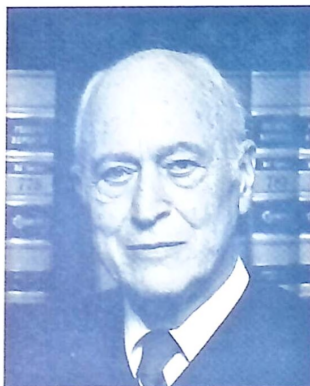

The Honorable Max Rosenn



THE HONORABLE MAX ROSENN
Senior Judge
United States Court of Appeals

Judge Max Rosenn's long career as a public servant has spanned many fields, including law, philanthropy, public welfare, health, and religion. He has made innumerable contributions to the enhancement of Northeastern Pennsylvania, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. Following the Hurricane Agnes Disaster of 1972, he played a vital role in the rehabilitation of Greater Wilkes-Barre and its many neighboring communities as Chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

After receiving an undergraduate degree from Cornell University and a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn commenced his legal career. He interrupted that career to enter military service in World War II. After several years in the South Pacific, he returned to his wife and sons and resumed the practice of law. He entered state government in 1966 as Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As Secretary, Judge Rosenn also served as a member of the cabinet of Governor William W. Scranton and in the cabinet of his successor, Raymond Shafer, and as Chairman of the Governor's Council for Human Services. Following his resignation as Secretary and resumption of the practice of law, he served as Chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and Chairman of the Legislative Executive Task Force to Restructure Human Services for Pennsylvania. He also served as a member of the 1968 Governor's Commission to Revise the Public Employee Laws of Pennsylvania. President Nixon appointed him to the United States Court of Appeals in 1970, in which capacity he still serves.

He and his late wife, Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Professor Keith, Dr. Daniel, and six grandchildren.

In recognition of his exceptional contributions and his warm relationship with them, Judge Rosenn's law clerks, with the assistance of his family and friends, established in 1980 the Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.

Guest Speaker - Fareed Zakaria

FAREED ZAKARIA
Renowned journalist and Foreign Affairs expert
"Terrorism in an Age of Globalization"



Widely respected for his ability to spot economic and political trends around the world, Zakaria has developed an international reputation as a global thinker. Describing him as "the most influential foreign policy advisor of his generation," *Esquire* magazine named him "one of the 21 most important people of the 21st Century."

In a *New York Times* op-ed piece in December 2000, Zakaria wrote: "The bloody crossroads of the next decade will be where globalization meets terrorism. All the wondrous developments of the new economy – falling costs, fewer borders, easy communications – help international terrorists and criminals as much as they do businessmen. And only well-exercised power – military, economic, and political – can meet this new threat." Trained as an academic at Yale and Harvard universities, Zakaria, in 1992 at the age of 28, became the youngest Managing Editor in the history of *Foreign Affairs*, the leading journal of international politics and economics – a position he held through 2000.

In 2001 Zakaria was named Editor of *Newsweek International*, which has a global audience of 3.5 million and is distributed throughout Europe, Africa, Latin America, the Middle East and Asia. In addition, he writes a column that appears in *Newsweek* (USA), *Newsweek International* and often, *The Washington Post*, making it one of the most widely circulated columns of its kind in the world.

The Indian-born Zakaria is co-editor of *The American Encounter: The United States and the Making of the Modern World* and author of *From Wealth to Power*, a provocative examination of America's role on the world stage that received glowing reviews.

He has appeared on such programs as Charlie Rose, Firing Line, The NewsHour with Jim Lehrer, The McLaughlin Group, the BBC World News, and Meet the Press. A recipient of the Overseas Press Club Award and a National Magazine Award nomination, Zakaria writes frequently for such publications as *The New York Times*, *The New Yorker*, and *The Wall Street Journal*.
