Manchester 22 May 1841.

I have received yours of the 19th Instant
& it will always afford me pleasure to comply with any of
your requests.

I must confess that I was both astonished & disappointed
at your vote in favor of the Relief Bill. I most sincerely regretted
that you should have taken a course which appeared to me to be so
hostile to the principles of Democracy & the best interests of the party;
because I entertain towards you a warm personal regard. I never doubted
the purity of your motives; but yet, I think you have committed a
great mistake. But it is now over & cannot be recalled; and I
hope it may not prejudice you hereafter. I have no doubt I shall
be ^{by} ~~launched~~ with this Bill ~~but~~ on the floor of the Senate; and I may
then be compelled publicly to express my opinion of it.

You say that I am undoubtedly well aware of the reasons
why the course became imperative on the part of the Democrats who
were forced to vote against the bill. — I am not aware of any reasons
for this course except what have been publicly assigned; and I must
