The Honorable Max Rosenn has served as Judge of the United States Court of Appeals, Third Circuit, for more than a decade. In recognition of his tenth anniversary on the bench and his numerous contributions to the U.S. ju-

dicatory system and to the quality of life in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the judge's former law clerks and friends have established **The Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.**

A native of the Wyoming Valley, Judge Rosenn was born in Plains (Pa.) and currently resides in Kingston with his wife Tillie.

Throughout his career he has made innumerable contributions to the enrichment of the region. His contributions have spanned many fields, including law, education, health, religion and public welfare.

A member of the Wilkes College Board of Trustees since 1970, Judge Rosenn received his undergraduate degree from Cornell University and his LL.B. from the University of Pennsylvania. He also did post-graduate work at the University of California at Berkeley, and the University of Michigan.

The prominent and highly respected court official is a member of the American, Federal, and Pennsylvania Bar Associations, and serves as a consultant for the Pennsylvania Supreme Court Committee on Criminal Procedural Rules. He is an active member of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers, the American Judicature Society and serves on the Council of American Society of Law and Medicine.

The former Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is a Life Member of both the Jewish Community Center, where he serves as a trustee, and the Wyoming Valley Jewish Committee. Following the flood of 1972, Judge Rosenn served his community as chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

The Guest Speaker



MR. EDWIN NEWMAN
NBC News Correspondent
Author, Linguist

Mr. Edwin Newman has sustained a record of excellence throughout his thirty-one years in broadcast journalism. During this period, the NBC News Correspondent has also gained considerable recognition for his concern about proper use of the English language.

Mr. Newman has demonstrated his versatility as a journalist. Throughout his career he has served as principal reporter for NBC White Papers and documentaries, anchored special news reports, hosted "Today" on numerous occasions, and interviewed foreign dignitaries. He has often appeared on "Meet the Press" and has provided radio commentary numerous times. For the latter, he received the Peabody Award in 1967.

Among Edwin Newman's special reports for NBC was the White Paper "Pleasure Drugs: The Great American High," which examined how the drug habits of the 1960's counter-culture have moved rapidly into the mainstream of America's middle class. On another special program, "Just Plain Folks . . . The Billionaire Hunts," he profiled the Hunt family of Texas. In 1979 Mr. Newman examined the relationship between oil and American power in the Middle East, in the NBC White Paper, "No More Vietnams, But . . ."

As the current anchor of "NBC News Capsule," Mr. Newman has covered seven sets of national political conventions and four world's fairs. In 1975 he was granted the first exclusive interview ever accorded to a journalist by the Emperor of Japan. In 1976 Mr. Newman moderated the first Ford-Carter presidential debate. During the attempted assassination of President Reagan in 1981, NBC News chose Edwin Newman to anchor its special, extended news coverage.

Mr. Newman is also recognized as an author and linguist. His two books, *Strictly Speaking: Will America Be the Death of English?* (1974) and *A Civil Tongue* (1976) were national best sellers. He also authored a comic novel, *Sunday Punch*, in 1979.

The Max Rosenn Lecture Series was established in 1980 by the judge's former law clerks and friends in recognition of his tenth anniversary as a Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, and in appreciation of his many contributions to the field of law, to the United States judiciary system, and to the quality of life in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
