T. BERRY BRAZELTON, M.D.

Dr. Brazelton graduated in 1943 from Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, then held a medical internship there. After active duty as a Navy physician, he served his pediatric residency at Massachusetts General Hospital followed by further pediatric work at Children's Hospital in Boston. His interest in child development led to training in child psychiatry and he subsequently served as a Fellow at the Center for Cognitive Studies, Harvard University. His dual interests — primary care pediatrics and child psychiatry — culminated in 1972 when he co-established the Child Development Unit, a pediatric training and research center at Children's Hospital.

Recipient of many awards and honorary degrees, author of 22 books on pediatrics and child development, Dr. Brazelton has published over 180 scientific papers. His research focuses on: individual differences among newborns and the contribution of the neonate to the parent-infant dyad; development of attachment over the first four months between parent and infant; cross-cultural studies of infant behavior and early parental practices; importance of early intervention with at-risk infants and their parents; opportunities presented in early infancy for strengthening families.

His award-winning cable television show, "What Every Baby Knows" has been broadcast on Lifetime for over six years. Dr. Brazelton contributes to *Family Circle* magazine and writes a weekly column syndicated by *The New York Times*.

Recently, concern about the pressures for today's families led to his frequent Congressional committee appearances to support parental-medical leave bills and more comprehensive day care. As a co-founder of Parent Action, he tries to do for parents what AARP does for the elderly, and through work on the U.S. Senate's National Commission on Children, he strongly advocates for disadvantaged children.

One of Dr. Brazelton's primary achievements is his Neonatal Assessment Scale. Known as "the Brazelton", this procedure is used worldwide to assess physical and neurological responses of newborns as well as their individual differences and emotional well-being. Dr. Brazelton holds appointments as Clinical Professor of Pediatrics Emeritus at Harvard Medical School and Professor of Psychiatry and Human Development at Brown University. He is also an active member of the Child Development Unit at Boston's Children's Hospital, where he continues his research, clinical, and teaching activities.

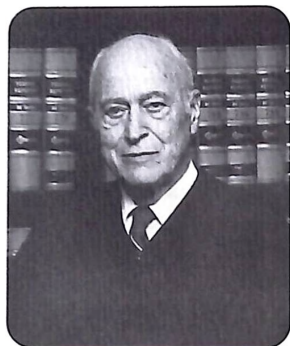

The Honorable Max Rosenn, Senior Judge of the United States Court of Appeals, Third Circuit, has made innumerable contributions to the enrichment of the region, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. In recognition of his exceptional contributions, the Judge's former law clerks, family, and friends established **The Max Rosenn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities** in November 1980.

Judge Rosenn and his wife Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Keith and Daniel, and six grandchildren. After receiving his undergraduate degree from Cornell University and his LL.B. from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn returned to the area to begin his legal career. Upon concluding military service in the South Pacific during World War II, he resumed the practice of law for another twenty-five years until his appointment to the Court of Appeals. President Nixon appointed him to the federal judiciary on October 7, 1970; last year marked Judge Rosenn's twentieth anniversary on the bench.

Throughout his career as a public servant, Judge Rosenn's contributions have spanned many fields, including law, government, public welfare, education, health, and religion.

The former Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and Chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission is a life member and trustee of the Jewish Community Center. Since 1970, Judge Rosenn has also served as a trustee of Wilkes University and, following the flood of 1972, aided his community as chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

Judge Rosenn is a member of the American, Federal, and Pennsylvania Bar Associations; a Fellow of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers and the American College of Trial Lawyers, a member of the American Judicature Society, and of the American Law Institute. He is a founding member of the Council of the American Society of Law and Medicine and was an associate editor of the American Journal of Law and Medicine. Judge Rosenn holds a number of honorary degrees and has received numerous public service awards.
