1. Pewter plate found in the castle of Gavere, Flanders. The heraldry and the shape of the arms engraved on the reverse prove that this plate can not be later than the 14. century. Shields with pointed bottom do not occur after this date. Note that the shape of this plate excludes the use of knife and fork. The latter was unknown to the middle-ages.
2. Bronze plaquette, Italian renaissance, Vulcanus Venus and Amor.
3. Embroidery in Gold and silk representing Saint Sebastian, from a church vestment (casula). Spanish work, early 16-th century.
4. Sculpture in box-wood representing the pietà, Southern-German, late 16-th century.
5. Bronze head of a Roman emperor, probably Julius Caesar. Italian work of the early part of the 17. century. Comes from the collections of the elector-princes of Hessen-Cassel.
6. Alabaster figure of St. James the Greater. Probably English work. Early 16. century.
7. Fayence wine jug of pear form, dated 1720. Austrian make, very likely Salzburg.
8. Beer jug with pewter cover, dated 1746. Product of the factory of Dorotheenthal, Thuringia.
9. Fayence beer jug with pewter cover dated 1727. The fayence pot has twice the arms of the Rhenish family of the princes of Salm, it is earlier than the pewter enclosure and cover, it dates from the 17. century.

5. Bronze head of a Roman emperor, probably Julius Caesar. Italian work of the early part of the 17th century. Comes from the collection of the elector-prince of Hessen-Cassel.

9. Teyenoe beer tag with pewter cover dated 1727. The Teyenoe pot has twice as the arms of the Rhenish family of the prince of Salm, it is earlier than the pewter enclosure and cover, it dates from the 17th century.
