DANIEL W. ROSENN, MD

Daniel Rosenn, MD graduated from Amherst College in 1964 and received his MD from Stanford University School of Medicine in 1969. He completed post graduate training in Pediatrics at the University of Minnesota, and a Fellowship in Behavioral Pediatrics at Harvard Medical School. He was also awarded a Masters of Science degree in Public Health from the Harvard School of Public Health. He completed residencies in General Psychiatry at McLean Hospital and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Boston's Beth Israel Hospital.

Dr. Rosenn is the past Head of Child Psychiatry at Beth Israel Hospital and former Associate Director of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at McLean Hospital. He has written book chapters and journal articles on a variety of subjects, including psychiatric emergencies, childhood suicide, and Asperger's Syndrome. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, and is on the faculty of Harvard Medical School. He is the Medical Director of North American Family Institute, a multi-state, non profit psychiatric organization. He has a practice in general psychiatry in Wellesley, MA where he specializes in autistic spectrum disorders.

RICHARD L. GELFOND

Richard L. Gelfond is Co-Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer of IMAX Corporation, the pioneer and leader of the large-format theatre and film industry. IMAX has over 280 theatres in 35 countries, produces and distributes numerous films each year and has won an Academy Award for Scientific and Technical Achievement.

Prior to acquiring IMAX in 1994, Mr. Gelfond specialized in leveraged buyouts and venture capital investments, where he helped many businesses grow through his unique entrepreneurial and management skills, as well as introducing companies to new sources of capital. Earlier in his career, he was involved in retail management and investment banking, and also served as a corporate attorney specializing in mergers and acquisitions. Mr. Gelfond started his career in 1979 as a law clerk for the Honorable Max Rosenn of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit.

KEITH S. ROSENN

Keith S. Rosenn, Professor of Law, received a B.A. from Amherst College in 1960 and an LL.B. from Yale Law School in 1963. He served as law clerk to Judge J. Joseph Smith of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit and then practiced law in Pennsylvania. Before joining the University of Miami School of Law faculty in 1979, he spent 14 years as a law professor at Ohio State University. Professor Rosenn has practiced law with a Brazilian law firm and has worked as a project specialist with the Ford Foundation, helping to establish a graduate legal education program in Rio de Janeiro. He is the author of six books and numerous law review articles in the fields of comparative law, Latin American law, and constitutional law. He is the director of the LL.M. programs in Comparative Law and in Inter-American Law. He teaches courses in constitutional law, comparative law, Latin American law, and international business transactions.

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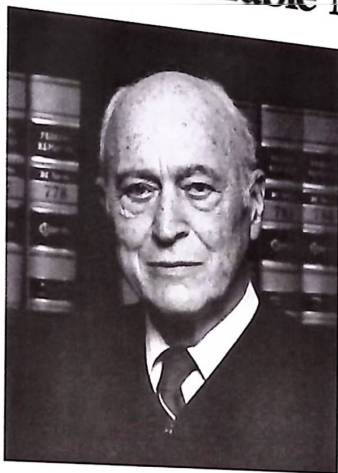

Judge Max Rosenn's long career as a public servant spanned many fields, including law, philanthropy, public welfare, health, and religion. He made innumerable contributions to the enhancement of Northeastern Pennsylvania, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. Following the Hurricane Agnes Disaster of 1972, he played a vital role in the rehabilitation of Greater Wilkes-Barre and its many neighboring communities as Chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

After receiving an undergraduate degree from Cornell University and a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn commenced his legal career. He interrupted that career to enter military service in World War II. After several years in the South Pacific, he returned to his wife and sons and resumed the practice of law. He entered state government in 1966 as Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As Secretary, Judge Rosenn also served as a member of the cabinet of Governor William W. Scranton and in the cabinet of his successor, Raymond Shafer, and as Chairman of the Governor's Council for Human Services. Following his resignation as Secretary and resumption of the practice of law, he served as Chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and Chairman of the Legislative Executive Task Force to Restructure Human Services for Pennsylvania. He also served as a member of the 1968 Governor's Commission to Revise the Public Employee Laws of Pennsylvania. President Nixon appointed him to the United States Court of Appeals in 1970.

He and his late wife, Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Professor Keith, Dr. Daniel, and six grandchildren.

In recognition of his exceptional contributions and his warm relationship with them, Judge Rosenn's former law clerks and former law firm Rosenn, Jenkins & Greenwald, with the assistance of his family and friends, established in 1980 the Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.

Guest Speaker - Bob Woodward

Bob Woodward is the assistant managing editor of *The Washington Post* and the only contemporary American writer to author or co-author at least eight #1 national best-selling non-fiction books. Woodward has won nearly every American journalism prize including the 1973 Pulitzer Prize for reporting with Carl Bernstein on the Watergate scandal.

The New York Times has said, "Bob Woodward is the most famous investigative reporter in America."

Newsweek has excerpted five of his books in headline-making cover stories, *60*

Minutes has featured three of his books, and three of Woodward's books have been made into movies.

His most recent book, *The Secret Man: The Story of Watergate's Deep Throat*, is a riveting look at the historic Watergate scandal and the revelation of former FBI operative, Mark Felt, as the infamous Deep Throat.

The Washington Post writes, "The Secret Man is the closest thing to self-examination that Woodward...has ever published. It isn't a full-fledged memoir. Instead, it is a narrative of his relationship with W. Mark Felt, the high-ranking FBI official who was recently revealed as Woodward's legendary Watergate source. But for anyone who has ever wondered what makes Woodward tick, it offers at least a road map for further analysis."

Bob Woodward's *Plan of Attack* was released in April 2004. *Plan of Attack* is a behind-the-scenes look at the Bush administration during the war in Iraq—how they are dealing with the causes and consequences behind the most controversial war since Vietnam. Prior to this, Woodward wrote *Bush at War*, an inside account of the internal debate within the Bush administration that led to U.S. military action in Afghanistan and the decision to confront Iraq.

Woodward runs

Watergate reporter hits

WILKES-BARRE — Famed journalist Bob Woodward gave, during a talk on Sunday evening, what he called “reason all by itself to stay alive” until after the 2008 presidential election: a ballot pitting Sen. Hillary Clinton against Vice President Dick Cheney.

“This sounds crazy,” he said before revealing his prediction for Cheney, whom he termed the “warhorse” of the Republican Party, “but if it turns out that it’s not crazy, you can say you heard it hear first.”

Woodward was the featured

speaker at the 25th annual Rosenn Lecture in Leadership and Humanities at Wilkes University’s Marts Center.

With staccato enunciation and an accent presumably from his native Illinois that he uses every “a,” he roamed out the American political continuum in his comingling into Watergate and the Vietnam war in Iraq, also touching on the upcoming presidential election.

Early in the talk, he mentioned audience polls on Iraq and government spying, the 2008 presidential election and budget cuts. A few brave

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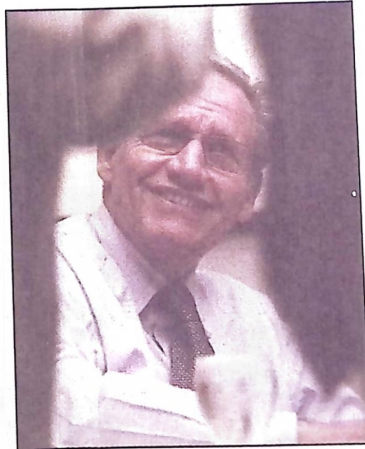
Early in the talk, he took audience polls on Iraq, government spying, the most recent presidential election and tax cuts. A few brave souls in the

heavily liberal audience were willing to raise their hands in support of conservative views.

Woodward rewarded them by admitting that his polls were a thinly veiled search for “rich, nosey, warmonger Republicans.”

Though he has written nine No. 1 national bestsellers, he is most famous for his work with fellow Washington Post reporter Carl Bernstein on the Watergate scandal in the early 1970s. Their work forced President Richard Nixon to resign to avoid impeachment.

While working on a book on the Iraq war, Woodward sent his findings to President Bush.

Colleagues at the Post questioned Woodward, "You sent him a 21-page memo? He never read anything that long in his four years at Yale."

But, it turned out that Bush read the memo and agreed to an interview with Woodward. Obviously proud of his work, Woodward described the interview that lasted about 3 1/2 hours over two days. He said research has shown it's the longest interview a sitting president has given on a single topic.

He asked about 500 questions because "Bush gives short answers."

Though he said Iraq was broken because of the war, he cautioned against judging Bush too harshly now, saying "Things do not always look the same 10 years, 15 years, 50 years (later)."

Later, while curtly fielding questions from the audience, Woodward responded to feedback from a microphone by remarking, "Gordon Liddy is doing the sound."

He discussed the state of journalism in America, saying that speed and impatience are damaging the profession.

He said an extraterrestrial visitor might consider journalism the best job on Earth because reporters "get into someone's life when it's interesting and get out when it's boring."
