TOM J. FARER, J.D.

As Professor and Director of The American University's joint degree program in Law and International Relations, Dr. Farer has specialized on the issues of intervention by the international community in behalf of humanitarian causes in nations suffering deadly civil strife. He has been involved in Somalia off and on for more than three decades. During the present crisis, he has been an important voice in evaluating the appropriate strategy and tactics to be adopted by the world community, through the United Nations and other agencies, to stop the starvation and foster development of a viable government. His topic for the Rosenn Lecture is "Philanthropy with Bayonets: The Lessons of Somalia."

Professor Farer graduated Magna Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa from the Woodrow Wilson School of Princeton University in 1957. He was a Fulbright Scholar in the United Kingdom in 1957-1958 and graduated from the Harvard Law School, Magna Cum Laude, in 1961. He was Clerk Designate for Judge Learned Hand in 1961-1962. He served in programs with U.S.A.I.D. and with the Department of Defense before beginning an academic career at Columbia Law School from 1966 to 1971, followed by thirteen years of teaching at the Rutgers University School of Law. During these years he was actively involved with Inter-American Affairs and Human Rights through the Organization of American States. He served for one year as President of the University of New Mexico, before taking on his present responsibilities at the American University in Washington, D.C. He has been a visiting professor at Tulane Law School, Harvard Law School, Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, and Princeton University.

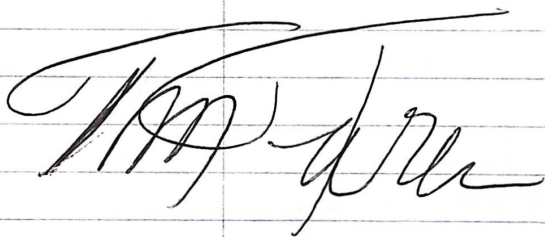

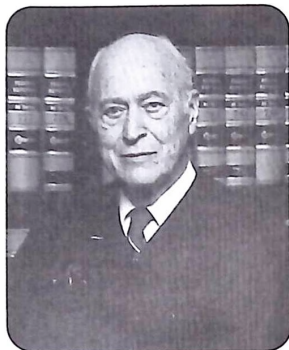

The Honorable Max Rosenn, Senior Judge of the United States Court of Appeals, Third Circuit, has made innumerable contributions to the enrichment of the region, to state government, and to the federal judiciary. In recognition of his exceptional contributions, the Judge's former law clerks, family, and friends established **The Max Ro-**

senn Lecture Series in Law and Humanities in November 1980.

Judge Rosenn and his late wife Tillie, lifetime residents of the Wyoming Valley, have two sons, Keith and Daniel, and six grandchildren. After receiving his undergraduate degree from Cornell University and his LL.B. from the University of Pennsylvania, Judge Rosenn returned to the area to begin his legal career. Upon concluding military service in the South Pacific during World War II, he resumed the practice of law for another twenty-five years until his appointment to the Court of Appeals. President Nixon appointed him to the federal judiciary on October 7, 1970; 1993 marks Judge Rosenn's twenty-third year on the bench.

Throughout his career as a public servant, Judge Rosenn's contributions have spanned many fields, including law, government, public welfare, education, health, and religion.

The former Secretary of Public Welfare for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and Chairman of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission is a life member and trustee of the Jewish Community Center. Since 1970, Judge Rosenn has also served as a trustee of Wilkes University and, following the flood of 1972, aided his community as chairman of the Flood Recovery Task Force for Wyoming Valley.

Judge Rosenn is a member of the American, Federal, and Pennsylvania Bar Associations; a Fellow of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers and the American College of Trial Lawyers, a member of the American Judicature Society, and of the American Law Institute. He is a founding member of the Council of the American Society of Law and Medicine and was an associate editor of the American Journal of Law and Medicine. Judge Rosenn holds a number of honorary degrees and has received numerous public service awards.
