AMBLER H. MOSS, JR.

Ambler H. Moss, Jr. has been the Dean of the Graduate School of International Studies at the University of Miami since 1984. In this position he coordinates the efforts of 30 teaching and research faculty and a number of international education programs.

A former Ambassador to Panama, Ambler Moss was appointed by President Carter in 1978, and then reappointed by President Ronald Reagan. He was a member of the U.S. team which negotiated the Panama Canal Treaties of 1977 and was then Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Congressional Relations during the treaties ratification debate in the U.S. Senate.

In 1982, Moss left the ambassadorship and became an adjunct professor of International Studies at the University of Miami and an attorney with Greenberg, Traurig, Askew, Hoffman, Lipoff, Rosen & Quentel in Miami.

In recent years, Ambler Moss has been a leader in galvanizing increased understanding of the complex relationships among the nations of the Caribbean and Latin America and the United States.

Ambler Moss was the initiator and principal author of the "Miami Report," a consensus of recommendations of leading business, education and other professionals from Miami, concerning economic, cultural and political problems throughout the Americas. Recommendations contained in the report have received national and international recognition.

Moss also serves as the Director of the North-South Center at the University of Miami. The center provides an institutional focus for international research and such programs as task force studies, workshops and seminars all working toward increasing understanding and cooperation among the private sector, governments and educational institutions.

The Honorable Max Rosenn has served as Judge of the United States Court of Appeals, Third Circuit, for more than fifteen years. In recognition of his tenth anniversary on the bench and his numerous contributions to the U.S. judiciary system and to the quality of life in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the judge's former law clerks, friends and family established **The Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.**

A native of the Wyoming Valley, Judge Rosenn was born in Plains (Pa.) and currently resides in Kingston with his wife Tillie.

Throughout his career he has made innumerable contributions to the enrichment of the region. His service has spanned many fields, including law, education, health, religion and public welfare.

A member of the Wilkes University Board of Trustees since 1970, Judge Rosenn received his undergraduate degree from Cornell University and his LL.B. from the University of Pennsylvania. He also did post-graduate work at the University of California at Berkeley and the University of Michigan.

The prominent and highly respected court official is a member of the American, Federal, and Pennsylvania Bar Associations; a Fellow of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers; a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers; and a member of the American Law Institute. He is a founding member of the Council of the American Society of Law and Medicine, and an associate editor of the American Journal of Law and Medicine.

The former Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is a Life Member of both the Jewish Community Center, where he serves as a trustee, and the Wyoming Valley Jewish Committee. Following the flood of 1972, Judge Rosenn served his community as chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.
