Pair charged with robbery, assault of Kingston woman

Quick action by Kingston police Officer Donald Stevens of notifying Pennsylvania Turnpike officials about a stolen vehicle assisted in the arrests of two suspects accused of assaulting and tying up a 64-year-old woman inside a Rutter Avenue, Kingston, apartment last week.

Sakana E. Walls, 30, of 314 Rutter Ave., and Jesse Geasey, 20, of 169 Brodhead St., Sugar Notch, were arrested as they exited the Lehigh Valley Mall, Whitehall Township, Lehigh County, nearly two hours after allegedly committing the criminal acts on Dec. 8.

Kingston Assistant Police Chief Daniel J. Beky said turnpike toll booth attendants at the Wyoming Valley Interchange observed the stolen vehicle, a 1999 Audi owned by the victim, pass through. A short time later, Kingston police were notified by Whitehall Township police that they had found the victim's vehicle in the parking lot of the Lehigh Valley Mall.

"It was the quick action and cooperative effort by the Kingston Police Department and the Whitehall Township Police Department that led to their arrests," said Luzerne County District Attorney David W. Lupas. "All the elements fell into place, it was text-book police work."

According to the affidavit of probable cause, the victim who owns the apartment building, had made arrangements to meet with Walls and Geasey, who are listed in arrest papers as first-floor tenants, to pick up rent and about a remodeling project the suspects did to a vacant second-floor apartment.

Walls and Geasey were behind the victim as they walked up the stairs, and as the victim opened the door to the second-floor apartment, Walls allegedly struck the victim in the head. As the victim fell to the floor, Walls and Geasey went through her pockets removing keys to her 1999 Audi. They also took the victim's purse containing approximately \$300 in cash, several credit cards, and jewelry.

Victim was treated and released from Nesbitt Memorial Hospital.

Walls was unable to open the vehicle, and went back inside where he had the victim show him which key opened the vehicle.

As Walls went to place their duffel bags inside the victim's vehicle, Geasey was left alone with the victim, where it is alleged, he tied and gagged the victim with tape.

While Walls and Geasey traveled north on Rutter Avenue, they picked up Alicia Morio who was walking near Bennett Street.

Morio was not charged in the incident, police said.

The victim was able to break free a short time later and summoned help.

Officer Stevens was the first on scene, where he immediately put out an informational broadcast about the incident and a description of the victim's vehicle.

As the two suspects, including Morio, traveled south on the turnpike toward Philadelphia, they stopped at Lehigh Valley Mall, where they tried to purchase jewelry using the victim's credit cards.

"The credit cards were immediately reported stolen, so the card came back denied," said Beky.

They were apprehended as they exited the mall, Beky said.

Beky said he believes their destination was Philadelphia, where Walls is originally from.

Walls and Geasey are each charged with robbery, simple assault, recklessly endangering another person, theft by unlawful taking, unlawful restraint, and two counts of criminal conspiracy. They were arraigned before District Justice Paul J. Roberts Jr., in Kingston and remanded to the Luzerne County Correctional Facility in lieu of \$100,000 cash bail each.

Geasey is on probation in Luzerne County after pleading guilty in December 1998 to institutional vandalism, abuse of corpse, and receiving stolen property. He was accused for the May 1998 break-in of a mausoleum at Hollenback Cemetery, Wilkes-Barre, where he removed bones from a corpse.

A hearing for Walls and Geasey is set for Friday, Dec. 22, at 9 a.m. before District Justice Roberts.

2 charged in robbery, assault of woman, 64

KINGSTON — Two men robbed and bound a borough woman on Dec. 8, then forced her to show them which key fit her 1999 Audi after they couldn't unlock the door to steal her car.

Shakana Walls, 30, and Jesse Geasey, 20, were arraigned Friday before District Justice Paul J. Roberts of Kingston and charged with robbery, simple assault, recklessly endangering another person, theft by unlawful taking, unlawful restraint and two counts of criminal conspiracy.

Both were taken to the Luzerne County Correctional Facility for lack of \$100,000 cash bail each.

Walls was living in a Rutter Avenue apartment owned by 64-year-old Wagitha Taylor at the time of the assault, police said.

Walls lured Taylor to a vacant Rutter Avenue apartment on the second floor of the same building, asking her to look at some remodeling work he was doing,

he couldn't unlock the car, and Taylor showed him the right key. Police said Taylor's purse — including credit cards, jewelry and about \$300 — was also stolen.

"This was a traumatic experience for

police said.

Walls and Geasey of Broadhead Street, Sugar Notch, followed Taylor into the apartment, where Walls punched Taylor in the head, knocking her to the ground, police said.

Walls took a set of keys from Taylor's pocket, retrieved his bag from his first-floor apartment and went to Taylor's car, according to arrest papers.

Walls returned to the apartment when

her, as it would be for anyone," District Attorney David Lupas said.

Taylor was gagged with tape and bound around the hands and feet before the suspects fled, police said. She was treated for a minor head injury.

Walls and Geasey picked up a woman on their way to the Pennsylvania Turnpike. Police said the woman has not been charged in the attack.

Whitehall police apprehended Walls and Geasey outside of the Lehigh Valley Mall two hours after the attack.

In 1998, Geasey pled guilty to stealing skeletal bones from a Hollenback Cemetery mausoleum where a local doctor, his infant daughter and four others had been interred. He is currently on probation for the offense.

In June of that year, Geasey claimed the Bible had rehabilitated him and he began writing spiritual poetry for troubled teens.

A preliminary hearing for Walls and Geasey has been scheduled for Dec. 22 at Robert's office.
