Mailer himself will arrive on campus November 19th. That evening, he will present a lecture in the Dorothy Dixon Dart Center and will be available afterward for autographs. Copies of Mailer's works can be purchased in the University Bookstore. The event will be free of charge, however, anyone attending must reserve a ticket ahead of time. 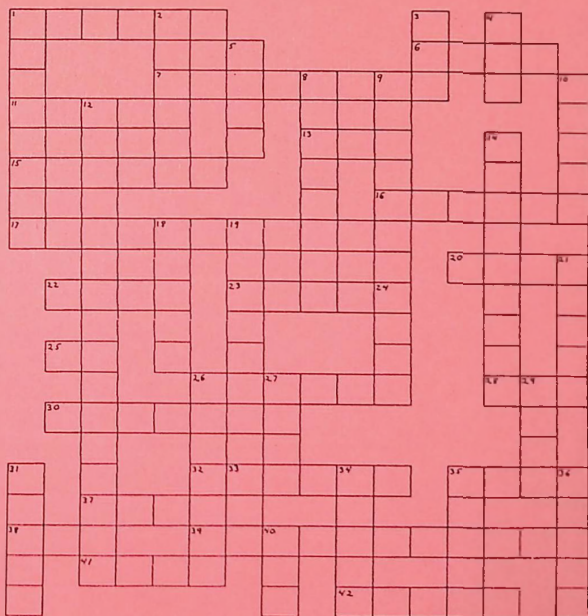

CULTURAL EVENTS

•The Sordoni Art Gallery will feature VIRGIN LANDSCAPES, NATIVE CULTURES: THE ARTIST DISCOVERS AMERICA, through November 29, 1992. Organized in conjunction with the Quincentenary of Columbus's arrival in America, this exhibition presents the work of artists who discovered, for themselves, the un-Europeanized New World, sometimes braving difficult and primitive conditions. Paintings, watercolors, and prints from the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries by artists such as Albert Bierstadt, Frederic Edwin Church, George Catlin, Titian Peale, John James Audubon will be included. Other themes in the exhibition will be "Primeval America" and "Life of the Native Americans." An illustrated catalog will be published with an essay by guest curator, Dr. William H. Sterling. This exhibition is supported in part by a grant from the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts and Northeastern Bank. The Gallery is open daily from 12 noon until 5 p.m. and Thursday until 9 p.m.

•Catalogs for the exhibition, VIRGIN LANDSCAPES, NATIVE CULTURES: THE ARTIST DISCOVERS AMERICA, are available on a complimentary basis to faculty using the exhibition in their course work. Please contact the Sordoni Art Gallery at extension 4325 for details.

•The Sordoni Art Gallery will feature ECHOES OF AFRICA, from December 6, 1992 through January 10, 1993. African textiles, sculpture, and decorative objects both historical and contemporary will be included in this exhibition along with jewelry made from excavated beads and metals by Inge Markarian.

•The Department of Music, Theatre, and Dance will present a Mixed Repertoire Dance Performance on Saturday, November 7, at 8 p.m. The performance will be held in the Dorothy Dickson Darte Center for the Performing Arts and is free and open to the public. Guest performers include members of Ballet Northeast, Wilkes-Barre, the Lehigh Valley Ballet Guild of Bethlehem, and Point Park College Conservatory of Pittsburgh.

•The Wilkes University Percussion Ensemble, directed by Robert A. Nowak, will present their first concert of the season on Friday, November 6, at 8 p.m. in the Dorothy Dickson Darte Center for the Performing Arts. Before the advent of photography, artists were employed to accompany expeditions to the American West in order to sketch and paint the flora and fauna, the native cultures, and the expansive landscape. This slide lecture will reveal some of these works followed by an opportunity to visit the Sordoni Art Gallery.

Through the Office of Continuing Education we will offer a LSAT/Law School Preparation Course during Intersession on January 22, 23, and 24.

The LSAT Preparation will provide a thorough orientation to the test format, procedures and appropriate test taking techniques. Students will learn to view the LSAT as a series of intellectual games with rules and tactics that will be practiced at the workshop. Time control, intelligent guesswork, answer sheet management, and anxiety reduction will be taught at the University of California at Berkeley, Colby College in Maine, and at Franklin and Marshall College. Zullo Carries Wilkes to Win-Colonels Take on Pioneers in Last Road Game

On the turf of Lackawanna Stadium, the Wilkes Colonels beat the Vikings of Upsala College, 31-20, on Saturday. With the win the Colonels improve to 4-3 on the year.

The running star of the day was third string tailback **Carmen Zullo** (So., Tewksbury, Ma.) who gained 111 yards and scored two touchdowns after stepping in for **Jason Smith** (Jr., Pine Grove, Pa.) in the second period. Smith dislocated his thumb with the extent of the injury still to be determined. Prior to being injured Smith had rushed for 91 yards and one score.

Zullo, who had gained only seven yards in five games coming in, scored on runs of eight and nine yards in leading the Colonels to the win.

Wilkes led 10-0 at the end of the first period when Smith scored from seven yards out and **Joel O'Donnel** (Fr., Plymouth Meeting, Pa.) hit a 25 yards field goal. The Colonels extended the lead to 24-14 at the half on Zullo's eight yard run and **Boo Perry's** (Fr., Canton, Pa.) 37 yard scoring pass to **Steve Endres** (Jr., Palmerton, Pa.).

The Colonels got the game clinching score on a 14 play, 80 yard drive, which ate up eight minutes of clock, capped by Zullo's nine yard run.

The Colonels defense intercepted three passes on the day, one each by **Ben McKeown** (Jr., Wilkes-Barre, Pa.), **Gene Silvers** (Sr., Berwick, Pa.), and **Aaron Wilk** (Fr., Shamokin, Pa.).

This was a good win for the team," said coach **Joe DeMelfi**. "Our offensive line did a great job opening holes which was the key to the win."

Wilkes will now face Widener University in the final road game of the 1992 season this Saturday. The Pioneers are coming off a 35-21 loss to Susquehanna this past week which drops their record to 2-5.

"Widener is young and improving," said DeMelfi.

Field Hockey Ends with Loss

The Wilkes field hockey team ended its 1992 regular season with a 5-0 loss to Elizabethtown College this past Saturday. With the loss Wilkes falls to 10-8 and will now await word on a possible ECAC playoff bid.

For the year **Toni Farinella** (Jr., Middletown, NJ) finished as the Lady Colonels leading scorer with 11 goals and three assists. **Kim Kaskel** (Fr., Mt. Top, Pa.) was second with seven goals and four assists with **Justine Nemshick** (Jr., Mt. Top, Pa.) third with four goals and three assists and **Theresa Havel** (Fr., Brodheadsville, Pa.) fourth with four goals and two assists.

In goal **Julie Crawford** (So., Owego, NY) led Wilkes with a 1.40 goals against average and three shutouts.



Booters MAC Northeast Champs

With a 2-0 win over Drew last week the Wilkes men's soccer team captured the MAC Northeast league title for the first time in school history. The Colonels will now play either Messiah or Elizabethtown for the MAC Northern Division championship. The game will be held at Wilkes at a time and date to be determined.

In the win over Drew, **Mike Herb** (So., Bethel, Pa.) and **Mike Selzer** (So., Newtown, Pa.) each netted goals with **Dean Kontometros** (Jr., Hopatcong, NJ), **Paul Jellen** (Sr., Quakertown, Pa.) and **Chris Erb** (So., Telford, Pa.) recording assists. **Matt Haney** (So., Benton, Pa.) picked up his fifth shutout of the year to give Wilkes the win.

In other action last week Wilkes beat Albright 3-1 with Paul Jellen netting two goals and Mike Herb one.

With the two wins the Colonels go to 9-4-3 on the year.

This is the first time that the school has reached the MAC playoffs," said coach **Phil Wingert**. "We're going to try and make the most of the opportunity."

Netters Split Two Matches

The Wilkes University volleyball team split its two matches last week, losing to Allentown, 3-0, while coming back to beat Lycoming, 3-0. Wilkes improves to 9-13 for the year, the best mark at Wilkes since 1983.

In a total team effort over Lycoming, **Jodi DePue** (Fr., Great Bend, Pa.), **Sue Ketner** (Sr., Pottsville, Pa.), **Kristen Lord** (So., Pottsville, Pa.) and **Wendy O'Connor** (Fr., Towanda, Pa.) all had good games.

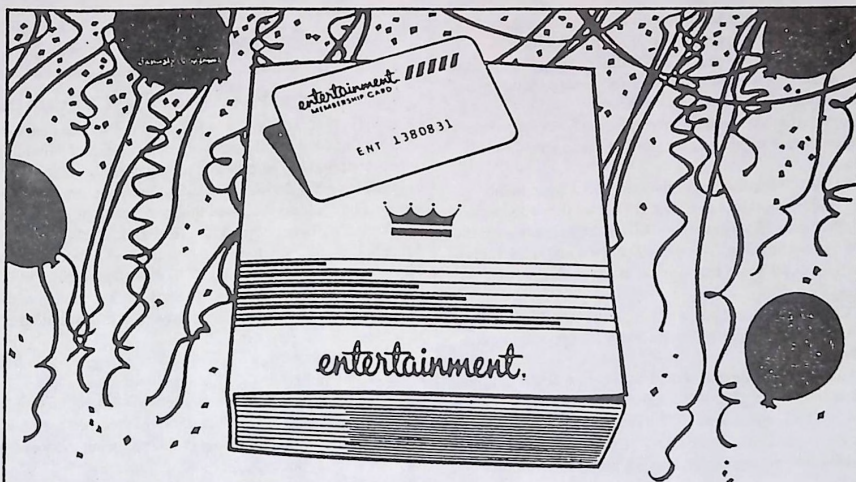
Harriers Idle-Dickinson Next

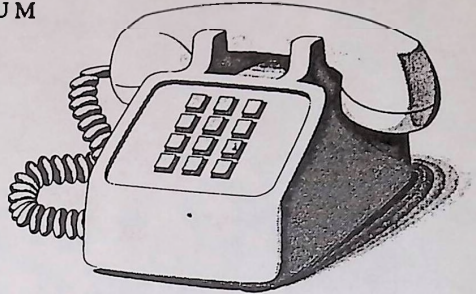

Defense Carries Colonels to Winning Mark

In a win which could best be described as "ugly", the Wilkes Colonels took another step toward the upper half of the MAC with a 13-6 win over Juniata.

The win pushes the season mark of the Colonels to 5-3-1 and guarantees the first winning season since 1987.

The star of the game was the defense in general and Aaron Wilk (Fr., Shamokin, Pa.) and Mike Modla (Jr., Nanticoke, Pa.) in particular. Wilk had six tackles, two pass breakups and two interceptions, the first of which he returned 48 yards for the game winning score with 6:31 left in the game. For his efforts Wilk was named the ECAC Division III South Player of the Week.

Modla had eight tackles on the day and three pass breakups and had a devastating hit on Juniata's top receiver which stopped a potential game winning drive.

On offense Wilkes was without the services of QB Boo Perry (Fr., Canton, Pa.) who was out with a concussion. Perry's absence allowed the defense to anticipate the running of Jason Smith (Jr., Pine Grove, Pa.) and hold the star tailback to his lowest total of the year, 29 yards. Smith still managed, though, to establish season marks at Wilkes for yards gained in a seasons with 972 and most attempts with 225.

In place of Perry the Colonels turned to Dan McClave (Sr., Neshaminy, Pa.), a former quarterback, who hit 3-8 passes for 52 yards and one TD. McClave also led the team in rushing with 32 yards.

Catching the TD pass was wide receiver Mike Hawkins (So., Mt. Carmel, Pa.) who out jumped his defender in the endzone to make the reception.

"It was a great effort by the defense," said DeMelfi. "That is the type of game a good team will be able to win. Our offense was struggling and our defense stepped up and got a score when we really needed one."

Booters End with Loss

The Wilkes men's soccer team ended its season by dropping consecutive games, the first in the MAC North championship, the second in the first round of the ECAC championship.

With the two season ending losses, the Colonels fell to 11-6-3 for the year.

Paul Jellen (Sr., Quakertown, Pa.) ended his career as the all-time leader in goals for a career with 58, points in a career with 137, goals in a season, 20, and tied for most points in a season with 46.

Mike Herb (So., Bethel, Pa.) finished in second in scoring with 24 points, while Chris Erb (So., Telford, Pa.) and Russ Hiser (Fr., Lonsdale, Pa.) tied for fourth with 15 each.

In goal Matt Huney (So., Benton, Pa.) had a goals against average of 1.33 and five shutouts.

Inheriting a team with only eight players can cause many problems, but after a strong recruiting year, things are looking up for the Lady Colonels.

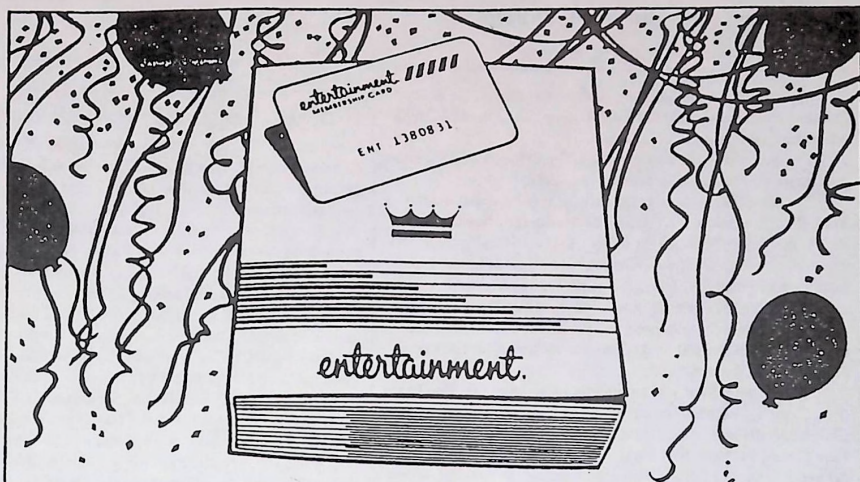

A library exhibit and panel discussion are also scheduled to introduce the community to the work and life of Norman Mailer. On display at the E.S. Farley Library on the Wilkes campus, now through November 18th, the exhibit includes a variety of articles and reviews, gallery posters, handwritten manuscripts, first editions, photographs, journalistic articles and film scripts. The panel discussion, set for Wednesday, November 11th at 7 p.m., also in the E.S. Farley Library, will be an open discussion of Mailer conducted by Wilkes University faculty and Dr. J. Michael Lennon, Mailer scholar and Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Mailer's first novel, The Naked and The Dead, established his reputation as a major American writer when it topped the best-seller list for 11 weeks after
