CITIZENSTOWN, (South Carolina) September 22. SINCE our last, we have had no direct advices from either of the armies engaged upon the Southern expedition. As we certainly know, that that Count D'Ere at Beaufort, nearly opposite to the Orphan House, 12 miles from Savannah, in the night between the 11th and 12th communication had been opened between him and General Lincoln; that General Lincoln had been joined by General McIntosh; and that the Head Quarters of our army, a week ago, were at Cherokee Hill 9 miles from Savannah: That General Count Pulaski was advanced Picket of the enemy, but also surprised one of their captains and three privates at Ebenezer; That Col. Maitland had abandoned Port Royal Island, with the whole the transports for the cannon, and having buried upwards of 200 negroes, leaving behind also 300 negroes, for want of ready help, on board the Vigilante, was made from other small craft, with an intent to pull through it is doubted, whether he has been able at Savannah; But, further, it is rather believed, that his vessels are blocked up in Skull Creek, and his troops confined to Hilton-

"We reached here yesterday, are to cross Savannah river this day (to-night), and support Hull going to Lincoln's army to-morrow. The news from the other General is chiefly as follows, and you have it as I, to wit, that Count d'Esling had landed two detachments, one at Brewton's plantation, with 36 pieces of brass cannon, and another at Girardeau's point: That the active and enterprising General Count Pulaski, with the cavalry, had thoroughly cleared the way, and broke up all the enemy's advanced posts, as to afford Major General Lincoln the opportunity of an interview with the French General, at the Orphan house, on the 16th, when and where the plans of operations was settled: That some of the French men of war had got into the harbour, and possessed themselves of all the British shipping below Brewton's, amongst them the *Forty* man of war, which, tho' grounded, had been got off and into the fleet: That the fortifications at Savannah were but trifling, consisting only of 9 redoubts (no forts) and abattis: That the force to defend these consisted of about 8000 regulars, and 1200 militia, refugees, and provincial gentry: That Sir James Wright, Governor, &c. was in Savannah: That Col. Maitland had not been able to effect a junction with General Prevost, and was supposed had been repulsed in an attempt to get thro' Skull creek, yesterday morning, when we heard a heavy cannonade: That the enemy's soldiery, in general were much dissatisfied; and tho' it was pretended, that Savannah would be defended, even the officers gave their opinions publicly, that it must capitulate: And that General Prevost had applied to the Count d'Esling, for a safe conduct and permission to remove his lady, plate and effects, to Florida: to which the gallant French General politely replied, "That it was impossible he could have any objection to what concerned the Lady; but the plate, he had been informed, was obtained in such a way, from the Allies of his King, that he was confident the General could not mean to disgrace himself with keeping possession of it."

B O S T O N, October 11.

The New-England post informs, that a small vessel had arrived there direct from Barragat, with certain intelligence that a privateer had brought in there one of the enemy's transports, with 205 Helions.—The transport was bound to Halifax, but meeting with bad winds and considerable damage in the late weather, was returning to New-York.

Evening an express arrived in town, from our illustrious Commander in Chief, to the Hon. the General Assembly of this State, by which we can further assure our readers of His Excellency Count D'Eulenburg's arrival of Georgia, and that his approach to the Northward may be hourly looked for.

N O R W I C H, October 12

King, of this town, in a privateer brig of twelve guns, arrived at New London, from a short cruise; during which he took a transport ship of 200 tons bound for Holland, from New York to Quebec, having on board seventy men.
