LATEST LONDON INTELLIGENCE.
LONDON, December 12.

The British ship of war *Soldado*, of 20 guns, Capt. Chapman, was lost off Cork the 2d of Dec. and all on board perished. The *Talbot* ship was not at the same time.

We have intelligence from Copenhagen, that Mr. Erving, special minister from the U. States at that court, has, at length, received an answer to his remonstrance against the condemnation before the tribunal of Paris of American vessels brought into Danish ports. He is informed, that the Danish admiralty counts have no jurisdiction over the vessels in question, as they were captured beyond the limits of the Danish waters, or at the distance of more than four miles from the coast.

We learn from Peterburgh, that Bonaparte has demanded peremptorily of the emperor Alexander the immediate payment of the Dutch loan. The demand has had a very sensible effect on the Russian exchange.

December 17.

A letter from general Anshutz, dated Batavia, Aug. 21, says:—We landed on the 4th inst. within 12 miles of Batavia, which was taken possession of on the 8th, without opposition. On the 10th the troops had a sharp affair at Walivode with the chief of general Javan's army, which terminated in driving them from their position at Cornells. On the 20th we assaulted the works at Cornells, which were carried, and the whole army upwards of 10,000 disciplined men, were either killed, taken or dispersed, with the exception of a small party of horse that escaped with general Javan. We killed 2,000, took three generals, and 5,000 prisoners, and are now in possession of the whole country, west of the Gheribon.

We mentioned yesterday the dreadful scene which had occurred in the Belt. The homeward bound convoy which sailed from Hovon Bay on the 20th ult. consisted of more than 200 sail; out of this number it is stated that 17 foundered at sea, the crews of which were unfortunately lost; 12 (and it is feared more) were taken by Danish privateers, 71 had reached Matwich, a port near Carlsburg, most of them in a disabled state, and where it was feared they would be obliged to winter; and several others sought shelter in the ports of Zealand. PARIS, December 12.

Gen. Compere has arrived at Pau with 40,000 or more, 300 officers, and 700 Spanish prisoners, the fruits of the battle of St. Quentin, and the capture of that fort. This capture of prisoners was conducted with much order, that only 10,000 have been left behind in the hospitals or escaped.

The city of London presented their address on the 18th of Dec. praying for a suspension of the use of grain in the distilleries, and the repeal of the Orders in Council. See the article.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Tuesday, Feb. 4.

Mr. Gibson presented the petition of Gen. St. Clair. He had a claim against the government for money expended by him in 1777, in the recruiting service.

The House, on motion of Mr. Dawson, considered the bill for the relief of the infirm, disabled and superannuated officers and soldiers of the late revolutionary and present army of the United States, the bill was agreed to, 54 to 38, and ordered to a third reading.

Friday, Feb. 7.

The Committee of the Whole, Mr. Nelson in the chair, agreed to the bill authorizing a detachment of 100,000 Militia. The House concurred, and ordered its engrossment for a third reading.

FOR THE GLEANER.

To the People of Sullivan County District.

FELLOW CITIZENS,

I observed in the public papers of last week, a recommendation for our fellow citizens to assemble on the 25th inst. for the purpose of selecting and recommending to the Governor, proper persons for our County Officers—this appears to me a measure of the greatest importance to all the inhabitants of this county, especially to those who are best recommended by their fellow citizens—I consider a recommendation such as may be obtained by the general voice of the citizens of the county, sufficient to render the appointment of the candidates almost as certain as if they had become elective by the people under the Constitution.

Nothing can be so important to the inhabitants of a county, as the just and proper administration of the laws. This never can be expected without good officers; and situated, as the Governor is to large estate as Pennsylvania necessarily must be, at a distance from most of its inhabitants—it cannot be expected that it would be in his power, in all cases, to select the best citizens to administer the laws. He must therefore depend upon the recommendation of others, and the best recommendation he can possibly have, is the great voice of the people. Next to the office of presiding Judge, there is none of such importance to a county, as his Associates—for before them must be tried all those questions which concern the most important rights of the People. They are not to be removed as many other officers are, when their conduct becomes displeasing to the people, but to tedious a course of proceeding is necessary, that the evil is generally borne until it becomes excessively galling. In the selection of officers whose places are permanent, all party considerations should be waived, and it is with pleasure I see that citizens of all parties are invited to attend—the interest and happiness of all are concerned, & those should be preferred whose qualifications best enable them to discharge the necessary duties.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at St. Louis, dated "January 4, 1812."

"We have lately been alarmed about the Indians. Several persons have been killed in the neighborhood of St. Genevieve, it is said by the Osages and Creeks. They have retreated, I understand, to the river St. Francis, and have there 300 men embarked (about 70 miles from this place). An express arrived here some days since from St. Genevieve, demanding all the troops we could raise, that is of the militia.
