Chapter 9, pp. 40-47

Jesus hears of John the Baptist; John's conception and birth; Mary's visit to Elizabeth; Mary's opinions and character; John's ministry and dialogue with the Pharisees, foretells the coming of Christ; Jesus determines to visit John.

Chapter 10 pp. 48-53

Jesus visits John; is baptized, a vision appears.

Chapter 11 -54-60

Jesus has a vision o the way home, is told to go up to the mountain and fast; does so; recalls his final conversation with John.

Chapter 12 pp. 61-71

Fasts on the mountain, recalls Solomon; God explains Solomon's downfall was riches and women and Jesus must have neither; Elijah and the prophets of Baal; recalls Isaiah and practices his future sermons to sinners. God announces the end of his fast after one more night and a visitor.

Chapter 13 pp. 72-78

The Devil arrives and converses with Jesus about the possible shortcomings of God.

Satan continues on God's view of women; tempts Jesus with the world and reincarnation; Jesus rejects him; comes down from the mountain, deciding to serve God.

Chapter 16, pp. 94-100

Jesus speaks in Nazareth, does poorly; sets off for Capernaum; on the road is thrown down, then uplifted by God who assures him he will, with His help, speak well, and have miracles to command.

Chapter 17, pp. 101-108

Jesus recruits his first four disciples; speaks in the synagogue in Capernaum and casts out his first devil.

Chapter 18 pp. 109-112

Jesus visits Peter's house, cures his mother-in-law, casts out many devils, gets wise advice from Peter re miracles, heals his first leper, and retreats to the desert to avoid crowds.

Chapter 19 pp 113- 118

Jesus returns to Capernaum from the desert, heals the centurion's servant, preaches daily to the sodomites of Capernaum, cures the paralyzed man lowered through the roof; muses on the relation of illness to sin; has his first confrontation with the scribes when he says "Thy sins are forgiven thee." Also realizes why Good needs him as an intermediary between God and man.

Chapter 20 pp. 119-124

Recruits Levi and Judas and the others of the twelve, is confronted by the Pharisees about consorting with sinners; heals the man with the withered hand on the Sabbath; hears the Pharisees are talking to Herod's officers about silencing him; goes to the Sea of Galilee

Chapter 21 pp. 125-128

A crowd follows him into the desert; Jesus retreats to a boat; the two scribes from Jerusalem accuse him of casting out devils by Beelzebub, his conversation with them; denies his mother and brothers.

Chapter 22 pp. 129-135

Jesus is depressed; ponders the nature of healing; calms the storm at sea; exorcises the devils of Legion; returns to the shore of Capernaum.

Chapter 23 pp. 136-40

Heals the woman of an issue of blood; raises the daughter of Jairus from the dead; becomes depressed and decides to return to Nazareth

Chapter 24 pp. 141-144

Returns to Nazareth, greeted with derision; heals on the Sabbath; has a confrontation with the priest of the Nazareth synagogue; realizes he must oppose the Pharisees by ending out his disciples

Chapter 25, pp. 145-149

Gives his apostles advice before sending them out; realizes self-pity is lethal; hints to them of his power with the Father and hints of battles to come and troubles to come. He retreats to a hut and prays; is beset by fears.

Chapter 26 pp. 150-153

learns of the death of John the Baptist, and that people are saying is John risen from the dead; J. fears Herod; John's death, Jesus' sorrow and fear of the Romans.

Chapter 27 pp. 154-160

First loaves and fishes; walks on water and rescues Peter; sees disciples are believing more in him; first thoughts on Peter's possible disloyalty.

Chapter 28, pp. 161--174

Confrontation with the Pharisees about uncleanness;
heals the deaf and dumb man; second loaves and fishes, cures
the blind man at Bethsaida; tells his apostles of his dream;
leads Peter James and John to the mountain; the tabernacle
incident; the sermon on the mount

Chapter 29 pp. 175--180

The disciples contend over who shall be first; Jesus teaches harshly, wonders if his mission is doomed to failure, dreams of his death and knows he must go to Jerusalem

Chapter 30 pp. 181-191

Matthew disappears; parable of the lost sheep; of the sower; of the wheat and the tares; is depressed by human frailty; Peter asks what he'll get for his trouble; parable of the master and the laborers; teaching against riches; they leave for Jerusalem and Judas incites murmuring.

Chapter 31, pp. 192-199

Jesus comes down with fever, stays with Zacchaeus; raises Lazarus from the dead.

Chapter 32 pp. 200-207

The entry into Jerusalem; the cursing of the fig tree;
first sight of the Temple and Jesus' musings thereon.

Chapter 33 pp. 208-213

Jesus enters the courtyard; parable of the widow's mite; muses on riches; the Devil adds his thoughts on riches; Jesus overturns the tables of the moneylenders.

Chapter 34 pp. 214-218

Calms down his followers who might destroy the Temple;
begins his long confrontation with the scribe; "Render unto
Caesar that which is Caesar's. . ."

Chapter 35,, pp. 219-228

Continues the confrontation with the scribe; the parable of the Pharisee and the publican; Sabbath-breaking; Jesus attacks the Pharisees vehemently; declares his mission is to the gentiles as well; is accused of blasphemy.

Chapter 36, pp. 229-233

Jesus continues to speak alone; the attack against the blind Pharisees; the lament for Jerusalem, the Pharisees are angered and would stone him but dare not; Jesus leaves without incident.

Chapter 37--pp. 234-238

Evening of the first day, outside the Temple: Jesus warns his followers of the last days and the final judgment.

Chapter 38 pp. 239-247

Jesus fasts alone the first night; on returning to the city on the second say, is confronted by the scribes with the woman taken in adultery.

Chapter 39 pp. 248-255

Jesus heals the man who was born blind; talks with the kind Pharisees who warns him against false miracles and advises on how to protect himself.

Chapter 40, pp. 256--264

Second day of preaching in the temple; attacks the Pharisees; predicts disaster for the Jews; realizes he will never convert the Pharisees; the priests and Pharisees are ready to stone him and he has to leave by stealth.

Chapter 41, pp. 265-268

Second night at the house of Simon the Leper; the woman anoints Jesus' feet with spikenard; Judas protests; he and Jesus have words and Judas leaves angrily; Jesus feels greed and condemns himself; learns Judas is speaking ill of him to outsiders.

Chapter 42 pp. 269-277

Jesus stays home the third day, enters the city for the Passover feast: the Last Supper--bread and wine; washing the feet of the disciples; foretelling Judas' treachery and sending him off; foretelling Peter's denial.

Chapter 43 p. 278-284

End of the supper--final advice and warnings to his disciples; his concern and love for them; repudiates Satan definitively; questions his success and worth.

Chapter 44--pp. 285-288

The agony in the Garden; Judas arrives with the Temple Guard; the betrayal; the incident with Malchus; Jesus is led away.

Chapter 45 pp. 289-294

The trial before Caiphas; Peter denies Jesus thrice and Jesus feels anguish for Peter; spends the night in prison and fears Pilate.

Jesus learns of Judas' suicide; Jesus before Pilate; Pilate sends him briefly to Herod; second appearance before Pilate who offers to release Barrabas; the Jews insist on death and Pilate eventually concedes; Jesus is stripped, scourged and crowned with thorns

The trip to Golgotha; reassesses his views of women; speaks to the daughters of Jerusalem, Mary Magdalen, charges Timothy with his mother's care; the priests dispute with Pilate over the wording of the sign for the cross.
