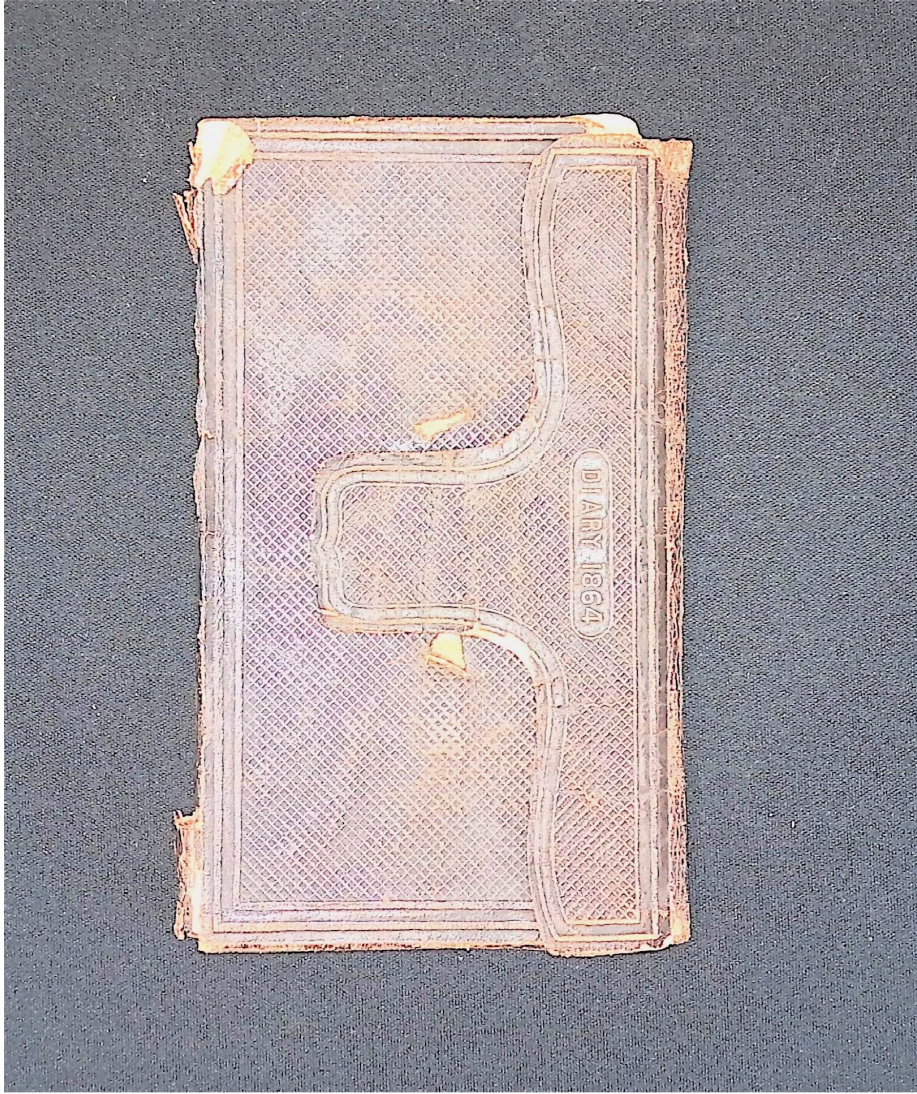






April, SATURDAY, 9. 1864

Drying all day a little with rain did not work much so I came to the Conclusion to make a Clothes and Tool Box. which I did accompanied with Benj Reigh

SUNDAY, 10.

The water being very high that it swept away several Bridges on the R.R. & Alex. duval Road. I received orders to go out the Road on a R.R. that was washed up the Road that was washed away got finished 10.00 a.m. then returned

MONDAY, 11.

Went up the road towards Washington arrived there and found the foot of the hill that the R.R. Road was washed away. that there was no transportation all day the tide went down & we got the road fixed till 8 o'clock the water was higher than ever before

April, TUESDAY, 12. 1864

Went to work between Washington & Alexandria just up Reib Wade to keep the water from washing away the R.R. Road Bank worked in the water partly near all along the meadow down with ducks in abundance on the River

WEDNESDAY, 13.

To work on the R.R. Road cleaning up any rubbish caused by the high water the day after dead and undig Charles Leubner is engaged I was labouring under the pains of Head Ache this afternoon

THURSDAY, 14.

Went at the Reibing between Alexandria and Washington worked all day on the R.R. Road. after then I left the R.R. Road and went to the fishery and got a good lot of Cat fish

April, SATURDAY, 9. 1864

Dried, being all day a little with rain did not work much so I came to the Conclusion to make a Clothes and Tool Box. which I did accompanied with Benj Reagle

SUNDAY, 10.

The water being very high that it swept away several Bridges on the Orange & Alexandria Road so I received orders to go out the Road on a float to get the Road that was washed away got finished at 10 o'clock then returned

MONDAY, 11.

Went up the road towards Washington arrived there and found the Potomac so high that the R Road was washed away. That there was no transportation all day the tide went down & we got the road fixed till 2 o'clock the river was higher than ever known

April, TUESDAY, 12. 1864

Went to work between Washington & Alexandria part up the Water to keep the water from washing away the R Road Bank worked in the water part near all day the weather clear & wild ducks in abundance on the River

WEDNESDAY, 13.

To work on the Long Bridge cleaning away rubbish caused by the high water the day was clear and windy Charles Lombard received the papers of the bridge this afternoon

THURSDAY, 14.

To work at the Bridge between Alexandria & Washington part of the day the weather being clear then I left the part of the day went to the fishery and got a good quantity of Cat fish

April,

FRIDAY, 15.

1864.

Work at the Machine Shop
washed the machine
the timber being a big
one. We built a house
up of logs and
built a house for the cattle.
We then a clock at night
singing a little on each
day.

SATURDAY, 16.

Raining all day on Squaw
and out at the long hills.
and we being loaded with
up to the top of the hills
thawed them. The cattle
were burnt while others
were changed themselves in places
and checked the cattle.

SUNDAY, 17.

We went out to work today
we loaded all day and
afternoon we went to
visit the boys of the 7th
Regt of Infantry. Got
several things back they
received a change of
order to leave tomorrow.

April,

MONDAY, 18.

1864.

Work building a
shanty, a house the day
and. After supper went
to the theatre and saw
the plays of 16 and other
plays and after the
theater took a couple
of horses of the then
retired.

TUESDAY, 19.

Worked at the shanty till
5 P.M. then went to the
shanty and loaded till 11 P.M.
then checked the cattle
till 10 P.M. the 11 P.M.
Boys left this morning then
went to the road to
a day.

WEDNESDAY, 20.

Worked floor boards to
day. Nothing happened
of any consequence to
the day only the boys
came on the front
to see to day. They
and steps still in
among the night.

April, THURSDAY, 21. 1864.

Worked at the Shanty
above the Depot the
weather is fine. no
news today Joseph
received a letter to come
home he will leave
tomorrow

FRIDAY, 22.

Worked at another Shanty
and enclosed a story
for another the weather
being fair nothing
new. the day Joseph
Reber left for home
this morning

SATURDAY, 23.

Worked at another Shanty
up at the Congress Depot
and moved one from
its place and split
off shelves for a
third of a house. the
weather being fine. no
news. a letter from
home was received

April, SUNDAY 24. 1864.

No work today walked
about town the large
burn through the Ball
in the afternoon visited
the Camp of the 11th Maine
and heard the Band
play. a large crowd of
Ladies and Gents was
assembled on the parade

MONDAY, 25.

Worked at the old iron
shop at night the weather
being fine. the morning being
boring but cleared
up beautifully in
the afternoon. the
soldiers came in
town pretty thick today

TUESDAY, 26.

Worked at the old iron
and wrought it. the day
being beautiful.
nothing new of any
account

April, WEDNESDAY, 27. 1884.

Working at the old
iron. The weather being
favourable, nothing
new of any account.

THURSDAY, 28.

Worked at the old iron
as usual at 9 o'clock.
New. The weather
being beautiful.
The soldiers going
out past.

FRIDAY, 29.

Worked at the old
iron till dinner.
Then was detained
for opening oysters
for a supper of the
class and rest of the
day was spent by
the water. A disaster
to day & a bit
but no objection.

April, SATURDAY, 30. 1884.

to work on the old
iron nothing new
of any importance.

May, SUNDAY, 1.

Worked at the old
iron as usual the weather
being cloudy in the morn-
ing but cleared off fine
without rain. Two teams
of coloured soldiers
went to the front
in the evening went
to church.

MONDAY, 2.

Worked at the old iron
at the wharf nothing
new. The weather being
fine in the forenoon
a heavy storm with
rain that the boys
had to remove the
beds on account of the
rain.

May, TUESDAY, 3. 1864.

Worked on the wharf at the old iron as usual worked pretty hard and was quite still. Under the weather is beautiful.

WEDNESDAY, 4.

Worked at the old iron at the wharf nothing new the weather is beautiful. The army moved they brought in all the forage.

THURSDAY, 5.

Worked at the old iron as usual nothing new of any account. The weather is beautiful.

May, FRIDAY, 6. 1864.

Worked at the old iron as usual the weather was beautiful nothing new occurred. We were in the river bathing after supper.

SATURDAY, 7.

Worked at the old iron as usual the day being very warm. Mr. Danda was hurt a bad fall on his foot nothing new of any account. Our army is on their way to Richmond and are successful so far in swing.

SUNDAY, 8.

Did not work today but received orders to leave the wharf on account of the wounded soldiers being in the report is that here this is and that was on the field wounded and killed.

May, MONDAY, 9. 1864.

Worked at the old iron
on the wharf, nothing
new only. It is reported
that a gun was sent
in a day, but nothing
toward. The weather
is very warm. Two
was ordered to the

TUESDAY, 10.

Worked at the old iron
at the wharf and then
went out at the second
and wrought till
till night. No news of any
account. The weather
fine, had a little
rain last night.
Cooler of consequence.

WEDNESDAY, 11.

Worked at the old iron till
three o'clock, then
rested the remainder of the
day. The iron being all
gone, the weather being
fine, with a shower in
evening nothing
new. Wrote a letter
to my wife this morning.

THURSDAY, 12. 1864.

Worked at the wharf unloading
the train of iron and weighing
it. The weather is disagreeable.
The border shows all day
nothing new of any account
only the report that Grant
expects to take possession of Rich-
mond of these days.

FRIDAY, 13.

Worked at the old iron gathering
the iron up about the road to
the town. A full day's work
nothing new only accounts
of the General's capture of 40
guns & 5000 prisoners evening
thing looks favourable
the weather to day is rainy.
This afternoon stopped off.

SATURDAY, 14.

Worked at the old iron a while
then gathered London papers
and wrought them. Nothing
new. The weather is fine
after the rain. No news of
any account. Information
from the paper gives us
that Grant is in hot pursuit
of the Rebels.

May, SUNDAY, 15. 1864.

Not at work to day. The men are but little this forenoon. I took a walk to the granite yard accompanied with W. E. Jones. Then this afternoon went to the wharf and saw a steamer come up with persons. The weather is rainy with thunder storms.

MONDAY, 16.

Worked at the old iron foundry and put the stoves in the office at 4 P.M. Then went to the wharf and loaded nothing. Saw the weather is fine. After commenced to work to day.

TUESDAY, 17.

Went down to the wharf fishing while down received orders to move. Got the things aboard and left at 10 o'clock. We are now passing Fort Washington. The water is loaded with guns at the house above a little more a flag at the wharf at night. The night is beautiful.

May, WEDNESDAY, 18. 1864.

Got out at 4 o'clock and went to work at the dock. It being all day by fire we repaired it as the men could be landed after the rain was landed and loaded our things and got to Brooke's Station and put up our tents. Then unloaded the lumber at the bridge. The men being afraid of Quakers.

THURSDAY, 19.

The morning commenced at the bridge and finished it till 1 o'clock. Then struck tents and loaded our traps and went to the Potomac Creek Bridge. Pitched tents and unloaded lumber till 9 o'clock. Then

Stopped off till the morning. Sick this forenoon did not work the afternoon.

FRIDAY, 20.

Commenced to work at the Potomac Creek this morning at 4 o'clock and finished it up pretty fast. Worked till 7 P.M. got the lower bend all up to the second pier and five on the second pier one on the third. Then took supper and after a good wash. Received a letter from the

May, SATURDAY, 21. 1864.

Worked at the bridge, got up at 4 o'clock AM and went to work at the pole. Creek bridge, put on the 2nd brace at day. The bridge I think will be finished by tomorrow. The weather is fine. no clouds.

SUNDAY, 22.

Got up at four o'clock and went to work at the bridge. Got it finished till four o'clock in the afternoon. The engine, E. L. West, was the first engine crossed the bridge. nothing new. The weather is fine with a shower to day.

MONDAY, 23.

Rose this morning at 8 AM. Struck our tents and loaded our traps. With the intention of going to New Hamburg but was sadly disappointed and came to the Agate Creek again and pitched our tents and put our tools on board of the barge. Then rained.

May, TUESDAY, 24. 1864.

Got up this morning and struck our tents loaded our traps and stayed and helped to unload the wounded and gave them water in the last train I found one of the Hamburg Boys, Augustus Miller we gave him something to eat and drink then took back aboard of the gun where they went aboard our car which was on the barge.

WEDNESDAY, 25.

Left Agate Creek last night at 10 1/2 o'clock. it was raining and storming. fixed my bed in the boat and rode in the morning as we landed at Alexandria where we changed our things and dug a well for our things, then rained & the weather is fine. nothing new of any account.

THURSDAY, 26.

Rained this morning and this afternoon worked a while made a box for tools, nothing new of any account.

May, FRIDAY, 27. 1864.

The day being fair nothing new of any account to me. I worked to day. I was sick in the evening. I was down town to get cash and things and then went to get dinner.

SATURDAY, 28.

The weather has been fine. no work to day. the boys are looking about the shanty. I finished covering my boiler. Nothing new of any account. Several gangs was ordered to the white house in the morning.

SUNDAY, 29.

Worked at the wharf at about 4 o'clock. I was on the barges. The weather is fine. nothing new. five gangs left Milwaukee for the white house on the peninsula.

May, MONDAY, 30. 1864.

Worked at the wharf fixed up the boat and laid down. nothing new of any account. The weather being pleasant. I received my report pay to day which was \$1.00.

TUESDAY, 31.

Worked at the barges at the ascending wharf till 10 o'clock in the forenoon. Then went to the shanty and loaded the other part of the day. The weather being fine. nothing new.

June, WEDNESDAY, 1.

No work to day. laid about the shanty and awaited orders. The day being very warm. nothing new. Some of the boys and myself was down at the river fighting our boat was bad.

June, THURSDAY, 2. 1864.

Laid about the shanty till after dinner then went out to build a couple of traps. Boats went to the shore after the shanty. The weather is very warm and with a heavy thunder storm in the evening which cooled off the air beautifully. No news of any account.

FRIDAY, 3.

Laid about the shanty till after dinner then went out to build a couple of traps. Boats went to the shore after the shanty. The weather is very warm and with a heavy thunder storm in the evening which cooled off the air beautifully. No news of any account.

SATURDAY, 4.

Worked at a air tight boat and got done with them to night. Nothing new. The weather is fine. Dr. Miller called to see me last night. He is in the Soldiers Rest.

June, SUNDAY, 5. 1864.

No work to day. The weather is fine and the boys are all enjoying themselves as they work. I for my part am not fishing but did not have luck. After supper went out to the game yard. No news of any account.

MONDAY, 6.

No work to day. Laid about the shanty all day. The weather is very warm and with a heavy thunder storm in the evening which cooled off the air beautifully. No news of any account.

TUESDAY, 7.

No work to day awaiting orders. The weather to day is cool. Nothing new to day of any account. This evening we went out fishing. The first throw I made I got a bite and killed a cat and got an tops of the water a large perch and a couple of small ones.

June, WEDNESDAY, 8. 1864.

No work to day. We are awaiting orders. The day was fine. No news of any account. We went out fishing to night. Caught a fish and had better luck than usual.

THURSDAY, 9.

No work to day. The boys are all enjoying themselves as they think best. Nothing new of any account. The weather was warm to day till towards evening when a heavy rain came on.

FRIDAY, 10.

Put up a culvert to day between Washington and Alexandria on the Pike Road. The weather to day was fine. No news of any importance. We have a party this evening this far by singing.

June, SATURDAY, 11. 1864.

Went to work between Washington and Alexandria. Put up a culvert and two boards at a small bridge. Nothing new of any account. The weather to day was rather cool than usual. Mr. Shivers got his foot caught and hurt pretty bad.

SUNDAY, 12.

No work to day for amusement we took a walk to the River where we found the Colored people. In the afternoon took a walk to the grave yard. The weather is fine. No news.

MONDAY, 13.

No work to day. The boys all amused themselves at one thing or another. Some of them washing quarters. and Joe Reber and myself took a walk to see the New World the largest steamer ever came to Alexandria. The government has her for a hospital.

June, TUESDAY, 14. 1864.

No work to day. fishing
all day but had bad
luck. the weather
is rather cooler than usual.
Nothing new of
any importance

WEDNESDAY, 15.

No work to day. the weather
is fine. nothing
new of any importance.
Chas. M. has
come from the wharf
here this evening.

THURSDAY, 16.

No work to day. nothing
new of any importance.
the weather to day
is fine.

June, FRIDAY, 17. 1864.

Worked at wharf. No
put an extension to
it. nothing new of any
act. the weather to day
is fine. this evening
went fishing after supper
and caught a bad fish
18 1/2 inch long

SATURDAY, 18.

Worked on the dock No 5
at Alexandria. No news of
any importance only the
capture of Petersburg.
The weather is beautiful.
I was fishing this evening
and had a good luck.

SUNDAY, 19

No work to day. the
weather is fine. nothing
new of any importance.
we was out fishing
to day but had pretty
good luck. Sent a
letter to my sister
Emma to day

June, MONDAY, 20. 1884

Worked at the Wharf at Wash-
ington till eight
got finished with
nothing new of any
account. The weather the
day was fine. This even-
ing we got amusement
went fishing and caught
a fine string of cod
fish.

TUESDAY, 21.

Called out to load Lumber
and after we had it loaded
we got orders to go to Washington.
We struck tents and loaded and
reached Washington at 2 o'clock.
Pitched tents, after supper we went
to the Congress Chamber. The ques-
tion before the house was about the
California Rail Road. Indianism was per-

WEDNESDAY, 22.

Worked at the sixth wharf
at Washington nothing new
of any importance. The
weather the day was
fine. The scenery around
the river is beautiful
with the animals a piece
below us. Target practice
the day.

June, THURSDAY, 23. 1884.

Worked at the Wharf at Wash-
ington nothing new of
any account. The weather the day
was very warm.

FRIDAY, 24.

Worked at the Wharf at
Washington. The weather
the day was very warm.
Almost gave out. No
news of any account.

SATURDAY, 25.

Worked at the wharf at
Washington. The weather
was very warm. Nothing
new of any account.
We went to the Columbian
Garden and had some
dinner and chess.
William Fessing came up from
the capital. I saw him at
the wharf.

June, SUNDAY, 20. 1864.

No work to day. the weather to day was being warm till two o'clock evening and then had a heavy thunder storm and we floated over line to day on a flat under the wharf. There being a fine breeze. No news of any account to day.

MONDAY, 27.

Worked at the Wharf at Washington. the weather to day was very warm. In the evening we had a heavy shower of rain but little rain this evening. we were at Grove Theatre the act was magnificent a Beautiful scenery.

TUESDAY, 28.

Worked at the Wharf at Washington. the weather to day was fine no news of any account. The steamer Commodore left with 5000 wounded of which 10 were dead.

June, WEDNESDAY, 20. 1864.

Worked at the Wharf at Washington. nothing new of any importance. the weather was not quite so warm as it was yesterday. Joseph Linder Dr. Miller called to see us to day. they are camped here in Washington.

THURSDAY, 30.

Worked on the wharf at Washington nothing new of any account. the weather is fine. While working Dr. Miller came on the wharf he was waiting on the boat to go to the hospital a little rain towards evening.

July, FRIDAY, 1.

Worked at the Wharf at Washington till 2 o'clock. then we went to the bridge and to the long bridge on the Virginia side where we pitched our camp. and went to look the mountains are very troublesome. Nothing new.

July, SATURDAY, 2. 1864.

Worked at the long bridge at Washington. nothing new of any account. The weather very warm till the afternoon then we had a heavy storm.

SUNDAY, 3.

Worked at the long bridge at Washington putting in a Putnam under the bridge. The weather is fine nothing new of any account. This evening I was sitting on the bridge fishing the fire works were seen to be going. a letter from C. H. Ballou to day.

MONDAY, 4.

Worked at the long bridge across the Potomac. nothing new of any account. In the evening crossed the bridge and went into the city to enjoy a little of the fourth. The weather was fine.

July, TUESDAY, 5. 1864.

Struck tents this morning and loaded on the cars to move to Sixth street at Washington arrived there before dinner and pitched our tents and rested for the day. Went to the wharf and saw the copperheaded steamship. Saw also the Alabama was sunk.

WEDNESDAY, 6.

Went out on the wharf to work. saved off one spile then laid over for the day. The weather is pretty warm. The thermometer stands 102 degrees in our tent. The news variable. It is reported that the Reds are going to leave Richmond again. It is hoped they will meet with a warm reception.

THURSDAY, 7.

Worked at Sixth street at Washington. The weather to day was very warm. Received a letter from my sister Emma.

July,

THURSDAY, 14.

1864.

Had orders yesterday to pack up, but did not leave. On work today, but are still awaiting marching orders. To day, the rebels were driven back several miles. I think they will meet with a warm reception they have already several thousand head of cattle but I hope they will be captured.

FRIDAY, 15.

On work to day. but every thing ready for marching orders. The weather to day is fine. The news to day is favorable. The rebels are reported to be retreating towards Richmond again. Hunter is best friend.

SATURDAY, 16.

Left Alexandria at one o'clock for Manassas Bridge on the Potomac RR. Our road up we met Mr. Price. arrived at the Bridge at 10 o'clock. Spread our blankets on the top of the car and sleep on our way to the Bridge which is 20 miles from here.

July,

SUNDAY, 17.

1864.

arrived here at the manassas Bridge this morning at 5 o'clock. Had breakfast and went to work at the bridge. it is an iron but partly well shattered with cannon balls. Drained it up and was finished at 3 o'clock then started for Harper's Ferry and arrived here at 6 o'clock this evening and

MONDAY, 18.

This morning went to work at the bridge at Harper's Ferry. it is just iron and part wood. The latter was burned by our own men. to keep the rebels from crossing. A bird's eye view of Harper's Ferry, reminding me all the world of Fort Clinton. The report is that a fight is going on at night but about 16 miles from this.

TUESDAY, 19.

Worked at the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road Bridge at Harper's Ferry. got all the bonds up ready for Drapping. The soldiers are fresh in this place. There batteries are planted on top of the mountain no news at any account.

July, WEDNESDAY, 20. 1864.

got up at four o'clock
and took breakfast and
then went to work at
the Harpers Ferry bridge
we sent up boxes to day
no news of any account
the weather to day was
very warm. a shower
this afternoon

THURSDAY, 21.

Worked at the bridge at the
of Harpers Ferry. no news
of any account. the first
train crossed over to day
at 2 o'clock. the weather
to day is fine

FRIDAY, 22.

Moved from Sandy Hook to Harpers
Ferry and camped on the other
side of the bridge. the Rail Rd
bridge is now finished. and
so we will go to work at the
wagon Road bridge. to day
a train of wounded came in and
perched for some time
no news of any account

July, SATURDAY, 23. 1864.

Worked at the wagon Road
bridge at Harpers Ferry. Nothing
new has transpired to day. the
weather is fine. Got out of
Harpers and must live on
Hard Lake also looks over
Harpers to Adams so we must
do the best we can

SUNDAY, 24.

No work to day. we were left
with about 100 men. there
is fighting going on at
Gettysburg to day
the report is that the Rebels
were on their way to Harpers
Ferry again. the weather to
day is fine

MONDAY, 25.

Rained hard all last night and
this fore noon did not stop till after
noon then went to work at the
wagon Road bridge. Great excitement
prevails amongst our
soldiers. California it is reported the
Rebels were on their way to this place
they are shipping things all day and
the passengers were ordered to back

July, TUESDAY, 26, 1864.

Went to work at the bridge at Harpers Ferry worked till dinner then received orders to take off as much work as we could and pack our things and leave. The Rebels coming towards this place the Report is that they are only 4 miles off. The Citizens shipped all their things and we got aboard the cars and left at 6 o'clock. They had orders to cut the bridge again and just put up.

WEDNESDAY, 27.

We made all last night on the cars and arrived at the Relay House at 9 o'clock this morning from a Special order from Major Perry left the Relay House at 12 o'clock and arrived at Washington at 4 o'clock then laid over till 7 o'clock in the evening and started for Alexandria and arrived here at 12 o'clock this evening.

THURSDAY, 28.

No work to day looking about the shanty at Alexandria. The news of any importance. Only it is reported that they are fighting in the Rappahannock Valley. The weather is day was fine.

July, FRIDAY, 29, 1864.

No work to day looking about the shanty. The weather was very warm to day. No news of any account.

SATURDAY, 30.

No work to day looking about the shanty and waiting orders. The report is that the Rebels are marching through Pennsylvania again they were at Chambersburg this morning and going on towards Harrisburg. The weather is fine.

SUNDAY, 31.

No work to day looking about the shanty and while we are could make ourselves comfortable. The weather to day was very warm. The news is that the Rebels are at Chambersburg and destroyed 200 buildings by fire and then left.

August, MONDAY, 1. 1864.

loaded about the shanty
his dinner. They went
to the wharf and build a
raft of lumber for washing
the wharf. at 9th St. then
got ready to leave for Wash-
ington in the morning. the
weather is, day is fine. the port
of Grant blowing up the earth wall.

TUESDAY, 2.

got up at half past four, took
breakfast and then got on the
boat and went to the wharf.
loaded saw timber on board of
a schooner then left for Washington.
arrived here at 10 o'clock and
pitched our tent and then
unloaded the schooner of
saw plank. Rain towards evening.

WEDNESDAY, 3.

Worked at 9th wharf at washing
no news of any account. the
weather is day is fine
nothing about the Rarden
but fighting accounts.

August, THURSDAY, 4. 1864.

worked at 9th wharf. sent
on the springers & plank
the weather is day was
rather cooler than usual
we did keep this hands away
day by working. the colored
people had a picnic. this even-
ing I was at the wharf & eat
a watermelon. pretty high in price.

FRIDAY, 5.

Worked on the 9th wharf
no news of any account
the weather is day was rat-
her warm. this afternoon
while Past and myself went
to the wharf to buy a watermelon
an old man & his son got to
fighting and the son hit his father
with a club the man went into
the tug. SATURDAY, 6. and got a knife
and stabbed him, his son.

Worked at 9th wharf Washington.
the Report most day that Lee
& his main army upon the
Way to Pennsylvania. Grant
& the army closing up to Grant
is 12 hours ahead of Lee. it is
also Reported that the Rebs
have hoisted the black flag
the weather is day is fine.

August, SUNDAY, 7. 1864.

Struck our tents and went to Alex-
andria got Rations of tools and
returned immediately to Washington
on our way to Harpers Ferry. We
left Washington at 8 o'clock
this evening and arrived
at the Relay House at 11 o'clock
this evening. where we stopped
till morning. The weather is warm

MONDAY, 8.

Left the Relay House on the
Relay, this morning
on our way to Harpers Ferry
for the purpose of putting up
bridges. and going through
a valley all along
arrived at Harpers Ferry in
the afternoon at 4 o'clock. We
pitched our tents and made
our camp at home

TUESDAY, 9.

Commenced to work at the
Wagon Road bridge this
morning. Ben Sheridan
was on the bridge to
day and Ben Sheridan
left for Washington to
day. Cavalry coming
the morning of day.

August, WEDNESDAY, 10. 1864.

Worked at the Harpers Ferry
bridge. Nothing new of
any account. The weather

No work to day on account of
summer. The summer was all
worked up. no news of any ac-
count. More Cavalry arrived here
to day. The weather to day was
pretty warm.

FRIDAY, 12.

Worked at the Harpers Ferry
bridge to day laying the plank
No news of much account
a sad accident occurred
with one of our bands named
John Buckley had the misfor-
tune of losing his arm at the
explosion at City Point. The weather
to day was warmer than yesterday.

August, SATURDAY, 13. 1864.

Worked at the Bridge at Westport Ferry. Joe Harrens came up this forenoon and went up the Road towards Holt town. A bad accident occurred today while two cars were standing at the siding the engine came up in full speed and the driver was shot to the Run in and killed two and maimed one.

Worked at the Bridge at Harpers Ferry and finished the Hager Road Bridge. No news of any accident. The car that was run off yesterday was put on the track again. The weather was very warm today.

MONDAY, 15.

Got up at five o'clock and went to work at another Rail Road bridge at Harpers Ferry we have now completed three bridges at this iron bridge to cross. nothing new of any account. The weather today was very warm with pretty good shower.

August, TUESDAY, 16. 1864.

went to work at half past five this morning at the Rail Road Bridge putting up trusses. in the afternoon we got Reinforcements Joe Harrens men helped nothing occurred today of any account. Cloudy all day.

WEDNESDAY, 17.

Worked at the bridge at Harpers Ferry and got about finished with it. Harrens men was up the Road about 3 miles towards Winchester cutting the the guerrillas got after them and Robbed them of all they had and took 1000000 along and shot one in the arm.

THURSDAY, 18.

Went up the Winchester Road to put up a water tank and got one side up when we got orders to pack up and leave for Alexandria. Harrens men packed up. we came down to the station and then the orders was to go to Alexandria. We went to Alexandria.

August, FRIDAY, 19. 1864.

Camped up the Winchester R.R. Road and went up the Road and tore up the old track and put up a new one got up as far as Bluff town Got a crop of Green Corn as we come back. The Colored men ahead of the Smiley. Raining all day in rains

SATURDAY, 20.

Went up the Road towards Hag town and took the R.R. in the afternoon went to work on a bridge below our camp. Put on stringers and got a load of plank and our Rations of beef along to the camp. Raining nearly all day

Worked at the bridge and track, on a track on the side above Charlestown Cannery since dinner till late this evening. The Report is that our men are falling back was on the night this evening the light is about 3 miles off Canonado house. Bluff

got up. and took breakfast then received orders to pack up and leave for Washington. we left Harper's Ferry at 8 o'clock and arrived at the Relay House at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. left there at 12 o'clock at night and arrived at Washington next morning. Rain to day

Arrived at Washington this morning and pitched tents on marshland and went to work at the dredge a steam boat ran in and broke it while Charles Leaburg was struck with a piece while working. no news of any account

August, WEDNESDAY, 31. 1884.

Left first Rebo on the boat last night and went up at dawn. Rye and went opposite point lock out. at noon passed fort Hill Monroe and by 1 o'clock in the evening landed at City Point unloaded our things and loaded them on the cars to go out the road 5 miles in the morning

September, THURSDAY, 1.

Slept in the cars last night at City point and got up and went out the road 3 miles from fort outburg to build a road from the road to Petersburg to the welding road. pitched camp and then went out to cut ties for the road

FRIDAY, 2.

Went out the new Road and cut ties till dinner and then put up a chip pine over a river. The Rebs and our men have a brush every day. we are within the reach of the Rebs

September, SATURDAY, 3. 1884.

Build a cribbing on the road from the City point Re to the welding Rd. Worked till dark. opposite Petersburg about one mile off we are getting along pretty fast. Campbreaking Every night this evening we were taken the shells flesh

SUNDAY, 4.

got up and packed our traps. and moved with teams out the road towards the welding Road about five miles from where we camped. We are close to our front fortification about a half mile off. this afternoon put up bridge across a river

MONDAY, 5.

report that Atlanta was taken. Worked at the bridge across the river opposite our tent and finished till dinner then cleared the road to lay ties got to one of our forts by night where the road runs close by the water is gone. Heavy shells last night the boys were all brightened and they watched the shells

September, TUESDAY, 6. 1864.

Went out the road to fill
up and tank the engine
then up to our camp this
evening. The Rebs had great
cheering last night. They got
the news that they took Washington
firing going in at the time
threw themselves down last night
and rain all day.

WEDNESDAY, 7.

Worked on the road by night all
camp filling up tanks. The
engines were fired up here to
day by the Rebs. four shots
on this new road. The Rebs
seem to take it very hard
on account of Atlanta
being taken. The weather
to day was fine.

THURSDAY, 8.

Worked at the Rail Road
at tanking and filling
up. We put about 2 miles
from the Weldon Road.
Cannonading in the front
the weather to day was
fine. A rain towards evening.

September, FRIDAY, 9. 1864.

Filled up the track at the
new road from City point Rd
to the Weldon road. Heavy
cannonading & musketry
heard to day. The Union is
firing every time at
the road. But not struck
yet. It struck a suttler and took
his head off to day by one of the com-
mon balls.

SATURDAY, 10.

Worked on the new road from the
City point Rd to the Weldon Rd.
Cleared the brush and stumps
and reached the Weldon road
at evening at the place they
call the Spillash House. Miniford
to Howard & Dalton. Porter, Miller
& Quinn & Baum. H. Wittenberger
& Matthew Smith. Came here, they all
camped there.

SUNDAY, 11.

Filled up the track of the new road.
But made the Weldon road. Charles
Williamson is camped here at side
the road. I went over and found
him asleep. Then Ben Warren get
up. Our men took the Rebs fort
Richardson and there was
cannonading last night to day.
It is going and present.

September, MONDAY, 12. 1864.

Filled up the track of the new road from city point to the weldon Road. Nothing new of any account picked up. Constantly over much got out the night past last night when they have taken the other side got paid off for June & July.

TUESDAY, 13.

Worked on the new Rail Road filling up, picking up Cannon firing all day. The Rebels were in the hands every day. Jeremiah was down here to see us today. After supper we were taken out to throw up breast works to support the Union. The whole line of the Confederates was at it.

WEDNESDAY, 14.

Worked all last night digging breast works to keep the Rebels from firing on the train about half mile long. worked all night we were not shelled. we had over to day to take a rest. So I went to see the ruins of that exploded fort it is about 1/2 mile below our Camp. saw the Rebels fort.

September, THURSDAY, 15. 1864.

Worked all last night throwing up breast works on the new road to keep the Rebels from firing in the train. and rested this morning. The Cannon then went out in the afternoon to fill up the track a few but exploded because of no, delay. the weather is fine.

FRIDAY, 16.

Worked at the Breast Works at the new Road. Heavy Cannon digging this afternoon. The shells went near our Breast Works. to day the Rebels made a charge on the weldon Road but was driven back with heavy loss. the weather to day was fine.

SATURDAY, 17.

Worked at the Breast Works till dinner not feeling good for some time I did not work the afternoon. Part of the army is constantly moving and the pickets fire all the time day & night. The Ball of the Rebels flying through our Camp. I really think one of them men was wounded in the shoulder. but I don't know.

September, SUNDAY, 18. 1864.

Sick to day the Bonair all at work that feel well but there are a great many sick. I took a walk out to the wildon Road and saw all the Sagnburg Regiments. Charles Goodwin & others met. Had to dine twice got 2 cantines of whiskey and drank together stayed till 10 o'clock then went home.

MONDAY, 19.

Went to work at the Best works as usual opposite the fort which Burnside's forces drop the shells. Burning pretty farly opposite us about 3 miles. Nothing new of any account the weather to day was fine.

TUESDAY, 20.

Worked at the Best works as usual the shells flying pretty fast below us. The clouds quite near us. No news of any consequence. The weather to day was fine.

September, WEDNESDAY, 21. 1864.

Worked at the Best Works till dinner then went down the Road to Rains station to fix up the track. Went home at four o'clock. Heavy firing this morning the whole line fired a salute on account of the victory of Shureman in the Valley.

THURSDAY, 22.

Worked on the Road I am going up towards Rains Station. No news of any consequence. The day was cloudy with rain but bright.

FRIDAY, 23.

Worked on the track filling up. Nothing new of any importance. The weather to day was fine. Capt. Fritsch has gone to City Point Sick. James Francis is here with us. & Capt. C. William son was here to day.

September, SATURDAY, 24. 1864.

By James, River
All hands were up with great expec-
-tations of starting for the Rappahannock
the morning of all the usual
regiment on the road with pack and
shells. When about half past camp
order to move. we began to camp
at once and took life. A heavy load
of supplies was lifted from the
shells and moved to the front and
at last on Camp, 25. at 11 AM.

In the mouth of the Rappahannock
Left City point at 10 AM and arrived at Fort
Monroe by about 11 AM. Having a heavy quilt
we anchored till this morning. When start-
ing for the Bay for the anchor in the steam
Boat. Is. Mary we ran into the Rappa-
hannock. The anchor being 3 miles across
we have not stopped as we are now flying
over back to the light house to anchor for the
night. It is now 11 AM. Rainy.

MONDAY, 26.

Left the Rappahannock at about
5 PM. yesterday. the storm being
pretty well over. we struck for
the Chesapeake Bay and then
all night. When morning we
landed at Cape Charles and
landed our traps. The
Cape Charles are awaiting orders
to go out the Potomac Road
the morning of the 27th.

September, TUESDAY, 27. 1864.

Spent about the shore, an-
chored, in the afternoon
went to the wharf and loaded
up with logs. no news of
any account. Robert Thidering
Pierman & O'Leary went home
yesterday. The weather is fine.

WEDNESDAY, 28.

Went to work to frame water tanks
till about 4 PM then got ready for
August. then loaded the things and
started out the Orange Alexandria
Rail Rd. Ran out about 25 miles.
the grass being on the track the engine
could not pull the train further. we
went back to Alexandria again
and stopped till morning. slept
on top of the train.

THURSDAY, 29.

took 3 engines and tried the trip
over. got to Aqueduct Bridge and
put that then went to Pope's head
then and about 10 PM then went
to 10 PM and put up that till 10 PM
then took a rest for the night. in
the room on top of the Cape. Beds
all met and only two miles
a day. pretty stuff.

September, FRIDAY, 30.

1864.

Started for Pipe Head Run. W. B. put things up. then took breakfast at 11 am. then started to M. and put things up and run up to Bull Run and took supper and went to bed on our wet beds again on top and under the car. Raining all day & night. put up had of the notices

October, SATURDAY, 1.

Went to work at the Bull Run Bridge took breakfast at 9 am and then went to work again. Finished the Bridge. W. B. and then down to Road Run and put that up till dark. then took our supper in the Rain and mud. no shelter. got a car to sleep in & night

SUNDAY, 2.

Started from Road Run to Little Run put that up till 10 am and then took breakfast. they went down the Road to the Pipe Head Run. then back to Warrington Junction. W. B. and took supper then went to Warrington Junction and laid over for the night

October, MONDAY, 3.

1864.

Took breakfast and started out the Manassas Gap Road. Cleared the Road of logs about 7 miles out then walked back to the Junction again and took supper very long at 2 meals a day. My boys go help themselves to hogs & Calves. Truckers etc.

TUESDAY, 4.

Started out the Road with the Construction team ran up the Road about 15 miles then stopped in the woods over night. plundering every thing as we go along. pigs chickens calves and sheep are plenty around

WEDNESDAY, 5.

Started after breakfast and changed cars got sleeping car and code to eating car and his comfortable box. stopped at Salem and found the depot burning as we started which the fire got on fire this morning. quills plenty all along

October, THURSDAY, 6. 1864.

Stopped at Richmond last evening and put up a bridge. Spent the night at the quarries as the engineers had a little fight last evening with them. We were called at last night. At 11 o'clock we left to defend our selves and the train. We were out among them and a piece of the little have been surrounded as they have. Some of the pieces of artillery were lost.

FRIDAY, 7.

Great excitement this morn'g. The rebels have surrounded us entirely, and burned the bridges behind us and before. They are within a mile of the fort. The rebels are in a very hot fight. The train, but this morning they have moved the artillery to another point and are charged. The train is now moving off last night. The rebels are still in the place. We left the place on a retreat at 1 p.m. to day. Still in Richmond.

SATURDAY, 8.

On our retreat yesterday the rebels burned our bridges and tore up the track wherever they had a good position. And was after us and fire in us all the time. At Salem we were had the night in the Cheek Road. Then we reached White Plains by dark yesterday. To day we cut wood for the engines and loaded the flatbeds and cars.

October, SUNDAY, 9. 1864.

White Plains Va. Received reinforcements last night and this morning we started out the road again and put up Goer Bridge and burned the little ones and got as far as Richmond. Then we went back to Richmond. At 2 o'clock we were in trouble with the rebels. Very heavy frost today.

MONDAY, 10.

Ran up the road to Richmond and put up the gang put up a small bridge and other cut wood for the engines. I for my part cut out forage and got 3 bags of Apples. I put 100 lbs of sugar. Then started to the flatbeds and got all the flatbeds till dark. The rebels took up a rail from the track and burned up the whole train engine.

TUESDAY, 11.

Richmond Va. Put up a frame for a water tank. Then went down the road. Below Salem where the back of the train was the intention is to put up a bridge before the flatbeds. There is two engines now, and the train is moving. The engines are Union and Marvel.

October, WEDNESDAY, 12. 1864.

Left at night.
cut up a small bridge about
