July 4,

1865

Celebration at Wilkes-Barre, Penna.

At Sunrise a National Salute will be fired by a section of Artillery under charge of Lieut. E. W. Koch. The Sextons of the respective Churches and the person in charge of the Court House are requested to ring a merry peal for half an hour.

The Procession will be formed at 10 o'clock A. M. on River Street, right resting on South, headed by the Police Force under its Acting Chief, being composed of Four Grand Divisions.

County Officers, the Burgess and Town Council, and citizens on foot, in carriages and on horseback. They will report to Col. Bowman on River Street, at the corner of Market.

Upon the arrival of the Cars at the several Depots, Visiting Companies and Associations will be escorted to town. Commanding Officers and Foremen of Companies will report to the Marshals of their respective Divisions, when their places in line will be promptly assigned them.

At half past ten o'clock the Procession will move down River to South, up South to Franklin, up Franklin to Union, down Union to River, down River to Market, up Market to the Public Square, up Main to Union, up Union to Washington, down Washington to South, down South to Main, up Main to the Square, around the Square to the Court House.
