in New York, the son of the Reverend William Gosser and Irene Almira Cartwright Marts. His father was the first to spell the name Marts, as both his grandfather George and his great grandfather George spelled the name Martz. The Martzes were early immigrants to the colonies, his great grandfather first settling between Easton and Allentown in the year 1725. Later his grandfather would fight in the revolutionary war. Because of that Dr. Marts was long a member of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Young Arnaud attended Oberlin where he was a classmate of Martin L. Davey, later to become Governor of Ohio. Martin offered summer jobs to some of his classmates to help with their tuition expenses with his father's company the Davey Tree Surgery Company. Dr. Marts would later recall that, in the second summer of his work with that company, he found the company was advertising the work gang as graduates of the Davey College of Tree Surgery and he had to take some merciless ribbing from some of the clients.

As a result, in late 1918, Dr. Marts and several others established the firm of Ward, Hill, Pierce and Wells in which he was a partner from inception until 1926. It was one of the first firms to utilize the technique of highly organized, intense campaigns of short duration to raise large sums for specific purposes.

In 1926, Dr. Marts along with Mr. George E. Lundy formed Marts & Lundy, Inc. of which he was President for 30 years until he became Chairman, 1956-67, and then honorary Chairman, a title he held until his death.

Dr. Marts assumed additional grave responsibilities in 1932 when he became a Trustee of Bucknell University for which he had earlier directed its gymnasium campaign. In 1935, he became acting president and then in 1938, following a petition signed by almost the entire student body, he agreed to serve in the position permanently. He served as president from 1938 to 1945, dividing his time between Marts & Lundy, Inc., Bucknell and Bucknell Junior College in Wilkes-Barre which he visited each Friday before catching his train back to New York. During his tenure, several buildings were constructed including an engineering building, the gymnasium, a service building, and the Vaughan Literature Building. During that time also, he established a faculty-pension plan, organized a Friends of the Library and established a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa of which he was himself a member.

During his presidency at Bucknell, Dr. Marts held other offices. When war came, he took a position as executive director of the Pennsylvania State Council of Defense, a position he held until 1943 when he was commissioned a Captain in the U.S. Coast Guard Reserve. He was in the Coast Guard from 1943-45 as Chief, Coast Guard Temporary Reserve Division, a capacity in which he directed the 100,000-man reserve program until discharge in 1945. In 1945, he resigned the presidency at Bucknell, feeling that a successor should be in place at war's end, ready to guide the University through its post-war expansion. He was then free to give full time to his fund-raising activities although he remained a Trustee at both Bucknell and Wilkes College.

Dr. Marts was a fairly prolific writer in his later years and wrote four books and many articles on fund-raising for professional journals. His books include Philanthropy's Role in Civilization, The Generosity of Americans, Man's Concern for His Fellow-Man and George Lundy of Iowa. His selected essays and addresses have been published with the title of The Light of Inward Vision. He served on many civic institutions and was Chairman of the Board of the American Mission to the Lepers. In addition, he was President and Director of the Federal Union, formed to promote a Federal Union of the self-governing parliamentary nations of Western Europe and the United States and Canada; he was president of the board of Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute; a trustee of Geisinger Memorial Hospital in Pennsylvania, Meharry Medical College in Tennessee, Crozer Theological Seminary, Bradford Junior College, Oberlin College and of course Bucknell and Wilkes College.

For all these efforts, he received many honors, and only what seems to have been a genuine modesty prevented his accepting many

more. He held honorary degrees from Hillsdale, Oberlin, Bucknell and Hobart. At Bucknell a scholarship fund was established in his name and the administration building was named for him, while at Oberlin a memorial to him was placed in the new library.

In his personal adult life, Dr. Marts was married first to Ethel A. Daggett of Whiteside, New Jersey. She died in 1953 of cancer and on November 28, 1958 he married Anne McCartney the daughter of Francis J. McCartney of New York City. Anne McCartney's parents were originally from Scotland. She was born in 1905. During the second world war, she served with the American Red Cross in the South Pacific and then returned to New York City as the executive director of the Town Hall Club of which Dr. Marts was a Director. They seem to have met there. Anne McCartney was a member of the congregation of the Marble Collegiate Church of which the celebrated Norman Vincent Peale was pastor. After their marriage, Dr. Marts transferred his membership to the same church, perhaps both because of his wife's preferences and because he and Dr. Peale had become very close friends during Dr. Marts' presidency at Bucknell. The second Mrs. Marts, who is said to be a superb hostess and organizer, seems to have been devoted to her husband, organizing an 80th birthday party for him at the Union League Club attended by Dr. Peale and Dr. Eugene Farley, president of Wilkes College who left an educational conference in Denver in order to be there. Mr. Austin McClain, then Chairman of Marts & Lundy, presided. Mrs. Marts also gathered much of the material that went into a biography of her husband. She listened, took notes, wrote the biographical facts and then interested a good friend, Dr. Paul C. Carter, in putting the biography together. It was published in 1970 under the title Arnaud Cartwright Marts A Winner in the American Tradition. She has written of her husband, "...he is a selfless, dedicated worker, an idealist; and he is kind, friendly and warm. He has always lived what he believed--to be of service to mankind and help in every way to create a better world. This was summed up in college years in the phrase 'The Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God.'"

There were no children by either of Dr. Marts' two marriages, and he did not in fact have many relatives. His sister Zoe also graduated from Oberlin in 1910 and would marry Mr. Philip King, the son of Henry Churchill King, president of Oberlin. They had two children, Arnaud Marts and Barbara King. Philip King, who was a Navy Chaplain through the second world war, served several Ohio churches as their pastor.

Dr. Marts and Wilkes College

There is probably no one more closely identified with Wilkes College than Dr. Arnaud C. Marts. When he became president of Bucknell, he soon found that he was also president of Bucknell Junior College of Wilkes-Barre founded in 1933. The school was originally

founded as a device of the depression days to accommodate students from the Wilkes-Barre region who would not otherwise have an opportunity to attend college. When the idea was presented to the Bucknell board, it was approved on the understanding that at least 75 students would enroll. When it opened, 190 students signed up, and it began offering classes in a rented building that had at one time belonged to a business school then in bankruptcy.

Dr. Marts extended his weekly commuting trip by visiting the Wilkes-Barre campus each week before his return to New York. He began to realize however that some decision would have to be made for its future. He also wanted to install someone who would be able as its president to guide it toward that future, and selected Dr. Eugene S. Farley, a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Farley seems to have accepted the position on the basis that Dr. Marts would continue his weekly visit to the campus. He agreed to do so, but was almost at once pressed into service to try to build or acquire the necessary physical space for an expanding student population most of whom wanted a 4-year college.

Dr. Marts felt that there were two choices open to him: to let the school go out of existence as the needs for which it first opened disappeared or to take on the task of trying to find the space for a school which would serve many more generations of students as an institution separate from Bucknell.

As we know, he chose the latter course and began to press several people to donate their homes for the use of the Junior College. Thus the John N. Conyngham home became Conyngham Hall; Chase Hall was the contribution of Admiral Harold H. Stark; the Fred M. Kirby home became Kirby Hall, the donation of Alan P. Kirby. Then McClintok Hall was donated by Gilbert McClintock, the Chairman of the Board, and Weckesser Hall was the gift of Mr. Frederick J. Weckesser and family. Enough homes were donated that one businessman sent a radiogram, it is said, from Bermuda to Dr. Marts saying, "Please do not take my house ... until I return ... and remove the furniture." These helped to provide the space needed for the Junior College to defend its request for a charter as an independent college. After the war, it received its charter in 1947 with Dr. Farley as its first president--and Dr. Marts as vice chairman of the board. Their names are often linked, and when the new library was built at Wilkes, it was named for Dr. Farley--with the second floor named for Dr. Marts. The dedicatory plaque reads: "This Floor is Dedicated To Arnaud C. Marts In Appreciation of his services to Wilkes--As president of Bucknell University he sustained this College in the midst of depression and despair. As a member of The Wilkes College Board of Trustees his vision and leadership enabled the College to realize its growing potential for service. His faith in young people has added significance to the lives of Wilkes students. Without his counsel and support the dream of this College could never have become a reality."

c. It is assumed in this report that the assets shown in the recapitulation are appraised at the then current value.

Dr. Marts would continue as Vice Chairman of the Board for a number of years and then as a Trustee until his death. His identification with Wilkes was further emphasized on the occasion of his 75th birthday (1963) when his colleagues at Marts & Lundy, Inc. established a \$25,000 scholarship fund in his honor making it possible for a senior who has demonstrated qualities of leadership to complete his final year with an award of full tuition.

Some Speculative Thoughts about the Financial Worth of the Marts Estate

At the outset, I [fc] will say that I believe that the entire Marts estate should now have a worth of \$2-3 million. There are, however, reservations and unanswered questions. Among them are these:

1. As an employee of Marts & Lundy, Inc., it has seemed less than appropriate for me to delve into the distribution of Marts & Lundy stock and its worth.
2. Mrs. Marts has herself raised doubts about the worth of the estate.
3. The "Inventory of Assets" is not a part of Dr. Marts' file at Surrogate Court in New York City. Only the recapitulation is available. It is therefore difficult to know on what basis the worth of the state was finally decided.
4. There are a couple of assumptions as well. These are:
 - a. Dr. Marts' retirement compensation after 44 years as president, chairman and honorary chairman of Marts & Lundy; as acting president and president of Bucknell from 1935-45; and as Captain in the U.S. Coast Guard Reserve during world war II should have sufficed to support Mrs. Marts without recourse to money left in trust for her.
 - b. The property at 41 Park Avenue is not the property of Mrs. Marts. At the time of the death, there was no real estate in Dr. Marts' name and there were indications that there had never been any property held by Dr. and Mrs. Marts as community property. This is, however, still only an assumption. We are still looking into this point and have found that the owners of 41 Park Avenue are Harmir Realty Co., c/o Harold Steinberg. It remains to be found if the building is a rental or co-operative property, and we have written for that information. While it appears unlikely that Mrs. Marts owns it, Dr. Marts did make a \$170,564 transfer during his lifetime (the nature and date of the transfer are not specified), and it is possible that the transfer refers to his shares in the property at 41 Park Avenue.
 - c. It is assumed in this report that the assets shown in the recapitulation are appraised at the then current value.

At his death more than 17 years ago, Dr. Marts left a gross estate of \$775,999.17. This consisted of \$534,339.57 in stocks and bonds, \$54,496.01 in insurance; \$10,298.15 in jointly owned property; \$2,405.39 in other miscellaneous property; \$3,895.24 in annuities; \$170,564.81 in "Transfers during decedent's life." After \$13,933.55 in payments of debts, funeral expenses and expenses incurred in administering property, the adjusted gross estate was \$762,032.81.

Certain sums went outright to other people. He bequeathed \$5,000 each to his nephew and niece and cousin Una Cartwright as well as \$3,000 to Gladys Walker, who worked with him in his office. Some other figures given above would not figure into the trusts and would have gone outright to Mrs. Marts except for some \$14,892.09 which went to Una Cartwright, Arnaud King and Barbara King as beneficiaries of insurance policies.

Essentially the rest went into two trusts. One of these in the amount of \$381,032.81 was established with the following provisions:

- a. The income from the trust was to go to Mrs. Marts in periodic payments but at least annually.
- b. Mrs. Marts when and if necessary could with the approval of the other trustee (she was also a trustee) invade the principal whenever necessary.
- c. Mrs. Marts by her will, and by her will only, had the right of disposition of the principal, if any, left in the trust. If she failed to appoint another recipient, the principal, if any, was to go to Wilkes College.

The provisions of the second trust were as follows. n.b. I was not clear as to the amount of the trust but think that it was for \$175,658.99.

- a. The income from the trust was to go to Mrs. Marts in periodic payments but at least annually.
- b. Mrs. Marts, in an emergency for medical reasons, could apply in writing to invade the principal but it was stipulated that she could ask for no more than \$25,000 of the principal. The other trustee was instructed to take into account the other property and income belonging to her before acceding to the request.
- c. Upon the death of Mrs. Marts, the principal is to go to Wilkes College.

In another provision, Mr. Marts left his portrait and the sculpture by Sure to Mrs. Marts with the direction that if at any time she no longer wished to own them, she should give them to Wilkes College to be placed on the second floor of the Library. If she retained them until her death, they were to be given at that time to Wilkes College.

If we follow along with the original assumption that Dr. Marts'

retirement income was sufficiently large so that Mrs. Marts did not have to invade the principal of the two trusts, then in 17 years if the trusts returned 10%, the corpus of the two trusts (before taxes) should amount to a little over \$2.8 million. Even if after taxes Mrs. Marts withdrew on a fairly regular basis to the extent that the Trusts increased by only 5%, the present value should be in the neighborhood of \$1.3 million. As the will had some fairly tight instructions as to what was to be considered income (capital gains for instance was to be applied to principal), it hardly seems likely that the trusts could have realized as little as that.

One must then take into account the \$170,564.81 which was considered a part of the adjusted gross estate but which was transferred during the decedent's lifetime. As noted above, there is a chance that 41 Park Street is a cooperative and that this represents Dr. Marts' shares in the property. Another and perhaps more likely possibility is that this was the principal of another but inter vivos trust. If so, and if Mrs. Marts has used all the income from that, it would still put the estate at between \$1.5 and almost \$3 million (of course, if the transfers were indeed shares in a co-op apartment, which I am inclined to doubt, the apartment itself should be worth about \$750,000). When one takes into account the other items of property and the insurance, and if one can assume that Mrs. Marts invested any part of that (or even part of the income from the testamentary trusts), the figure for the total estate again comes closer to \$2 million to \$3.5 million.

The original trustee along with Mrs. Marts was James O. Wynn a partner in the firm of Wynn, Blattmachr, Campbell & Milas. Mr. Wynn has since died and he was replaced as trustee by Mr. Lawrence W. Milas. There is now an attorney by that name who is a partner in the firm of Baer Upham & Marks. If the same person, he is now 52 years old with a degree from Babson College and a law degree from Columbia. He is a member of the New York City, New York State and American Bar Associations. In the New York State Association, he is a member of the Section on Trusts and Estates and is a member of the Section on Taxation in the ABA. He seems highly qualified to handle an estate.

A Suggestion

Mrs. Marts should be a willing partner with Wilkes College in the achievement of its goals. She is dedicated to her husband's memory, and his life as well as his last will and testament have made it abundantly clear that Wilkes was uppermost in his donative intents. It would seem that the best approach for the two partners would be to discuss something in the nature of a charitable remainder trust by which she could transfer her assets into a trust and receive the income for life. Not only would that assure the college of receiving the principal from both trusts, but it would give Mrs. Marts a charitable tax deduction at once and would remove those assets from her estate. If in fact she does own the apartment at 41 Park, it might even be possible to work out some form of a retained life estate, although the rules with co-ops are no doubt different from those for property owned outright.

Marvin Oliv

Recycling Expert, 76

Marvin Oliv, co-founder and retired publisher of Recycling Today, died today at the Cherry Nursing Home in Montclair, N.J. He was 76 years old. His family said he died after a long illness.

Mr. Oliv, a graduate of Paterson Teachers College who was a major in the Army Air Forces in World War II, became interested in recycling in the 1950's.

In 1967 he helped found Recycling Today, a monthly magazine covering solid-waste management for government agencies and the scrap-metal market. He was its publisher from 1967 until his retirement in 1987.

Mr. Oliv, who lived in Cedar Grove, N.J., is survived by his wife, Lucienne; son, Robert Olive of Manhattan, and a daughter, Ruth Rosenblatt of Montclair.

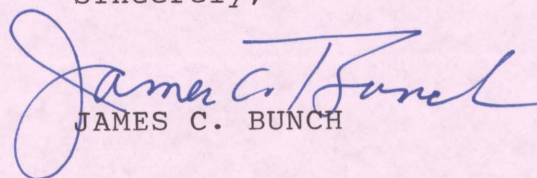
