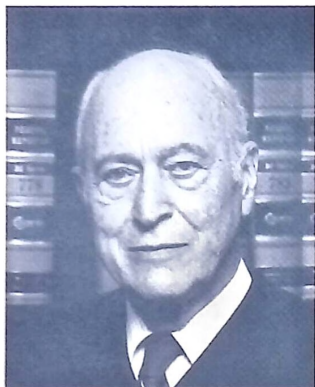

The Honorable Max Rosenn



THE HONORABLE MAX ROSENN
Senior Judge
United States Court of Appeals

Judge Max Rosenn's long career as a public servant has spanned many fields, including law, philanthropy, public welfare, health, and religion. He has made innumerable contributions to the enhancement of Northeastern Pennsylvania, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. Following the Hurricane Agnes Disaster of 1972, he played a vital role in the rehabilitation of Greater Wilkes-Barre and its many neighboring communities as Chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

After receiving an undergraduate degree from Cornell University and a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn commenced his legal career. He interrupted that career to enter military service in World War II. After several years in the South Pacific, he returned to his wife and sons and resumed the practice of law. He entered state government in 1966 as Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As Secretary, Judge Rosenn also served as a member of the cabinet of Governor William W. Scranton and in the cabinet of his successor, Raymond Shafer, and as Chairman of the Governor's Council for Human Services. Following his resignation as Secretary and resumption of the practice of law, he served as Chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and Chairman of the Legislative Executive Task Force to Restructure Human Services for Pennsylvania. He also served as a member of the 1968 Governor's Commission to Revise the Public Employee Laws of Pennsylvania. President Nixon appointed him to the United States Court of Appeals in 1970, in which capacity he still serves.

He and his late wife, Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Professor Keith, Dr. Daniel, and six grandchildren.

In recognition of his exceptional contributions and his warm relationship with them, Judge Rosenn's law clerks, with the assistance of his family and friends, established in 1980 the Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities.

Guest Speaker - Robin Wright

ROBIN WRIGHT
Renowned Journalist and Foreign Affairs expert
"The Future of Iraq and its Impact on
Islamic Extremists"



Robin Wright has reported from more than a 130 countries on six continents for *The Los Angeles Times*, *The Sunday Times of London*, *CBS News*, *The Washington Post* and *The Christian Science Monitor*. She has also written for *The New Yorker*, *The Atlantic Monthly*, *Foreign Affairs*, *Foreign Policy*, *The New York Times*, *The International Herald Tribune* and many others. Her foreign tours include five years in the Middle East, two years in Europe, seven years in Africa, and several years as a roving foreign correspondent in those areas as well as Latin America and Asia. Wright has covered a dozen wars and several revolutions. After several years as Global Affairs correspondent for *The Los Angeles Times*, she became chief diplomatic correspondent in 2000. In 2001, she won the Weintal Prize for "the most distinguished diplomatic reporting."

Wright won the 1989 National Magazine Award for her reportage from Iran in *The New Yorker*. She also won the Overseas Press Club Award for "best reporting in any medium requiring exceptional courage and initiative" for coverage of African wars. And she is the recipient of a John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation grant.

Besides a long career in journalism, Wright was a fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, Yale University, Duke University, Stanford University, the University of California at Santa Barbara and the University of Southern California. She also lectures extensively around the United States, in Europe and Asia, and has been a television commentator for all the major U.S. television networks.

Wright's latest book is "The Last Great Revolution: Turmoil and Transformation in Iran," released in 2000. It was selected as one of the 25 most memorable books of the year 2000. Her earlier book "Sacred Rage: The Wrath of Militant Islam," was reissued in November 2001 with updated chapters from her travels in Afghanistan and running through the Sept. 11 attacks. She is also the author of "Flashpoints: Promise and Peril in a New World," co-authored with Doyle McManus, which has been translated into six languages and "In the Name of God: The Khomeini Decade."
