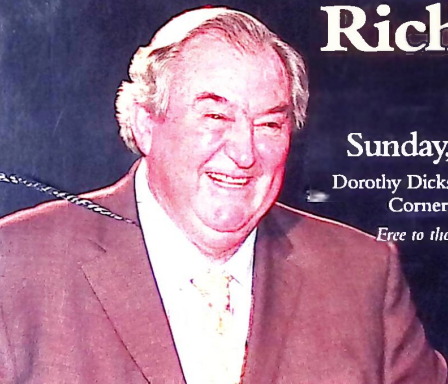

Richard E. Leakey

A global thinker, influential environmentalist and the world's best-known paleoanthropologist, Richard Leakey has been making international headlines for more than 30 years.

As former director of the National Museum of Kenya and the Kenya Wildlife Service, Leakey has used his leadership skills and influence to raise money for wildlife preservation. Now a Visiting Professor of Anthropology at Stony Brook University, Leakey, one of the foremost authorities on wildlife and nature conservation, continues to educate others about the dangers of environmental degradation.

Leakey received the 2003 Earthwatch Institute Conservation Award for his efforts on behalf of sustainable development. He also was awarded the Humane Society's Joseph Wood Krutch Medal for his contributions to improve the environment.

Leakey has served his native Kenya as a senior government official, opposition political activist, conservationist, museum director, scientific researcher and farmer. He became Director of the Kenya Wildlife Service in 1989 and led a movement to end elephant poaching in Africa that all but eliminated the international ivory trade. He resigned in 1994, declaring that corruption had undermined the organization.

Despite constant government-sponsored verbal and physical attacks and a plane crash that claimed both of his legs, Leakey continued to fight, establishing the political party Safina to unify the opposition to President Daniel arap Moi. In 1999 he was appointed Head of the Civil Service and Secretary of the Cabinet. Heated conflicts between Leakey and the Kenyan government arose once again and he was forced to step down. Yet his influence remained. In 2002 he supported the historic presidential election victory of opposition candidate Mwai Kibaki, signaling a new day in Kenya's future and its fight for democracy.

Dr. Leakey has been profiled on *60 Minutes* and was named one of *TIME* magazine's 100 Greatest Minds of the 20th Century. He recently founded WildlifeDirect, an online charity which provides support to conservationists via the use of blogs. Thanks to Richard Leakey, now anybody, anywhere can play a direct and interactive role in the survival of some of the world's most precious species.

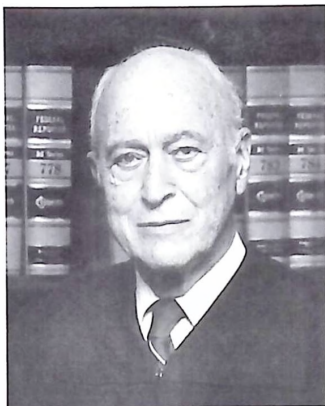
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The Honorable Max Rosenn



**THE HONORABLE

Judge Max Rosenn's long career as a public servant spanned many fields, including law, philanthropy, public welfare, health, and religion. He made innumerable contributions to the enhancement of Northeastern Pennsylvania, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. Following the Hurricane Agnes Disaster of 1972, he played a vital role in the rehabilitation of Greater Wilkes-Barre and its many neighboring communities as Chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

After receiving an undergraduate degree from Cornell University and a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn commenced his legal career. He interrupted that career to enter military service in World War II. After several years in the South Pacific, he returned to his wife and sons and resumed the practice of law. He entered state government in 1966 as Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As Secretary, Judge Rosenn also served as a member of the cabinet of Governor William W. Scranton and in the cabinet of his successor, Raymond Shafer, and as Chairman of the Governor's Council for Human Services. Following his resignation as Secretary and resumption of the practice of law, he served as Chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and Chairman of the Legislative Executive Task Force to Restructure Human Services for Pennsylvania. He also served as a member of the 1968 Governor's Commission to Revise the Public Employee Laws of Pennsylvania. President Nixon appointed him to the United States Court of Appeals in 1970.

He and his late wife, Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Professor Keith, Dr. Daniel, and six grandchildren.

In recognition of his exceptional contributions and his warm relationship with them, Judge Rosenn's former law clerks and former law firm Rosenn, Jenkins & Greenwald, with the assistance of his family and friends, established in 1980 the Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.

Guest Speaker

RICHARD LEAKEY

Paleoanthropologist | Conservationist | Activist

Richard Leakey and the Leakey family are credited with changing our notions of evolution and human origins. Beginning in the 1950s, their discovery of 3 million year old remains of our earliest human ancestors at Olduvai Gorge, Tanzania, launched a gold rush of anthropological expeditions that have defined Africa as the birthplace of human kind.



Leakey's efforts with paleoanthropology involved not only field research and discoveries but also many years serving as director of the National Museums of Kenya (NMK). Together with a team from the NMK, Leakey led an expedition to the shores of Kenya's Lake Turkana where early Stone Age tools and human skulls, including the nearly complete 1.6-million-year-old skeleton "Turkana Boy" were discovered.

"In the second half of the twentieth century, the discoveries of Richard Leakey and his family produced a quantum leap of evidence toward unraveling the mystery of our human origins," said Wilkes professor of sociology and anthropology James Merryman who, along with his wife, conducted dissertation research in Kenya in affiliation with the Kenya Museums and Richard Leakey its distinguished director. "We are fortunate, indeed, to have a scholar of Leakey's stature at this year's Rosenn Lecture," he said.

As head of the Kenya Wildlife Services, Leakey successfully combated elephant and rhino poaching and oversaw a reorganization of Kenya's troubled national park system. In addition to his passion for conservation, Leakey became involved in Kenya politics, serving as secretary general of Kenya opposition party Safina. In 1997, he was elected to an opposition seat in the Kenya parliament.

His political career culminated in 1999 when he was appointed head of Kenya's Civil Service and tackled management, corruption and reorganization issues within the Kenyan government.

The author of many books on human origins and environmental protection, Leakey is a visiting professor in the department of anthropology at Stony Brook University, where he has established the Stony Brook World Environmental Forum to focus scientific attention on the urgent problems impacting the global environment, and to mobilize the resources of intergovernment agencies and international corporations for conservation.

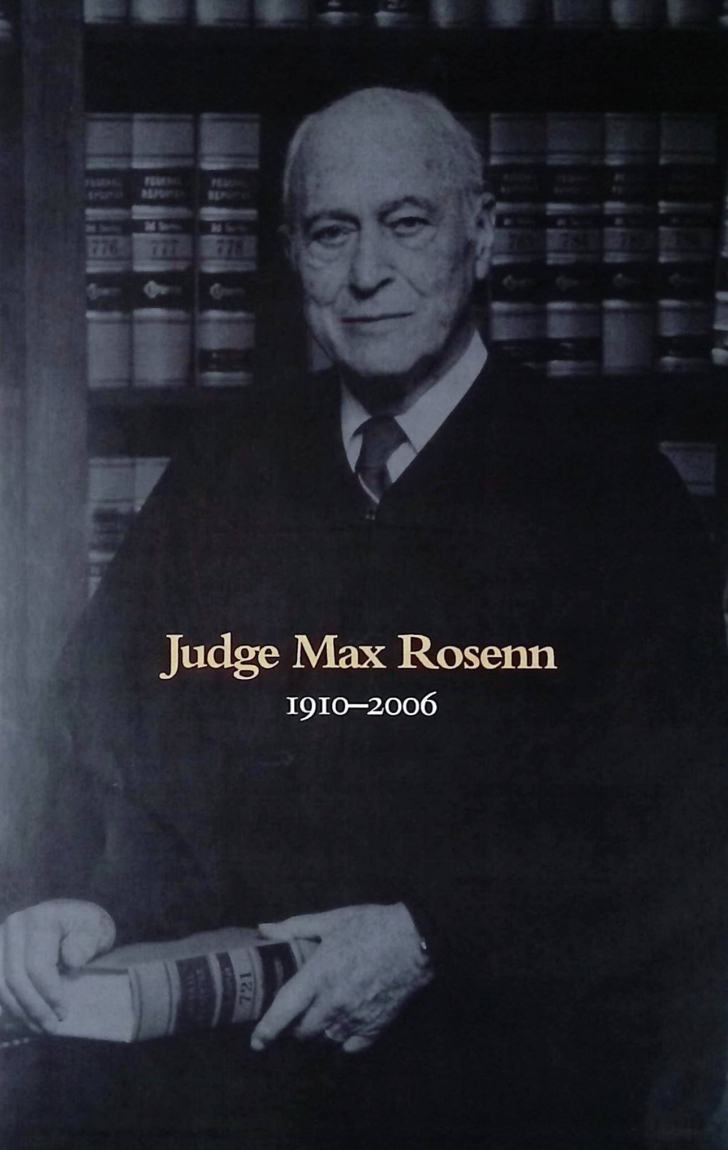

DANIEL W. ROSENN, MD

Daniel Rosenn, MD graduated from Amherst College in 1964 and received his MD from Stanford University School of Medicine in 1969. He completed post graduate training in Pediatrics at the University of Minnesota, and a Fellowship in Behavioral Pediatrics at Harvard Medical School. He was also awarded a Masters degree in Public Health from the Harvard School of Public Health. He completed residencies in General Psychiatry at McLean Hospital and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Boston's Beth Israel Hospital.

Dr. Rosenn is the past Head of Child Psychiatry at Beth Israel Hospital and former Associate Director of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at McLean Hospital. He has written book chapters and journal articles on a variety of subjects, including psychiatric emergencies, childhood suicide, and Asperger's Syndrome. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, and is on the faculty of Harvard Medical School. He is the Medical Director of North American Family Institute, a multi-state, non profit psychiatric organization. He has a practice in general psychiatry in Wellesley, MA where he specializes in autistic spectrum disorders.

RICHARD L. GELFOND

Richard L. Gelfond is Co-Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer of IMAX Corporation, the pioneer and leader of the large-format theatre and film industry. IMAX has over 280 theatres in 35 countries, produces and distributes numerous films each year and has won an Academy Award for Scientific and Technical Achievement.

Prior to acquiring IMAX in 1994, Mr. Gelfond specialized in leveraged buyouts and venture capital investments, where he helped many businesses grow through his unique entrepreneurial and management skills, as well as introducing companies to new sources of capital. Earlier in his career, he was involved in retail management and investment banking, and also served as a corporate attorney specializing in mergers and acquisitions. Mr. Gelfond started his career in 1979 as a law clerk for the Honorable Max Rosenn of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit.
