I rec^d yours this day by Mr. Raghins, with the list of names, some of which I do not approve of, if it is possible to have them changed I should think it best. I am very much pleased to see your attention to this business & hope you may have your reward - you mentioned in your respecting money, we are taking steps to collect as soon as possible - since I am here we have had a meeting of the county Committee, or Committee - we have agreed to raise two hundred & thirty five pounds in addition to the former tax.
