Subseries I: Foreign Rulers, 1549-1906, is arranged by country/region of origin alphabetically and spans the 16th to 20th century. Countries/regions that are represented include Austria, France, Germany, the Holy Roman Empire, Italy, the Netherlands, Russia, Spain, and the United Kingdom. Within each country/region, documents are arranged chronologically by creation date. This subseries contains documents from foreign rulers with significant influence such as kings, queens, emperors, empresses, princes, princesses, dukes, duchesses, and prime ministers. These individuals were selected for this subseries based on the significant extent of influence that they had in their country/region. Documents represented within this subseries include royal writs, royal decrees, royal warrants, payment orders, military promotion decrees, letters, envelopes, autographs, signatures, a printed summons, a parliamentary notice, a telegraph, and a dinner program. This collection contains correspondence in English, French, Italian, Czech, Dutch, German, and Russian. Each item within the collection has the language marked in its header.

Themes and subjects represented within the subseries include official documents from foreign rulers conducting official political, military, and/or financial business. Examples include prisoner releases, payments of wages, debt repayments, military promotions, approvals of military leaves of absences, and ambassador appointments. These official royal documents appear to generally be written by royal secretaries or ministers and simply signed by the authorizing nobles. Some examples of countersignatures include those of [Hugues de Lionne](#) (French Minister of Foreign Affairs), [Marc Pierre de Voyer de Paulmy Count of Argenson](#) (French Secretary of State for War), [Arnaud II de la Porte](#) (French Intendant of the King's Civil List), [Granville George Leveson-Gower](#) (British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs), among others. This subseries contains several personal letters between royals that mention the births and deaths of members of the families as the line of succession was a very large concern for ruling families. Several documents within the subseries are related to the reign of [Napoleon Bonaparte \[Napoleon I\]](#) and the [French Revolutionary and Napoleonic Wars](#). Some documents are written by members of the Bonaparte family (such [Prince Lucien Murat](#) and [Joseph Bonaparte, "Comte de Survilliers"](#)) while living in exile in the United States. According to one document, the creator believes that many Europeans would be happy to live in the United States in [French Azilum](#). Documents within this subseries highlight shifting powers within the represented countries such as the unification of the United Kingdom, the emergence of a Prime Minister in the United Kingdom, and the abolition of a monarchy in France.

2.1 Item 1: List and Signature by Le Prince [Klemens von] de [Metternich](#) [Italian/French language], 1817-1856.

Type of Material: List/signature

Title: N/A

Description: The following item is a list written in Italian and French [signed](#) by [Metternich, Clemens Wenzel Lothar, Fürst von, 1773-1859](#) sometime after 1817 and before 1856. The list seems to be a collection of art pieces, books, and maps followed by a note after each. Some of these notes involve a sum of [paoli](#) afterward, a form of Italian currency that was removed from common use in 1856. The first three pieces are artwork. The first is a painting of [Santo Campo](#), a monumental cemetery in [Pisa, Italy](#) well known for frescos, sarcophagi, and chapels, followed by a price of 400 Paoli. The second is presumably an [illustration](#) of the Royal Gallery of Florence, currently known as the [Uffizi](#), which holds works from Raphael, Botticelli, da Vinci, and Michelangelo. The third piece is a picture compilation of a journey through [Tuscany](#), in northern Italy, such as [this](#). This is followed by the [Divine Comedy](#), a historical poem by [Dante Alighieri](#), next to which is the word “letto”, suggesting that he had read the book or is planning to read the book. The next piece is the writings of Altieri, possibly referring to pieces by poet/playwright [Vittorio Alfieri](#) or [pieces](#) by musician [Paolo Altieri](#). This is followed by a French liturgical book, presumably regarding communal prayer. The final two items are a map of Italy and a small map of Italy, both of which are written in French, rather than Italian, like in the rest of the list. This list may have been a list of items purchased by Metternich, a receipt, or a to-do list. Metternich was a German prince of the [Austrian Empire](#) and was integral to the [Congress of Vienna](#). He served as an ambassador, the foreign minister of Austria, and the [Chancellor of the Austrian Empire](#) in his life. During his office, he stamped out many nationalist revolts in [northern Italy](#), still under Austrian rule at the time. He appreciated the arts, particularly music, and was acquainted with composers such as [Joseph Haydn](#), [Ludwig van Beethoven](#), and [Franz Liszt](#). He often [visited](#) Italy and this list may have been a way for him to acquaint himself with more Italian culture and language, as the [Divine Comedy](#) and the locations the portraits show are key components of Italian history and culture.

2.2. Item 2: Royal Decree by Alexandre Édouard, Duke of Anjou [Future King Henry III] [French Language], 1568 (**Removed to Black Box #1**)

Type of Material: Royal Decree

Title: N/A

Description: This item is a royal decree [signed](#) by [Alexandre Édouard, Duke of Anjou and Future King Henry III \(1551-1589\)](#) likely regarding funds generated by a military muster of the company of M. de Lafayette for the quarter of July, August, and September, dated March 20, 1568 at Paris, France. In this document, the Duke may be apologizing for missing the aforementioned muster and may mention that he had been ill with a fever. This document may be signed by [Le Conte, René \(a. 1610-1625\)](#), [Sarres\(?\)](#), and

others whose names are illegible. Le Conte may have been the Counselor Secretary to the King and member of the chancellery who was [granted the position in 1610 and died in December 1625](#). In April of 1626, a replacement had been found in Daniel de Launey. The back may be signed by Le Conte, who identifies himself as the General Controller of the treasury. The document mentions [de Baillon, Odet, 1525-1573](#) as a councillor to the king, likely [Charles IX of France \(1550-1574\)](#). Odet [was a squire](#), Lord of Forges and Bajolet, [King's Counsellor-Secretary](#), War Commissioner, and Treasurer General of the Navy in the Levant, though he may have [resigned from some of these positions in 1553](#). The document is very difficult to read due to age and wear. The back of the document mentions de Lafayette's company and possibly François de Montpipeau, identified as a man-at-arms in charge of overseeing something. This document has passed through multiple hands, as seen in the varying penmanship in the identifications on the back. The document may mention names or places such as J. de Monjean, Cullaham, M. Johan, Savard, Boniface, and more, though spelling and context is difficult to discern. This document was written during the [French Wars of Religion](#), a series of civil wars fought in France from 1562 to 1598, primarily between [Roman Catholics](#) and Protestant [Huguenots](#). The violence began with the [1562 Massacre of Vassy](#), when troops under the Catholic [François, Duke of Guise](#) attacked a Protestant congregation. The wars ended with the [War of the Three Henrys \(1587–1589\)](#), a final struggle among [Henry III](#), Protestant leader [Henry of Navarre](#), and Catholic leader [Henri I, Duke of Guise](#). This war resulted in the assassination of [Henry III](#) and the ascension of [Henry of Navarre](#) to become [Henry IV](#). This item was created between the [Second War](#) and [Third War](#), days before the [Peace of Longjumeau](#).

2.3. Item 3: Royal Writ from [King Henry IV](#) [French Language], 1605 September 8 (**removed to Legal Box #1**)

Type of Material: Royal Writ

Description: The following item is a royal writ signed by [King Henry IV of France \(1553-1610\)](#) dated September 8, 1605, and countersigned by [Louis Potier de Gesvre \(a. 1567 - d. 1643\)](#) from [Fontainebleau Palace](#). This is a royal letters patent from King Henry IV addressed to financial officials, specifically the counselors of the treasury and generals of finances in a region of Paris. The king informs these officials that he has issued a commission regarding some form of taxation or financial arrangement. The document appears to concern the implementation of tax provisions specified in a royal edict from September 1605, possibly involving different rates of taxation (the "seven, four, and three" mentioned could refer to different tax rates). The references to "advocates, procurators, and clerks" suggest this concerns payments or funds allocated to legal or administrative officials in a specific jurisdiction. In 1605, Henry IV was focusing on rebuilding France after the [French Wars of Religion](#), which he ended in 1598 with the [Edict of Nantes](#). Henry focused on economic reconstruction, infrastructure across France, agricultural development, and early North American colonization. This document is signed by [Louis Potier de Gesvre \(a. 1567 - d. 1643\)](#), who was a noble with the titles of [Baron de Gesvres](#), [Count of Tresmes](#), [Baron of Montjay and Fresnoy](#), [Vidame of Châlons](#), [Lord of Bourg-la-Reine](#), [Lord of Plessis-Picquet](#), and [Lord of Sceaux](#). He was appointed secretary to the King in 1567 and served under [Henry III](#), [Henry IV](#), and [Louis XIII](#). He often countersigned the Kings' documents as the [Royal Secretary](#), such as [this letter](#) from Henry IV to [Lyon](#) and this [letter](#) from Henry IV about the [Wars of Religion](#). Potier also served as an ambassador from France to [Rudolf II, Holy Roman Emperor](#) and was recognized as the [Secretary of State](#). Potier is from the sixth generation of the [Potier line](#) and is recognized as one of the ["Founding Fathers of France"](#) due to his administrative contributions.

2.4. Item 4: Royal Warrant by King Louis XIII [French Language], 1615. (Removed to Black Box 1)

Type of Material: Royal Warrant

Title: N/A

Description: The following item is a royal warrant written by [Louis XIII, King of France \(1601-1643\)](#) to [Raymond Phélypeaux, Seigneur of La Vrillière \(d. 1629\)](#) regarding the payment of Lazare de La Thoison (AKA de la Toison) and René Le Conte, secretaries of the king, dated December 12, 1615. In this document, Louis gives each of his two secretaries £600 from the [Order of the Holy Spirit](#) in regard to their service. These gifts lack the [denier](#), a form of interest and taxation, and amount to 48,528 g of fine silver each, with each being the equivalent of \$49,700 USD (2025), to a total of almost \$100,000. This decree is written to and signed by [Raymond Phélypeaux](#), former Secretary of the King's Chambers and [Treasurer of the Epargne](#). Lazare de la Toison was one of [Louis XIII's secretaries](#) and [became treasurer general of the finance office](#) in [1621 before dying in April, 1629](#). His territories were around [Autun, France](#) and included the [Étang de la Toison](#). "René Le Conte" may have been referring to the Counselor Secretary to the King and member of the chancellery who was [granted the position in 1610 and died in December 1625](#). In April of 1626, a [replacement had been found in Daniel de Launey](#). René Le Conte may have been an ancestor of René Le Conte, referring to a "syndic", a government official, who in 1679 was [ordered by the Chancellor](#) to finish writing "[L'Histoire chronologique de la Grande Chancellerie de France](#)" by Abraham Tessereau. This book contains a record of the names, histories, positions, responsibilities, rights, and privileges of the [Chancellery of France](#) and was begun in 1676. In 1679, Tessereau was forced out of his position because he was a Protestant and Le Conte continued to work on the compilation until 1706. At the time this item was created, Louis XIII was 14 years old and had been King of France for five years after the assassination of his father, [Henry IV](#). At this time, France had been led by his mother, [Marie de' Medici](#), who poorly managed the kingdom, leading to Louis XIII exiling her and killing her followers in 1617. This letter was received on December 31, 1615 by "moi" in La Rochefoucauld, referring to [many possible locations](#), likely the [Château de la Rochefoucauld \(Liancourt\)](#), the [Château de La Rochefoucauld](#), or [La Rochefoucauld \(Charente\)](#).

2.5. Item 5: Royal Writ from King Louis XIV [French Language], 1665 October. (removed to Black Box #1)

Type of Material: Royal Writ

Title: N/A

Description: The following item is royal writ from [Louis XIV, King of France \(1638-1715\)](#) to [François de Montlezun \(1609-1697\)](#), Lord of Besmeaux, on October 1, 1665 at the [Bastille](#). Although [authorized](#) by Louis XIV, this document was [written and countersigned](#) by [Hugues de Lionne](#), the [French Minister of Foreign Affairs](#). Within the writ, King Louis XIV commands that a prisoner, known as “Courrier Marquin,” be released. [Marquin was a mail courier](#) that [helped deliver important messages for Hugues de Lionne when he was away](#) from his court. [Monsieur de Besmaux](#) served as Captain to [Jules Mazarin](#)’s guards, served as Governor of the Bastille for 40 years, and eventually died at his post. This decree was made at the height of his power, when Louis XIV made [great use](#) of the Bastille. Louis XIV was a devout Catholic and after revoking the [Edict of Nantes](#) in 1685, he was able to use the Bastille to break up Protestant groups and arrest their leaders. During Louis XIV’s reign, only 20-50 prisoners at one time were imprisoned in the Bastille, for an average sentence of 3 years. At the time of this letter, Louis had recently remodeled the area around the Bastille. Many of the prisoners were from [upper classes](#) and paid to have their own clothes, to decorate their cells with tapestries and carpets, and to have time to exercise. At the end of Louis XIV’s reign, on July 14, 1789, the [Bastille was stormed](#) by revolutionaries, which is seen as the crux of the [French Revolution](#). The [signature](#) of Hugues de Lionne at the bottom of the document seems to contain gold flakes.

2.6. Item 6: Royal Writ from King Louis XV [French language], 1744 May 1 (removed to Black Box #1)

The following item is a royal writ by [Louis XV, King of France, 1710-1774](#) to the Dasfelo(?) Regiment of his [French Royal Army](#) regarding Lord Duhautoy (possibly du Hautoy), Captain in the Cavalry Regiment dated May 1, 1744. This writ allows Duhautoy a leave of absence through March, 1744, to “tend to his affairs”, stating that he would be considered as if he were present and that he would be paid likewise. The writ is signed by [Louis XV](#) and M. le Voyer d’Argenson, referring to [Marc Pierre de Voyer de Paulmy, Count of Argenson](#), who was the Secretary of State for War. This writ was made during the [War of the Austrian Succession](#) (1740-1748) and Captain Duhautoy, [possibly Pierre-Paul-Maximilien-Abraham](#), was likely participating in this conflict. At the time of this writ, d’Argenson was recently appointed Secretary of State for War and because the French Armies were disorganized, he revived the idea of local militias, of which Duhautoy may have been a part. When assessing the signature of [Louis XV](#), the ‘s’ stood out in that it has a distinct shape compared to his other [signatures](#) from that time period.

**2.7. Item 7: Payment Order from the Count of Provence, Louis Stanislas Xavier, [Future King Louis XVIII of France] to Monsieur Denis-Pierre-Jean Papillon de la Ferté for Sieur Dupont [French Language], 1777/1778 June 20. (Removed to Black Box #1)**

Description: The following is an order from the [Count of Provence, Louis Stanislas Xavier, \(future King Louis XVIII\)](#) to [M. Denis-Pierre-Jean Papillon de la Ferté](#), the [Intendant of the Menus-Plaisirs du Roi](#) (the Steward of Lesser Pleasures for the King) and the [Count of Provence's Treasurer General](#), on June 20, 1778, from the [Palace of Versailles](#). According to this document, [Pierre Samuel du Pont de Nemours](#), the “[former hunting inspector](#)”, was to be paid an outstanding debt of 400 [French] pounds from the funds of the Treasure General. It appears that this was payment for a hunting expedition that took place in “Brunoi” (likely referring to a forest in [Brunoy, France](#)) in September, 1777. The Count of Provence frequently hunted in the [Forest of Sénart](#) that extended into parts of Brunoy. The Count of Provence also [purchased “le Petit Chateau” \(The Little Castle\) of Brunoy in 1774](#). This document was countersigned by “Cromot” (likely referring to [Jules-David Cromot Fougny Baron du Bourg, 1725-1786, Governor of Brunoy and Superintendent of Finances to the Count of Provence](#)). This document is very similar to a [debt repayment order for M. de la Châtre](#), a [repayment order for Sieur Cognary](#), and a [repayment order for Sr. Jean Francois T. Chalgrin](#). ## **2.8. Item 8: Payment Order from [King Louis XVI](#) of France to [Jean-Baptiste Tourteau](#) for Sr. Hollande [French Language], 1791 April 6 (removed to Black Box #1)**

Description: The following is an order from [King Louis XVI](#) requesting that [Jean-Baptiste Tourteau](#), the General Treasurer of the [Civil List](#), pay two thousand six hundred livres [French pounds] to Sr. Hollande [[possibly Louis-Jean Hollande](#)], one of the Queen's servants, for candles. This document was signed at the [Tuileries Palace in Paris](#) on April 6, 1791, because a mob threw the King out of the Palace of Versailles in 1789 towards the beginning of the [French Revolution](#). [Very few documents from the Tuileries Palace exist](#). This document was created very shortly before the [King fled the Tuileries](#) and was countersigned by [Arnaud II de la Porte](#). Similar documents exist from [July 1791](#) and [December 1791](#). [M. Hollande appears to have been a servant that worked in the chamber of Marie-Antoinette from approximately 1775-1789](#). Sr. Hollande may have formerly [been a musician for the King and upon losing](#)

[his hearing](#), was instead moved to the position in the Queen's chamber. Six men were assigned as servants to the Queen and were charged with [lighting, putting out, and replacing the candles](#) throughout her wing of the Palace. The French royals were notorious for [wasting a significant amount of candles](#). Sr. Hollande may have been seeking payment for candles that were in his possession as [some servants appear to have received payment for objects in their possession in place of receiving a pension](#). A [similar document](#) exists in which a person named Hollande and working for the Queen received a pension of 400 [livres] in January of 1782. Researchers at the Palace of Versailles have a [database](#) in which Sr. Hollande or a relative of his may be identified.

## **2.9. Item 9: Letter from [Francois Alexandre Frederic, Duke of Rochefoucauld-Liancourt](#) to [Pieter Johan van Berckel](#) [French Language], ca. 1795 June 1**

**Description:** The following is an undated letter from the [Francois Alexandre Frederic Duke of Rochefoucauld-Liancourt](#) [Francois Alexandre Frederic duc de la Rochefoucauld-Liancourt], to [Pieter Johan van Berckel](#) in Philadelphia. Within the letter, the Duke mentions that he enjoyed traveling around the state of Pennsylvania and that he was happy to see the success of French Azilum. He states that he believes Pennsylvania will be a comfortable home for Europeans. Furthermore, he mentions that he will leave for [Tioga](#) the following morning. The Duke asks van Berckel to pass along his well wishes to Monsieur Bingham (possibly [William Bingham](#)). The letter also mentions Mr. Read in [Reading](#), “General Hanne” [likely [John A. Hanna](#) (written as “Hannah” in Rochefoucauld’s book p. 54)] in [Harrisburg](#), and Mr. Kittara who was not in [Lancaster](#). At the beginning of the [French Revolution](#), Rochefoucauld remained loyal to King Louis XVI and was forced to flee France. During his exile, he [toured America between the years of 1795 and 1797](#). In [Rochefoucauld’s book detailing his travels throughout North America](#), he mentions that Mr. Read of Reading had ten children, only two of which were baptized. Mr. Read was a lawyer who welcomed him in Reading and provided letters of introduction to be taken to Lancaster. According to his book, Rochefoucauld was in Reading on May 7, 1795 (p. 23), and continued on to Lancaster on May 11, 1795 (p. 38). He then visited Harrisburg and General Hannah on May 13, 1795. “General Hanne” likely refers to [General Hannah](#), a Brigadier General of the militia, member of the Pennsylvania Senate, and [husband](#) to the [daughter](#) of [Mr. Harris](#), the founder of Harrisburg (p. 54). Rochefoucauld left Azilum for Tioga on June 2, 1795 (p. 97). This letter mentions leaving for Tioga on the following morning, therefore, this letter was likely written on June 1, 1795. This letter is addressed to Pieter Johan van Berckel, the first Dutch ambassador to the United States. [Van Berckel’s brother had connections to the Holland Land Company](#). Van Berckel [may have been involved with surveying land](#) on behalf of the Holland Land Company, so Rochefoucauld may have been writing to Van Berckel to assure him of Holland’s good investment in American lands. The second signature on this document may belong to [Herman LeRoy](#), the former consul-general to Holland and representative of the [Holland Land Company](#). The “Bingham” mentioned within the letter may refer to [William Bingham](#). He was considered one of the wealthiest people in the United States at the time, and he became a major land developer. He may have played a role in establishing lands for the Holland Land Company and/or French Azilum.

**2.10. Item 10: Printed Summons by [Napoleon Bonaparte](#) to the President of the Canton of Abbeville-Sud [French Language], 1803 September 2. (Removed to Black Box #1)**

Description: The following is a printed summons signed by [Napoleon Bonaparte \(future Napoleon I\)](#) to the President of the [Canton of Abbeville-Sud](#) granting total policing authority of the local area for an

assembly that was set to meet on 10 Frimaire of the year XII of the French Republic ([1803 December 2](#)). This document was signed in Saint-Cloud, France, (likely at the [Château de Saint-Cloud](#)) on Fructidor 15 of the year XI (September 2, 1803). The “15” was difficult to discern, but a [similar document](#) led us to the conclusion that it was “15.” The First Inspector of the Police Force and the General in charge of the 15th military division had been informed of this and were to be on stand-by to assist the canton’s forces if need be. It is noted that [Napoleon passed through Abbeville for the first time in 1803](#), and the First Consul often spent time in Abbeville to prepare for their [expedition against the United Kingdom](#). This took place leading up to the [War of the Third Coalition](#) and the beginning of the Napoleonic Wars. This document uses the [months of the French Republican calendar](#) and was countersigned by [Jean-Antoine Chaptal](#) and [Hugues-Bernard Maret](#). This document was sealed with an early version of the official [Great Seal of France](#). Napoleon’s signature in this document [matches his signatures](#) before he became Emperor of France.

We give you a mark of trust in also charging you with important functions: we count on you to show your zeal, your wisdom, and your loyalty to your work.

Description: The following item is a letter from [Napoleon III, Emperor of the French, 1808-1873](#) to an unnamed general [likely [Count Christophe Michel Roguet](#), the [future king's aide-de-camp from 1852-1865](#) and son of [General Roguet](#)], dated August 27, 1869. In this letter, Napoleon thanks the general for his good wishes sent to him for Napoleon's party or feast. He ends the letter by complimenting the general's dedication and assuring that both the general and “Madame Roguet” [likely referring to [Marie de Lemanska](#), Count Roguet's [second wife](#)] have his sincerest friendship. Although Napoleon III was fairly elected as President of France in 1848, he soon took absolute control of the country in 1851. The Second Republic ended in 1852 to be replaced by the Second French Empire. Thus then Prince-President Louis Napoleon became Napoleon III, Emperor of the French. In the 1860's, Napoleon's health began to decline. In the year that this letter was written, Napoleon had urinary tract infections that were being treated with opium, making his writing difficult to read. The Emperor and Empress moved from palace to palace following a schedule so this letter was sent from the Palace of Fontainebleau as it was the favored summer residence.

### **2.12. Item 12: Letter from [Henriette Christine, Duchess of Brunswick-Wolfenbüttel](#) and [Abbess of Gandersheim](#), to Unknown [German Language], 1694 January 5**

Description: The following is a letter from [Henriette Christine, Duchess of Brunswick-Wolfenbüttel](#) [[Henriette Christine, Duchess of Braunschweig-Wolfenbüttel](#)], to unknown, dated January 5, 1694. This document contains ink and handwriting of multiple writers. It appears that the original manuscript was written in 1694, and the other notes were added later. Henriette Christine mentions two [canons](#) of [Gandersheim Abbey](#), [Christian Wilhelm Probst](#) (mentioned in [this book](#)) and [Günther von Geisau](#) (mentioned in [this book](#)). Within [this book](#), all three individuals from this manuscript are mentioned (Henriette Christine pp. 138-145; Christian Wilhelm Probst p. 465; Günther von Geisau p. 471). According to a German scholar, it appears that the two clergymen were involved with negotiating the capitulation of Henriette Christine as the succeeding abbess. Henriette Christine became the [Abbess](#) of Gandersheim Abbey on December 21, 1693. This letter is likely connected to Henriette Christine's recent appointment as Abbess. Henriette Christine's father, [Duke Anthony Ulrich \[Anton Ulrich\]](#), acted as the sole ruler of [Brunswick-Wolfenbüttel](#) from 1704-1714. Henriette Christine's niece, [Elisabeth Christine](#), married [Charles VI](#) and became [Holy Roman Empress](#) and Queen of Germany in 1711. Due to her connections to royalty, Henriette Christine's position as Abbess emphasized [imperial immediacy](#) of the Gandersheim Abbey. In order to marry Charles VI, Elisabeth Christine had to convert to Roman Catholicism, an act which required a significant amount of convincing by both her father and aunt. Allegations that Henriette Christine was finding herself drawn towards Catholicism began as early as 1698. Duke Anthony Ulrich converted to Roman Catholicism in 1709, and Abbess Henriette Christine later followed suit. As a result of the birth of a child out of wedlock, Henriette Christine resigned as Abbess of Gandersheim Abbey on July 12, 1712, just one day after her religious conversion. Following these events and the abbey's connection to the recently converted Roman Catholic rulers, the denominational status of Gandersheim Abbey became unclear.

The Duke of Mecklenburg [joined the Russian Army in 1798](#) and quickly rose through the ranks. The German script written on the back of this letter refers to the Princess of Gotha as the “late” princess; Louis Charlotte died in 1801, suggesting this note was written two or more years after the letter was written. In 1811, he adopted the son of a fallen Turkish soldier and raised him as his own. Karl continued his military service until May 1814 when he retired, dying in 1833.

Description: The following is an envelope addressed to Bernard, “Duke” of Saxe Weimar at the [Hôtel de Saxe](#) in [Dresden](#). This likely refers to [Prince Carl Bernard of Saxe-Weimar-Eisenach](#), also known as Karl Bernard of Saxe-Weimar, Karl Bernhard of Saxe-Weimar, Carl Bernhard of Saxe-Weimar, etc. Prince Bernhard was a famous soldier who most notably fought in the [Battle of Waterloo](#). During his service, he was known to have [frequently stayed in Dresden](#). He later fought on behalf of the King of the Netherlands. From 1825-1826, Bernard [toured the United States](#) and recorded his travels in a book titled, *Reise seiner Hoheit des Herzogs Bernhard zu Sachsen-Weimar-Eisenach durch Nord-Amerika* [[Travels through North America, during the Years 1825 and 1826](#)]. On [July 5, 1841, the Prince stayed at the same hotel](#) in Dresden as the [Duchesse of Dino, Princess Dorothea of Courland](#), following a trip to visit his niece [possibly [Princess Augusta of Saxe-Weimar-Eisenach](#) or [Princess Marie of Saxe-Weimar-Eisenach](#)], in Berlin. This envelope refers to Bernard as “His Royal Highness Monseigneur the Duke.” This same stylization is also seen in a [musical concert dedication from 1855](#), a [violin concerto dedication from 1864](#), a [list of attendees at a royal celebration from the early 1800s](#), the Belgian [Universal Atlas of Geography from 1829](#), and a [death announcement in a Belgian newspaper in 1862](#). The notes from a former archivist on this manuscript mention the Queen of Prussia, wife of [Frederick William IV](#). These notes are likely in reference to [Elisabeth Ludovika of Bavaria](#). The stamp from Berlin on this manuscript may have come

from the [Berlin Palace](#), former [residence of Queen Elizabeth and King Frederick William IV](#). Queen Elisabeth was tied to the ruling House of Saxony through marriage. She was the sister-in-law of [Princess Augusta of Saxe-Weimar](#), who was the niece of Prince Bernard. This envelope may have been addressed to Bernard from Princess Augusta or Queen Elisabeth. While this envelope was likely addressed around the time that Bernard stayed in the hotel with the Duchess of Dino, the exact date of this manuscript is unclear.

### **2.16. Item 16: Royal Decree by [King Ferdinand I](#) [Future Holy Roman Emperor] [Czech Language], 1549 April 3 (removed to Black Box #1)**

Description: The following item is a letter from [Ferdinand I, Holy Roman Emperor, 1503-1564](#) to the leaders of the city of [České Budějovice](#) in what is currently the [South Bohemian Region](#) of Czechia dated April 3, 1549. This decree was created to clarify the duties of the Court of Appeals and to address complaints that there were many delays in the judicial process. Under Ferdinand's signature is a note specifying a Chancellor named Henricus Purgravi, who may have had a part in transcribing or addressing the decree. Ferdinand was the younger brother of [Charles V, Holy Roman Emperor](#) and inherited many lands, such as the [Habsburg](#) land of Austria. Ferdinand was a devout Catholic and struggled with the [Protestant Reformation](#), though he played a key part in the [Peace of Augsburg](#), which allowed rulers to choose their country's religion. Ferdinand often had skirmishes with the [Ottoman Empire](#) under [Suleiman the Magnificent](#), who invaded Hungary, though Ferdinand was able to ward them off. In 1556, Charles V abdicated his position and Ferdinand became Holy Roman Emperor in 1558 and made great strides to maintain stability in Europe. In 1549, when this letter was written, Ferdinand was trying to enforce the [Augsburg Interim](#), which was a temporary religious decree issued by Charles V to maintain Catholic dominance while still trying to appease Protestants, though it was very unpopular and led to increased resistance.

And whoever wishes to take an appeal before us as now announced in any manner, from this day forward, shall not be obliged to submit and arrange for the appeal more than two hundred Czech groschen until our further order regarding this. Furthermore, you shall not send any acts that arise in any appeal before they have been read to the parties involved and sealed in their presence, so that no further claims come to us regarding this matter. Therefore, you shall oversee all of the above with diligence, ensuring that everything is conducted properly at all times and that nothing is neglected, otherwise, it shall not be done otherwise.

**2.17 Item 17 : Letter from [Anna Maria Franziska \[Duchess of Saxe-Lauenburg\]](#) to Unknown [German Language], 1717 January 25  
(Removed to Legal Box #1)**

Description: The following is a letter from [Anna Maria Franziska \[Anna Maria Franziska of Saxe-Lauenburg\]](#) to an unknown recipient, dated January 25, 1717. There is little to no information included within the letter, and Anna Maria Franziska appears to be practicing the art of formal diplomatic writing called [curialia](#) [["kurialien"](#) in German]. According to one German scholar, the use of "Euer Liebden" in the letter indicates that the recipient was likely a German individual of relative importance but lower than a Grand Duke. There were [no Grand Dukes in Germany before 1800](#) so the recipient likely was a duke [Herzog]. This may have been addressed to one of Anna Maria Francesca's own family members, a duke of Saxe-Lauenburg. According to a second German scholar, Anna Maria Francesca also uses the term "freundmuhmlich" which may refer to the son of a sister. This could refer to [Ludwig Georg Simpert \[Louis George, Margrave of Baden-Baden\]](#), son of [Sibylle of Saxe-Lauenburg](#), but it is worth noting her nephew was only 15 years old at the time that this was written. According to a third German scholar, it appears that this letter mentions [Moritz Wilhelm von Sachsen-Merseburg](#) or [Moritz Wilhelm, Duke of Saxe-Zeitz](#). Anna Maria Franziska was born as the Duchess of Saxe-Lauenberg and was married to [Philip William August, Count Palatine of Neuburg](#), from 1690 until his death in 1693. She later married [Gian Gastone de' Medici](#) and became the [Grand-Duchess of Tuscany](#) in 1723. ## **2.18. Item 18: Letter from [Prince Lucien Murat](#), 1879 Jan 12 (removed to Black Box#1)**

**Description:** The following item is a document signed by [Prince Lucien Murat](#) on June 4, 1834, in which he agrees to take care of and train [Samuel G. Wright](#)'s two year old mare. Prince Murat explains different prices and payment methods should he choose not to keep her. The bottom of this manuscript has a note written by someone other than Lucien Murat, possibly acting as a third party for the transaction of the mare [first manuscript]. The second manuscript is written upside down and was previously underneath the original letter from Lucien Murat [first manuscript]. This part of the document is written by C. E. Wright [possibly [Caleb Earl Wright](#)], 1879 January 12. In it, he describes how he saw Prince Lucien Murat on horseback in [Bordentown, New Jersey](#), speaking with his uncle, Samuel G. Wright (Prince Lucien Murat is confirmed to have lived in Bordentown, New Jersey, for several years). C. E. Wright believes this took place in 1828. Prince Lucien Murat is described as "hearty" and "stout." C. E. Wright believes the prince to be dead at the time of writing and mentions that he enjoyed promotion during [Napoleon III](#)'s reign, where he [earned a seat](#) on the [National Assembly](#). On the front and back of this part of the manuscript, "Lucien" is misspelled as "Leucien" (front) and "Lutian" (back) [second manuscript]. Between both parts of this manuscript, it appears that there are four sets of handwriting: Lucien Murat's, C.E. Wright's, and two others that both misspell Lucien's name.

Description: The following item is an envelope written in English, Dutch, German, and French sent from [General William Frederick George Louis, future King William II of the Netherlands](#) in [Hague, Netherlands](#) to [Dr Franz Tideman, Burgermeister of Bremen, 1752-1836](#), on October 22, 1814. This letter shows signs of being processed in other archives due to the written notes in English and German that identify the letter. The letter may have passed through the mail system in [Hague \(Netherlands\)](#), as seen by the stamp mark "LA HAYE", in French. The seal of Willem II (AKA Wilhelm, [William of Orange](#)) is also attached to this letter. Willem II was the son of [William I](#), King of the Netherlands and fled to England with his family when the [Dutch Republican Army](#) was defeated in the [Batavian Revolution](#). Willem studied military in the [Prussian Court](#), served in the [Prussian army](#), and studied civil law at [Christ Church, Oxford](#). At age 19, he entered the British Army and was placed under [Arthur Wellesley, 1st Duke of Wellington](#) before becoming a colonel. He then served under [Prince Regent George IV](#) and became a major-general before returning to the Netherlands, where his father became the ruler of the [Sovereign Principality of the United Netherlands](#). In 1814, he was promoted to lieutenant-general and subsequently general, and he fought in many battles, including the [Battle of Waterloo](#) against [Napoleon](#), in which he was injured. This letter is dated to 1814, after Willem was promoted to general and before Napoleon escaped the [Island of Elba](#). [Dr Tideman, 1752-1836](#), was one of three mayors of [Bremen](#) and earned his doctorate in law from [Georg-August-Universität Göttingen](#). In 1794 he became a [councillor](#) of Bremen and from 1808 to 1824 he was a [mayor](#). At the time this letter was sent, Bremen was under French occupation after the [Napoleonic Wars](#) and in 1813, Russian troops invaded Bremen to oust the French troops, eventually expelling them. In 1814, Bremen was recognized as a [Free Hanseatic City](#) and in 1815, the [Congress of Vienna](#) declared it a sovereign city-state within the [German Confederation](#). During the French occupation, the mayors lost their power, but it was restored after the French were expelled. Willem II may have been contacting the mayor to establish amicable relations after his father had seized power again.

Description: The following item is a letter from [Catherine, the Great, 1729-1796](#) to an unknown person dated February 3, 1791. The letter in Cyrillic seems to have been sent in response to “good wishes” Catherine received from the recipient regarding the “change of the year,” likely the [New Year](#), which was [celebrated on](#) January 14th, according to the [Orthodox calendar](#). Catherine the Great prays that the recipient have undisturbed and constant love in their “princely house”. This may suggest that the recipient was a Russian noble of some variety. Catherine the Great presided over the [Russian Enlightenment](#) after overthrowing her husband [Peter III](#). Catherine led a large-scale renaissance of culture and science in Russia, leading to Russia being recognized as one of Europe’s [Great Powers](#). When this letter was written, Russia was battling Turkey over the Black Sea region in the [Russo-Turkish War \(1787-1792\)](#) while also fighting back Sweden’s invasion of the Baltic lands under [King Gustav III](#) during the [Russo-Swedish War](#) (1788-1790). This ended with the [Treaty of Värälä](#), which was signed in August, 1790. Domestically, social tensions were rising due to the military focus and slowing of modernization reforms, leading to a strain on resources. This letter was likely sent to one of the many nobles appointed by Catherine.

### **2.21. Item 21: Letter from Former King of Spain, [Joseph Bonaparte](#), to Messrs. [Thomas Mayne Willing](#) and [Richard Willing](#) [French Language], 1817 November 14**

**Description:** The following item is a signed letter from the brother of [Napoleon I](#), [Joseph Bonaparte](#), former King of Spain, to brothers [Thomas Mayne Willing, 1767-1822](#), and [Richard Willing, 1755-1858](#) dated November 14, 1817. Bonaparte signs the letter as the “[Count de Surveilliers](#),” a disguise that he adopted after his family was banished from France before establishing [Point Breeze](#) in Bordentown, New Jersey, in approximately 1815. In the letter, Joseph discusses that he won’t be paying a sum of money to M. Clary [possibly referring to his father-in-law, [François Clary, 1725-1794](#)] and has even discussed the matter with notaries or lawyers who said that he is under no obligation to pay, because Bonaparte’s charge was not presented or protested to Clary and that he only signed out of kindness, not as a receipt. This protestation refers to an [acte de protestation](#), which is a legal document attesting the refusal to pay for something. The father of Thomas Mayne Willing and Richard Willing, [Thomas Willing](#), was the former mayor of Philadelphia, a commissioner of the [First Bank of the United States](#), an incredibly wealthy merchant, and the [richest man in America](#) for a time, according to [Burke](#). [Thomas Willing](#) established the Willing, [Morris](#), and Company firm, and [Richard Willing possibly took over the family firm](#). This document is likely connected to mercantile affairs or a forgiven debt.

**2.22 Item 22: Letter from Former [King of Spain, Joseph Bonaparte \[Joseph Count de Survilliers\]](#), to Monsieur [\[Peter Stephen\] Duponceau \[French Language\]](#), 1832 April 17**

Description: The following is a letter from [Joseph, the Count of Survilliers \[Joseph Bonaparte\]](#) to Monsieur [Peter Stephen Duponceau](#), from [Philadelphia, Pennsylvania](#), on April 17, 1832. Within the letter, Joseph Bonaparte states that he sent Duponceau a copy of a mandate that Duponceau had rewritten in favor of Cardinal Fesch (likely referring to [Joseph Fesch](#)). Bonaparte asks that Duponceau approve and sign the mandate again and to get it certified by the General Consul of the Roman State that was in Washington. Bonaparte mentions a Monsieur Sico(?) who may have been a member of the Consul of Rome in Philadelphia. Bonaparte signs this letter as Joseph C[om]te de Survilliers (the Count of Survilliers). This is the name that he gave himself after emigrating to the United States. Joseph Bonaparte was the older brother of [Napoleon Bonaparte](#). Joseph originally worked as a lawyer and diplomat, and once his brother came to power he was made the [King of Naples](#) from 1806-1808 and the [King of Spain](#) from 1808-1813. Upon [Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo](#), Joseph was exiled from France. He fled to the United States in 1815, originally residing in New York City and Philadelphia before he finally purchased [Point Breeze](#). Cardinal Fesch in this letter likely refers to [Cardinal Joseph Fesch](#), the half-uncle of Joseph and Napoleon and [Napoleon's most important ambassador to the Vatican in Rome](#). In 1811, Fesch was the President of the [Council of Paris](#) that was created to impose Napoleon Bonaparte's wishes upon [Pope Pius VII](#). Under Napoleon, Fesch obtained significant political and religious power. In 1815, Fesch was ultimately named a [Prince of the Papal States](#) by the Pope. Upon Napoleon's fall, Fesch fled to [Rome](#). Although born in France, Duponceau served as a translator and secretary for [Baron von Steuben](#) in the [Continental Army](#) in the American Revolution. Following his discharge from the Army due to illness, Duponceau continued to live in Philadelphia. During his time in the Army, he was closely involved with notable figures such as [General George Washington](#) and [the Marquis de Lafayette](#), and throughout his life, he became close acquaintances with many other notable American figures such as [Alexander Hamilton](#).

[John Laurens](#), and [James Monroe](#). In 1782, Duponceau [was made the under-secretary of the Department of Foreign Affairs](#). Having [begun practicing law in 1785, he ultimately became an extremely prominent lawyer](#). Duponceau became [Counsellor of the United States Supreme Court and helped establish the Law Academy of Philadelphia](#). Records indicate that Duponceau was connected to Joseph Bonaparte as he acted as the [“confidential agent” for Bonaparte](#), helping him execute deeds for tracts of land. Bonaparte could not have the deeds in his name as he was not a local resident, so [the deeds were put into Duponceau’s name](#) instead. Joseph Bonaparte likely wrote to Duponceau due to his fluency in both English and French, his legal expertise, his connections to many highly influential figures of the time, and/or his political influence. Under Napoleon’s rule, France invaded the Papal States, and the states were [annexed by France in 1809](#). With the fall of Napoleon, the majority of the Papal States were formally restored as Italian territories. According to this letter, it appears that the Vatican had a diplomatic representative present in Washington, D.C.; however, the identity and official title of this individual are unknown as the [Vatican Embassy did not begin in the United States until the late 19th century](#). In 1826, Count Ferdinando Lucchesi [represented the Papal States as their Consul General in the US](#) and Consular Officers were stationed in the US until [at least 1867](#).

### **2.23. Item 23: Royal Decree from [King Charles I](#), 1646 June 8 (removed to Legal Box #1)**

Type of Material: Royal Decree

Title: N/A

Description: The following item is a royal decree written by [King Charles I](#), King of England, Ireland, and Scotland, to all military officers and coxswains on June 8, 1646, from [Newcastle](#) (likely referring to

[Newcastle Gaol](#)). The decree was created to prevent any military officers from obstructing the passage of Lieutenant Colonel Clarke ([possibly in charge of nine companies of Foot in 1651](#)), his two servants, and three horses. It is possible that Lieutenant Colonel Clarke participated in the English Civil War, carrying an important message of some variety. In 1642, Charles I and the Royalists began to fight the revolutionary Parliamentarians of England and Scotland. In 1645, he was defeated by the Parliamentarian [New Model Army](#). He retreated from the battle and surrendered to a Scottish force and was taken by the [Long Parliament](#). In April 1646 he escaped imprisonment, but was shortly recaptured by the [Scottish Presbyterian Army](#), who sold him to the English Parliament in January 1647. This decree was issued during his captivity in Newcastle with the Scottish Presbyterian Army, and may have been the beginning of another escape attempt. It appears that at this period of the war, he still had some followers and power, as he was able to threaten the officers that if they didn't let Clarke pass, they would be answerable to the highest perils. This document is [signed](#) by the [Earl of Lanark, William Hamilton](#). The Earl of Lanark acted as the Secretary of State for Scotland and met with King Charles I at Newcastle in 1646 to negotiate the adoption of Presbyterianism. In 1649, a [Lieutenant-Colonel Clarke was imprisoned at Newgate Prison for "being in arms against Parliament" and attempting war](#). He was later released for good behavior.

**2.24. Item 24: Letter from the [Duke of York \(Future King James II\)](#) to [Monsieur Philippe I, Duke of Orléans](#) [French Language], 1667 May 23.**

Title: N/A

Description: The following is a personal letter from the [Duke of York \(future King James II\)](#) to “Monsieur” (likely referring to [Monsieur Philippe I, Duke of Orléans](#)) sent from London on May 23, 1667. In the letter, the Duke of York informs the recipient of the death of his youngest son, [Charles Stuart, Duke of Kendal](#). He continues on to write that he is worried about the health of his oldest son, [James Stuart, Duke of Cambridge](#). The Duke of York mentions that due to his immense feelings of grief, he may not reach out as frequently; but he is still a loyal and respectful servant of the king (likely referring to [King Louis XIV](#)). Charles Stuart, Duke of Kendal died the day before this letter was written at the age of 10 months due to convulsions. James Stuart, Duke of Cambridge, became ill at the end of April 1667 possibly with smallpox or the bubonic plague. James Stuart eventually died on June 20th, 1667, at the age of 3. These losses were especially hard for the Duke of York, and the nation feared what would happen as the Duke of York was left with no surviving sons at that time. Although he would [bear a son later in September of 1667](#), the Duke of York would have no sons that survived into adulthood until the birth of [James Francis Edward Stuart in 1688](#). The Duke of York addresses this letter to the “Monsieur of Your

Majesty” and signs it as “the very affectionate brother, cousin, and servant.” The Duke of York is the cousin of [King Louis XIV](#), and “Monsieur” is the official title given to the oldest brother of the king. This letter is very likely addressed to [Monsieur Philippe I, Duke of Orléans](#). It is also written a year or two before the Duke of York and his wife took the Catholic Eucharist, which would ultimately contribute to significant strife during his reign as king. The Duke of York likely had a good relationship with his relatives in France, as the Duke was welcomed by King Louis XIV during his exile from England in 1690. This document is signed as “[Jacques](#),” a signature used by the future King James II before he rose to the throne. Upon ascending to the throne, he became King James II of Ireland and England and King James VII of Scotland.

## **2.25. Item 25: Royal Warrant from [King Charles II](#), 1671 May 18**

Type of Material: Royal Warrant

Description: The following item is a royal warrant [signed](#) by [King Charles II](#) to all officers that it may concern on May 18, 1671, from the [Palace of Whitehall](#). The decree states [that Richard Cotton Esq. \(possible descendent of Sir Richard Cotton from the Cotton Family\)](#) is permitted to hunt in the Forest of East Beare in Southampton County (present day [Forest of Bere](#) in [Hampshire](#)). After the collapse of England's monarchy and the [Anglican Church](#) due to the [English Civil War \(1642-1652\)](#), Charles I of England was executed and the Parliamentarians won, resulting in the abolition of the monarchy and the House of Lords and the formation of a republic. Charles II was exiled to France in the meantime. [Oliver Cromwell](#) became the [Lord Protector](#) and ruled until his death in 1658. His son [Richard Cromwell](#) took over, but he wasn't able to please the military, and he was forced to resign due to general discontentment. Parliament was unable to restore order and [General George Monck](#) marched on England, inviting Charles II to return to England and restore the monarchy. During the ensuing Restoration Period, all documents related to Charles II began counting the years of his reign from the death of his father, rather than the restoration of the monarchy. This document was countersigned by [Trevor, Sir John III, 1626-1672](#). Sir John Trevor III became the secretary for King Charles II in 1668 and [acted as secretary until his death in 1672](#). The signature on this signature matches the signature on a [ledger sheet from 1671](#) and an [appointment letter by King Charles II](#). It should be noted that an archivist thought that the signature on the ledger sheet was that of [J. Trevor, Master of Rolls](#).

Description: The following item is a royal decree ([a letters patent](#)) signed by [King William III, 1650-1702](#) to [Sir Robert Howard, 1626-1698](#), [auditor of the Exchequer](#) on April 3, 1691, from the [Palace of Whitehall's](#) Treasury Chamber . The decree is requesting the payment of a debt to Henry Dethick Esq. ([possibly 1623-1707](#)), [Richmond Herald of Arms in Ordinary](#) from 1677 to 1704, of 18 pounds, 13 shilling, 4 pence, ([approximately \\$2,985 in 2017](#)), via a money order or through [debentures](#). As Richmond Herald, Henry Dethick Esq. received [an annual salary of 26 pounds, 13 shillings, 4 pence](#) [see for [more information about Henry Dethick](#) and his [actions](#) as [Richmond Herald](#)]. The decree mentions [King Charles II](#), but is signed by [William III, King of England, 1650-1702](#), so it seems that this document is executing an order from the late king. This debt repayment may be due to the [Great Stop of the Exchequer](#). It appears that the bottom of this document contains some sort of scribe shorthand, possibly used by the office of the exchequer. Signed as "William R" with the "[R](#)" referring to "[Rex](#)" (King). This document was [countersigned](#) by [Hampden, Richard, 1631-1695](#), [Fox, Stephen, Sir 1627-1716](#), and [Pelham, Thomas 1653-1712](#). Richard Hampden was [Chancellor of the Exchequer](#) from 1690-1694. Sir Stephen Fox ([signature](#)) acted as [Paymaster of the Forces](#) from 1661-1676 and 1679-1680 but refused to convert to Roman Catholicism under King James II, thus resigning from the position. He returned to politics under King William III and was reelected by Parliament in 1691. Due to Sir Stephen Fox's background in managing finances, it is very likely that he carried out similar duties for King William III. Thomas Pelham acted as [Lord Commissioner of the Treasury](#) at the time this was signed. The "late Act of Parliament" mentioned in this manuscript may refer to the [Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance Act of 1688](#) that required individuals in office and in Parliament to swear allegiance to King William III and [Queen Mary II](#) in the wake of the [Glorious Revolution](#). King William III of England was King William II of Scotland.

## **2.27. Item 27: 1709 Parliamentary Notice [from [Queen Anne](#)] and Exchequer Tallies, 1709-1715 (Removed to Black Box #1)**

Type of Material: Notification about act of parliament

Title: N/A

Description: The following item is a record of monetary exchanges written upon the front and back of a notice of a session of [Parliament](#) from 1709. The notice outlines three acts passed by Parliament and possibly insists that [Hon. James Brydges Esq., 1st Duke of Chandos](#), pay his loan of 100 pounds which was granted to him through the three acts mentioned. The three acts relate to raising money for “the war”, possibly [Queen Anne’s war \(1702-1713\)](#) or the [War of the Spanish Succession \(1701-1714\)](#). [James Brydges’ signature](#) can be found on a letter from 1697. He served as the [Paymaster \[General\] of the Forces Abroad](#) during the [War of the Spanish Succession](#). During this war, England was financially struggling and [British Exchequer Bills were being introduced to “accommodate war-related pressures](#) on the nation's monetary system by manufacturing a substitute for scarce specie,” according to historian Richard Kleer. The date of the printed text is October 22nd, 1709, which was during the time period when

Brydges held his position. The handwritten portions on the front and back consist of various transfers of money from December 27th, 1710, to August 25, 1715. The earliest note on the back, dated December 26, 1710, seems to be a message from the [Whitehall Treasury Chamber](#) to [Charles Montagu, Lord of Halifax](#), outlining the interest rate regarding the sum mentioned in the order. Montagu was [Chancellor of the Exchequer](#) from 1694 to 1699 and [First Lord of the Treasury](#) from 1714 to May 1715, but the date of the note is between Charles holding his positions. Charles Montagu was removed from office by [Queen Anne](#) in 1699, and upon her death, he was reinstated in 1714. Charles remained in the House of Lords, but the House of Commons [protested](#) against this. He maintained correspondence with the members of Parliament, so this may explain why the message was addressed to him. This message is signed by [Henry Paget](#), [Thomas Mansel](#), and [Robert Benson](#), who served in various capacities in the office of the [Exchequer](#). Paget and Mansel served as [Lords Commissioners of the Treasury](#), and Benson served as [Chancellor of the Exchequer](#). The next message from December 27, 1710, is a signed message from [James Brydges](#) to Henry Metcalfe, transferring to him all “right, title, and interest” of the sum mentioned in the order upon which the message was written. The third message, dated January 16, 1711, seems to be a signed message from Henry Metcalfe to [William Watkins](#), transferring to him the “right, title, and interest” in the sum of the aforementioned order. The fourth message, dated June 26, 1712, is a signed message from William Watkins to John Leaves, transferring the sum to him. John Leaves is mentioned as being the “trusted client of Brydges’ friend... Charles Davenont” and “a former Pay Office Official” in [The English Historical Review](#), Vol. 128, No. 533, Pg. 15. The fifth message, dated July 21, 1714, is a signed message from John Leaves to [John Hiccocks](#), transferring the sum to him. The messages continue from the back of the document to the front, where the sum is no longer being transferred. Instead, these messages consist of presumably monetary records from August 7, 1714, to August 25, 1715. In these brief lines, [“Lord Denbigh,” Basil Feilding](#), is mentioned several times. At the bottom of this page is a signature of [Charles Montagu](#), noting that he had [examined](#) the document; however, this signature was made before the monetary records were written, as [Montagu](#) died on May 19, 1715, and the last record is dated August 25, 1715. To the right of the printed text is a signature of [John Smith](#) from when he served as [Teller of the Exchequer](#). A [document from 1710](#) confirms that he held this position. John Leaves and Henry Metcalfe [appear to have been employees of the Pay Office](#) during this time period, and William Watkins was a [Brigadier General in the British Army](#) in charge of the [Regiment of Foot](#) and [received his promotion from Queen Anne in 1710](#). Brigadier-General William Watkins is mentioned in [Army debenture documents](#) from [1710-1718](#).

### **2.30. Item 30: Signature from the First Prime Minister of Great Britain, [Robert Walpole](#), 1736**

Type of Material: Signature

Title: N/A

Description: The following item is part of an official document containing the signature of [Robert Walpole](#), the [first Prime Minister of Great Britain](#), signed in the [Palace of Whitehall](#) in 1736. This document was countersigned by [George Oxenden](#) and [George Dodington](#), both of whom served in the [House of Commons](#) during Walpole's office. Walpole is best known for serving as the [First Lord of the Treasury](#) from 1721-1742 during which he effectively led the [Cabinet](#) for which he is currently recognized as being the first [Prime Minister](#). He is well known for his financial prowess and peaceful foreign policy, but he is most famous for his efforts to shift Britain to a more constitutional monarchy and solidifying the [Whig party](#). [Dodington](#) is best known for possibly serving in a spy-ring to infiltrate and report upon the supporters of [Jacobitism](#), the belief that the [Stuart House](#) should reassume the throne. [Dodington](#) was a well-educated politician who eventually earned enough titles and lands to be considered one of the wealthiest British citizens of his time. He was affluent enough to give loans to [Prince Frederick of Wales](#) and when [George II](#) was dismissed from the [royal palace](#) by his father, [Dodington](#) provided him with temporary lodging. [Oxenden](#) was a member of the [Oxenden Baronetcy of Dene](#) and served as a Lord of [Admiralty](#), a [Lord of Treasury](#), and the [Member of Parliament](#) of [Sandwich](#) in his lifetime. He was involved in several scandals and had a quite negative reputation, according to [John Perceval, First Lord of Egmont](#). According to the [British History of Parliament](#), [Oxenden](#) was well-favored in the court until he had an affair with [Perceval](#)'s sister-in-law. Two years later, [Oxenden](#) had an affair and two children

with his wife's sister and according to [Perceval](#), the only thing keeping him out of jail was his position in Parliament. After being dismissed from duties, he spent the rest of his life in debauchery and debt, according to [Perceval](#). [Another document from 1732](#) contains the signatures of Robert Walpole and George Oxenden. [Another 18th century document](#) contains the signature of Goerge Dodington.

## **2.31. Item 31: Royal Warrants from [King George III](#), 1783 August 22-1784 June 10 (removed to Oversized Print Box #3)**

Type of Material: Royal Warrants

Description:

The following item is two royal warrants written by [King George III](#) to [Richard Rigby](#) on August 22, 1783, and June 10, 1784. The first page is a warrant directed to [Richard Rigby, 1722-1788](#), the [Paymaster of the Forces](#), who was in charge of the military's finances. The King commands that when Rigby is giving out the [debentures](#) for the soldiers' pay, he should deduct not only a small amount from each (as a form of tax), but also to deduct from each Captain the subsistences, or living costs, of two men. The funds generated should be used only if the troops are kept complete, possibly to be given to newly recruited soldiers to hold them off until the next payday. This may also be a form of punishment of the captains, where their pay is deducted if they do not keep their troops complete. This document was written directly after the [American Revolutionary War](#) and one month before the signing of the [Peace of Paris \(1783\)](#), which was a group of peace treaties among Spain, France, Great Britain, the United States, and the Dutch. This suggests that the pay reduction may also be a form of cutting down on spending after the costly wars. The signatures at the bottom of the document of J Buller, Graham, and John Aubrey likely belong to [John Buller, 1721-1786](#), [James, Graham 1755-1836](#), and [Sir John Aubrey 1739-1826](#). Buller, Graham, and

Aubrey all served as [Lords of the Treasury](#) at the time of the document's writing. The second page is a warrant also directed to [Richard, Rigby](#). The King recognizes that false names were often allowed to be put on the Muster Rolls of the Horse Guards and Horse Grenadier Guards in order to increase the pay of their officers. This increase was to be used for maintaining their ranks, in other purposes outlined in [George II](#)'s warrants dated April 15, 1728, and February 10, 1746/7. It was also to give certain war invalids an extra recompense for their service, according to various warrants from [George I](#) and two warrants from [George II](#), dated May 1, 1735, and December 5, 1746. As of the issuing of the warrant, the King would no longer allow this, and instead orders Rigby to add the full pay of one man for each company on each company's payday to be used for the previously mentioned applications. Therefore, the captains' pays would not be affected, and the judgment for the money's use belongs to Rigby instead of the various captains. This would save money by preventing the captains from using it for their own means or whenever they deemed it necessary. At the bottom of the document lie the same signatures from [John Buller, 1721-1786](#), [James Graham, 1755-1836](#), and [Sir Aubrey John, 1739-1826](#).

### **2.33. Item 33: Military Order from Prince Regent George Augustus Frederick [Future King George IV] on Behalf of His Majesty [King George III], 1817 June 25. (removed to Black Box #1)**

Description: The following item is a royal decree written by the Prince Regent, George Augustus Frederick, later [King George IV](#) of Great Britain, to an English officer in Jamaica on June 25, 1817. The decree gives an officer of the forces in Jamaica permission and instructions how to perform [Courts Martial](#), as established in Parliament's "[Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters](#)." This item contains [King George IV](#)'s signature with an "R," denoting "Rex" or "King" and a "PR" denoting "Prince Regent." The Prince Regent and Lord Sidmouth [signed a similar order in July, 1819](#). The officer in charge of the British forces in Jamaica may have been part of the [58th](#), [60th \(6th Bn\)](#), [61st](#), [York Chasseurs arr. Nov. 1816](#), [2nd W. I.](#), [5th W. I.](#), because according to the [Jamaica Defense Force](#), these British regiments were [stationed in Jamaica](#) in 1817. Before the court martial was [established as a permanent standing court](#), it was performed by officers with permission according to the instruction manual referenced earlier [using swords](#). Description: This item, along with Item 24b, are a letter sent from an unknown third party to someone living at No. 1 Flowers’ Building, in Holloway, London regarding [Duckett, Thaddeus William, 1776-1851](#), a newspaper editor and writer, and the Duke of Wellington [Wellesley, Arthur, 1769-1852](#) possibly on July 24, 1847. The letter contains a brief note, a translation in pencil from a previous archivist, and a description of the note in pencil, also written by a previous archivist. The note is a brief comment about how Mr Duckett had been asking for something repeatedly, and that the “D. of W.”, possibly the Duke of Wellington, has not and will not oblige Duckett. The previous archivist wrote a date on the bottom of the right side, which is likely the date it was created. This date may have come from a stamp or a seal that has been removed. This date fits the timeframe constrained by when Wellington and Duckett were alive in London and before the Holloway address was renumbered. The archivist also identified the “D. of W.” as “The Duke of Wellington”, specifically one that fought and won at the [Battle of Waterloo](#), which resulted in the end of the [Napoleonic Wars](#). The only Duke of Wellington fitting this requirement is [Wellesley, Arthur, 1769-1852](#). The archivist’s brief description of the note suggests that an autograph was kept with the note and Item 24b, the envelope containing the letter. During the suggested time period, Wellington had just stepped down from leading the [Conservative Party \(Tories\)](#) in the [House of Lords](#) when it dissolved and he retired from politics but still held the title of [Commander-in-Chief](#) until 1848. [Letters in the University of Southampton’s archives](#) show a relationship between the two, where [Duckett, Thaddeus William, 1776-1851](#) frequently asks Wellington for financial assistance regarding some political pamphlets he was writing. The address on Item 24b suggests that this letter was intended for someone living at No. 1 Flower’s Building, Holloway, London, which may have been relabeled to [134-138 Holloway Rd](#) in 1866, according to the [Islington Heritage Service](#). The building is currently a retail/housing property. This note was written in the third person, and contains no autograph from Wellington, however when the note was in possession of [Bangs and Brothers](#)’ and was identified as having an autograph. Duckett’s plea for financial assistance was presumably not granted and in [August of 1848](#), he writes again to Wellington for financial assistance, having failed to find a job in the press. In [December of 1848](#), he writes once more, asking for monetary aid because his place of employment, Thorp Arch College in Yorkshire, had financially collapsed.

**2.36. Item 36: Letter from Chancellor of the Exchequer and Future Prime Minister of Great Britain, [William Ewart Gladstone](#), to [J\[ohn\]. H\[enry\]. Parker](#), [18]55 Oct[ober] 9**

Description: The following item is a letter from [Gladstone, William Ewart, 1809-1898](#) to [Parker, John Henry, 1806-1884](#) on October 9, 1855. The handwriting is quite difficult to read, but comparing Gladstone's handwriting to other of his written documents shows that in this letter, [Gladstone, William Ewart, 1809-1898](#) was requesting copies of the Iliad and the Odyssey through post rather than through a military or naval delivery. At this time, Gladstone served as the [Chancellor of the Exchequer](#), and was a master orator as well as one of the best financiers of his time. William Ewart Gladstone later became the [Prime Minister of the U.K.](#) and served from 1892-1894. During the [Second Anglo-Burmese War](#) and the [Crimean War](#), he led the initiative to raise taxes instead of borrowing money to pay for the war. He believed that war expenses were God's way to limit nations from conquering one another and that if England were to go to war, then it should be the upper-class who made that decision paying the brunt of the costs via taxes. [Parker, John Henry, 1806-1884](#) was a renowned writer and publisher at the time. It appears that John Henry Parker [may have been William Ewart Gladstone's publisher](#). William Ewart Gladstone [mentions in his personal diary that he wrote to John Henry Parker, and he also had a letter from J. H. Parker about "the book controversy."](#) John Henry Parker of Oxford [was an esquire](#), as written in this letter from Gladstone.

### **2.37. Item 37: Telegraph from [Albert Edward \[Future King Edward VII\]](#) to “[The Queen Osborne](#)” [[Queen Victoria](#)], 1871-1901.**

Description: The following item is a telegraph from Albert Edward, [future [King Edward VII](#)] to “The Queen Osborne” (referring to his mother, [Queen Victoria](#)) regarding a “dim” anniversary and the cooling weather, sent from the [German Reich](#). In September 1861, Edward was sent to Germany to learn military strategies, where he met Princess Alexandra of Denmark ([Alexandra, consort of Edward VII, King of Great Britain, 1844-1925](#)) and plans for marriage began. In October 1861, he was sent to Ireland for a similar purpose, where he had relations with an Irish actress named [Nellie Clifden](#). His father, Prince Albert, ([Albert, Prince Consort, consort of Victoria, Queen of Great Britain, 1819-1861](#)) discovered the infidelity and met with Edward to reprimand him, even though he was sick with typhoid fever. Prince Albert died from typhoid two weeks later and Queen Victoria blamed Edward for her husband’s death, writing that she “never can, or shall, look at [Edward] again without a shudder”. The majority of the Queen’s relatives were German, and all of Princess Alexandra’s relatives were Danish, which led to tension during the [Second Schleswig War](#), where the German Confederation annexed land disputed between Austria/Prussia and Denmark. Edward supported Denmark in the war, and Queen Victoria leaned towards the German Confederation, furthering the divide between Edward and his mother. This telegraph may have been sent any time between 1871, when the [German Reich](#) was established, and 1901, when

Queen Victoria died and the Osborne House was donated to the nation on the day of Edward's coronation. The "dim anniversary" mentioned may have been referring to the death of Edward's father or to one of his siblings that passed, including [Princess Alice, 1843-1878](#); [Alfred, Duke of Saxe-Coburg, 1844-1900](#); and [Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany and Gotha, 1853-1884](#). Albert Edward likely referred to Queen Victoria as "The Queen Osborne" as [Osborne House](#) was the name of the royal residence.

## **2.38. Item 38: Decree by [Queen Victoria](#), 1874 February 16 (removed to Oversized Print Box #3)**

### **Description:**

The following item is a royal decree [signed](#) by [Queen Victoria](#) on February 16, 1874, appointing [Watson, Robert Grant, 1834-1892](#) to "Secretary to Our Legation to Our Good Friends The United States". This position involved assisting the Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the US of the time, [Edward Thornton](#), in all matters pertaining to his position. This document was signed at [Osborne Court](#) on the [Isle of Wight](#). It was countersigned by [Granville George Levenson-Gower, 2nd Earl Granville](#), the [Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs](#) from 1871-1874, and a key player in supporting the United States with the aftermath of the [American Civil War](#). This document appears to be a standard promotion and appointment certificate template with blank spaces to allow for specific details to be added. The specifics

appear to be in a different ink than the rest of the certificate. Although signed and authorized by [Queen Victoria](#), this certificate was likely filled out and issued by [Granville](#). Robert Grant Watson appears to have written the book [A History of Persia](#) and stated that he was also “attached to [[Queen Victoria](#)’s] legation at the court of Persia” in 1858, as evidenced by the time the book was written. Queen Victoria signs this document as “Victoria R” with the “R” referring to “Regina.” [Another document](#) contains the signature of Granville George Levenson-Gower, 2nd Earl Granville.
