Greg Mortenson

Greg Mortenson is co-founder of the nonprofit Central Asia Institute (www.ikat.org), founder of Pennies For Peace (www.penniesforpeace.org), and co-author of *The New York Times* bestseller "Three Cups of Tea" (www.threecupsoftea.com). The book has been a *New York Times* bestseller since its 2007 release. In addition, it was selected as *Time* magazine's Asia Book of The Year. Mortenson's new book, "Stones into Schools: Promoting Peace with Books, Not Bombs, in Afghanistan and Pakistan," debuted as #2 on *The New York Times* bestseller list.

As of 2010, Mortenson has established more than 131 schools in rural and often volatile regions of Pakistan and Afghanistan, providing education to over 58,000 children, including 48,000 girls, where few education opportunities existed before.

In 2009, Mortenson received Pakistan's highest civil award, Sitara-e-Pakistan ("Star of Pakistan") for his humanitarian effort to promote girls education in rural areas for fifteen years.

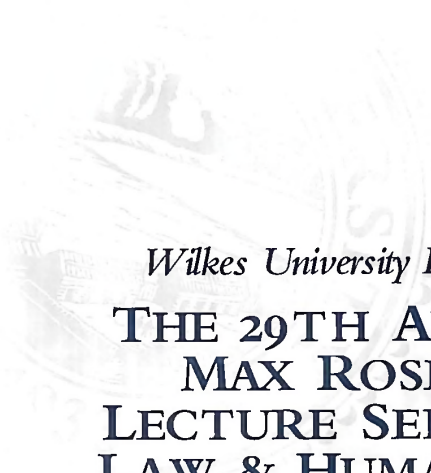
Mortenson was born in 1957 and grew up on the slopes of Mt. Kilimanjaro, Tanzania (1958–1973). His father, Dempsey, founded Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre (www.kcmc.ac.tz), a hospital, and his mother, Jerene, founded the International School Moshi.

In July 1992, Mortenson's sister Christa died from a massive seizure after a lifelong struggle with epilepsy. To honor his sister's memory, in 1993 Mortenson climbed Pakistan's K2, the world's second-highest mountain, located in the Karakoram range.

While recovering from the climb in a village called Korphe, Mortenson met a group of children sitting in the dirt writing with sticks in the sand. He made a promise to help them build a school.

From that rash promise grew a humanitarian campaign in which Mortenson has dedicated his life to promote education, especially for girls, in remote regions of Pakistan and Afghanistan.

U.S. Admiral Michael C. Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has advised senior U.S. military commanders to read "Three Cups of Tea." It is mandatory reading for officers in the Norwegian War College, U.S. Special Forces deploying to Afghanistan, U.S. Marines training at Camp Lejeune, officers in counterinsurgency training, and Canadian Defense Ministry members.



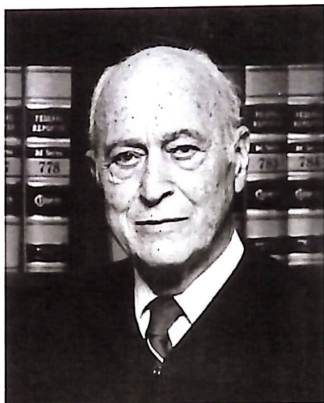

Judge Max Rosenn's long career as a public servant spanned many fields, including law, philanthropy, public welfare, health and religion. He made innumerable contributions to the enhancement of northeastern Pennsylvania, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. Following the Hurricane Agnes Disaster of 1972, he played a vital role in the rehabilitation of Greater Wilkes-Barre and its many neighboring communities as chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

After receiving an undergraduate degree from Cornell University and a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn commenced his legal career. He interrupted that career to enter military service in World War II. After several years in the South Pacific, he returned to his wife and sons and resumed the practice of law. He entered state government in 1966 as secretary of public welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As secretary, Judge Rosenn also served as a member of the cabinet of Governor William W. Scranton and in the cabinet of his successor, Raymond Shafer, and as chairman of the Governor's Council for Human Services. Following his resignation as secretary and resumption of the practice of law, he served as chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and chairman of the Legislative Executive Task Force to Restructure Human Services for Pennsylvania. He also served as a member of the 1968 Governor's Commission to Revise the Public Employee Laws of Pennsylvania. President Nixon appointed him to the United States Court of Appeals in 1970.

He and his late wife, Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Professor Keith and Dr. Daniel, and six grandchildren.

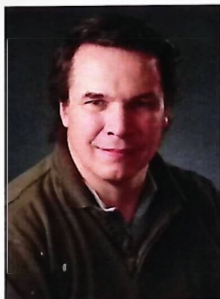
