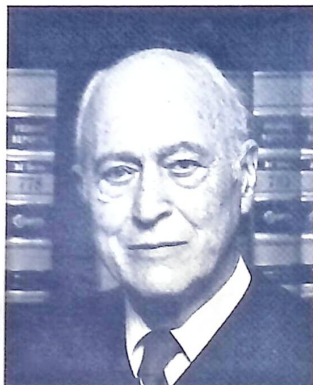

THE HONORABLE MAX ROSENN
Senior Judge
United States Court of Appeals

Judge Max Rosenn's long career as a public servant has spanned many fields, including law, philanthropy, public welfare, health, and religion. He has made innumerable contributions to the enhancement of Northeastern Pennsylvania, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. Following the Hurricane Agnes Disaster of 1972, he played a vital role in the rehabilitation of Greater Wilkes-Barre and its many neighboring communities as Chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

After receiving an undergraduate degree from Cornell University and a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn commenced his legal career. He interrupted that career to enter military service in World War II. After several years in the South Pacific, he returned to his wife and sons and resumed the practice of law. He entered state government in 1966 as Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As Secretary, Judge Rosenn also served as a member of the cabinet of Governor William W. Scranton and in the cabinet of his successor, Raymond Shafer, and as Chairman of the Governor's Council for Human Services. Following his resignation as Secretary and resumption of the practice of law, he served as Chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and Chairman of the Legislative Executive Task Force to Restructure Human Services for Pennsylvania. He also served as a member of the 1968 Governor's Commission to Revise the Public Employee Laws of Pennsylvania. President Nixon appointed him to the United States Court of Appeals in 1970, in which capacity he still serves.

He and his late wife, Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Professor Keith, Dr. Daniel, and six grandchildren.

In recognition of his exceptional contributions and his warm relationship with them, Judge Rosenn's law clerks, with the assistance of his family and friends, established in 1980 the Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.

In her best-selling book, *World on Fire: How Exporting Free Market Democracy Breeds Ethnic Hatred and Global Instability*, Amy Chua offers a fundamentally new perspective on how to help sustain globalization by finding ways to spread its benefits while curbing its most destructive aspects. In this groundbreaking work, she is the first to highlight the pervasive market-dominance of ethnic minorities in many developing countries and the combustible impact that ethnicity can have on the combination of markets and democracy.

Chua is articulate and passionate. Her book and her presentations reflect both personal experience and careful, intelligent observation of what is actually happening around the world. She has a vision not only of what to avoid, but how to promote sustainable development in ways that take local conditions into account with a new level of maturity and respect.

Chua is uniquely qualified to present this important topic. She speaks from personal experience as a member of the Chinese minority in the Philippines. She has been a Wall Street lawyer, working for four years on the privatization of Telmex, the national telephone company of Mexico. She currently is a professor at Yale Law School. She lectures frequently on the effects of globalization to government, business, and academic groups around the world, and has taught law at Duke, Stanford, and New York Universities. *World on Fire* is her first book.

Amy Chua is changing the context of global economics and international politics with an indispensable message for any organization interested in either one.
