Ambassador Richard Schifter

Richard Schifter was born in Vienna, Austria, in 1923, and came to the United States in 1938. He graduated summa cum laude from the College of the City of New York in 1943. A lawyer by profession, he earned the L.L.B. from Yale Law School in 1951 and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

Schifter was appointed by President Reagan in 1983 as United States Representative to the United Nations Human Rights Commission and in June, 1984, as Deputy United States Representative to the United Nations.

Prior to his prestigious appointment to the United States Mission to the U.N., Ambassador Schifter was a partner in the Washington, D.C. office of the law firm of Fried, Frank, Harris, Shriver and Kampelman. He joined the firm shortly after receiving his L.L.B. from Yale and chose, for his special field, Administrative Law. He is well-known for his expertise in Federal Indian Law, having served as counsel for American Indian tribes. His writings include: *Trends in Federal Indian Administration*; *Indian Reservation Development: Reality or Myth*; *Healing v. Jones: Mandate for Another Trail of Tears?*

For many years Ambassador Schifter was active in the educational affairs of his home state of Maryland. His service encompasses twenty years on the Maryland Board of Education, including eight years as the Board's Vice President and four years as its President. He also served on the Executive Committee of the Board of Visitors for the Maryland School for the Deaf, as Chairman of the Governor's Commission for the Funding of the Education of Handicapped Children, and as Chairman of the Maryland Values Education Commission.

Ambassador Schifter has also served on the National Board of Governors for the American Jewish Committee, on the Publication Committee of the magazine *COMMENTARY*, and as President of the Jewish Institute for National Security Affairs. He is a member of the United States Holocaust Council.

The Honorable Max Rosenn has served as Judge of the United States Court of Appeals, Third Circuit, for more than a decade. In recognition of his tenth anniversary on the bench and his numerous contributions to the U.S. judiciary system

and to the quality of life in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the judge's former law clerks, friends and family established **The Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.**

A native of the Wyoming Valley, Judge Rosenn was born in Plains (Pa.) and currently resides in Kingston with his wife Tillie.

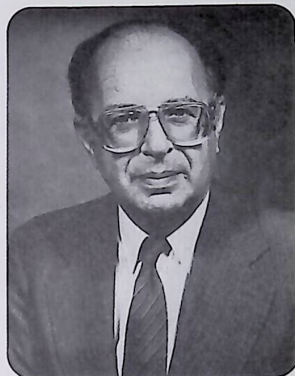
Throughout his career he has made innumerable contributions to the enrichment of the region. His contributions have spanned many fields, including law, education, health, religion and public welfare.

A member of the Wilkes College Board of Trustees since 1970, Judge Rosenn received his undergraduate degree from Cornell University and his LL.B. from the University of Pennsylvania. He also did post-graduate work at the University of California at Berkeley, and the University of Michigan.

The prominent and highly respected court official is a member of the American, Federal, and Pennsylvania Bar Associations; a consultant for the Pennsylvania Supreme Court Committee on Criminal Procedural Rules; a Fellow of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers; a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers; and a member of the American Law Institute. He is a founding member of the Council of the American Society of Law and Medicine, and an associate editor of the American Journal of Law and Medicine.

The former Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is a Life Member of both the Jewish Community Center, where he serves as a trustee, and the Wyoming Valley Jewish Committee. Following the flood of 1972, Judge Rosenn served his community as chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.
