**THE HONORABLE
MAX ROSENN**

*Judge
U.S. Court of Appeals*

The Honorable Max Rosenn has served as Judge of the United States Court of Appeals, Third Circuit, for more than fifteen years. In recognition of his tenth anniversary on the bench and his numerous contributions to the U.S. judiciary system

and to the quality of life in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the judge's former law clerks, friends and family established **The Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.**

A native of the Wyoming Valley, Judge Rosenn was born in Plains (Pa.) and currently resides in Kingston with his wife Tillie.

Throughout his career he has made innumerable contributions to the enrichment of the region. His service has spanned many fields, including law, education, health, religion and public welfare.

A member of the Wilkes College Board of Trustees since 1970, Judge Rosenn received his undergraduate degree from Cornell University and his LL.B. from the University of Pennsylvania. He also did post-graduate work at the University of California at Berkeley, and the University of Michigan.

The prominent and highly respected court official is a member of the American, Federal, and Pennsylvania Bar Associations; a Fellow of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers; a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers; and a member of the American Law Institute. He is a founding member of the Council of the American Society of Law and Medicine, and an associate editor of the American Journal of Law and Medicine.

The former Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is a Life Member of both the Jewish Community Center, where he serves as a trustee, and the Wyoming Valley Jewish Committee. Following the flood of 1972, Judge Rosenn served his community as chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

BETTINA GREGORY

Bettina Gregory was named ABC News' Senior General Assignment Correspondent in April, 1980. Based in Washington, she covers a variety of major national news stories for ABC Television programming and for the six ABC Radio networks.

In addition to covering major regular agencies, Gregory has reported on the Challenger investigation; the Chernobyl nuclear disaster and its impact on the American nuclear industry; the TWA terrorist bombing; and issues of airline safety in the wake of the Arrow Air crash.

Gregory joined ABC News in December, 1974, as a correspondent with the American FM Radio Network. Since that time, she has served as ABC's Military Affairs Correspondent (1977), covering the Pentagon; as Federal Regulatory Agencies Correspondent (1978-79), reporting on the Three Mile Island nuclear accident and the Love Canal hazardous waste investigation; and as White House Correspondent (1979-80), covering the Iranian hostage crisis for ABC's "World News Tonight," "Good Morning America" News, and "Nightline," and tracking President Carter's 1980 presidential campaign.

Gregory has been recognized for journalistic excellence with numerous awards. In 1983, she was named one of America's Top Ten Investigative Reporters by TV Guide; and in 1979, she received the Women In Communications Clarion Award and the National Commission on Working Women's Women at Work Award for excellence in reporting.

Her career in journalism includes positions as reporter and anchorwoman for WCBS Radio; free-lance newscaster for the NBC Radio Network in New York; free-lance reporter for the New York Times; and writer for the Associated Press.

Gregory was educated at Smith College in Northampton, Massachusetts; at the Webber-Douglas Academy of Dramatic Art in London, England; and at Pierce College in Athens, Greece, where she graduated summa cum laude with a B.A. degree in Psychology and English.

**HENRY STEELE
COMMAGER**

Dr. Henry Steele Commager is the John Woodruff Simpson Lecturer at Amherst College.

Professor Commager earned his bachelor's, master's, and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Chicago. From 1926 to 1938 he was a member of the faculty at New York University before going to Columbia University where he taught from 1938 to 1959. Since 1956 he has taught primarily at Amherst College.

He has been Pitt Professor of American History at Cambridge University, Harmsworth Professor of American History at Oxford University, and Gotesman Professor at Upsala University. He was Watson Lecturer at London University, and Visiting Professor of American History at the University of Copenhagen in 1955-56. He has been Visiting Professor at M.I.T., Indiana University and University of Chicago. He inaugurated the Bullitt Professorship at the University of Washington, and has lectured at universities in Latin America, Japan, Israel, and most of the countries of Western Europe.

Since 1966 he has been a member of the National Academy of Arts and Letters, which awarded him its Gold Medal for History in 1972. During World War II and after he served on the War Department's Committee on the History of the War.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and of many professional organizations, and is an Honorary Fellow of Peterhouse, Cambridge. Dr. Commager holds honorary degrees from forty-four colleges and universities here and abroad.

Among his publications are: *Growth of the American Republic* (with Samuel Eliot Morison, 1931/78); *Theodore Parker* (1936); *Majority Rule and Minority Rights* (1943); *The American Mind* (1951); *The Commonwealth of Learning* (1968); *Britain Through American Eyes* (1974); and *The Empire of Reason* (1977).
