

Dear Sir Newtown Point Oct. 8th 1800

I have not had the pleasure of seeing
or hearing from you this some time - to
know any thing about the notes you held
of mine to collect at Niagara as your place
is entirely out of my way of passing. I
would thank you to write to me at week
if you have Rec^d the money or not, if so
you had I could send your Receipt by this
Post as he will make his stand at our
place if I can send it any time -

I wish you to do me a favor to inquire
for a Mr. Tubbs I think his Christian name
was (Moses). a son in law to a Mr. Eble
that lives in that country some where
about the Lakes. I was told this Tubbs
lived in Sheeps Township. Since
that I am told he lives out on the
Yamigo Road from Canandaigua -

HOLLENBACK, Matthias, judge, a patriot of the revolution, was born in 1753 and was an early settler in the valley of Wyoming. When the valley was desolated by the Indians under Butler, he was one of the few who escaped, while his corps was mostly destroyed. In the revolutionary army he was a lieutenant, and afterwards engaged in the profession of the law. He died at Wilkesbarre Feb. 19, 1829, aged 76. He had a sound judgment and much decision of character.
