ABOUT THE PLAY

"The Winslow Boy" is based on a true story, the celebrated Archer Shee case of 1913, which caused a minor revolution in the annals of English law. The cast of eleven lucky people will be given one of those rare opportunities to work on an almost perfectly written drama. . . The masterful lines, warm blending of humor and pathos, beautifully drawn characters and plot present an actor's most inviting challenge.

The audience will be in for its share of a complete evening of theatre. The story unfolds with the subtle mounting of suspense and tension. Catherine Winslow—

Approaching thirty, has air of masculinity about her which is at odd variance with her Mother's intense femininity.

Dickie Winslow—

Ronnie's brother, an Oxford undergraduate, large, noisy and cheerful.

John Watherstone—

A man of about thirty, Catherine's love interest.

Desmond Curry—

A man about forty-five with the figure of an athlete gone to seed, a mildly furtive manner about him.

Miss Barnes—

A rather untidily-dressed woman of about forty, with a gushing manner.

Fred—

The news photographer, completely equipped with gadgets. . . rather listless.

Sir Robert Morton—

A man in his early forties, tall, thin, cadaverous and immensely elegant.

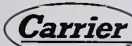

As he runs from the church yard, the men in an exciting chase through the forest succeed in stopping the runaway, but only when he is found dead, seemingly from having struck his head on a rock.

The American in love with the lassie decides to remain until he discovers his friend was the inadvertent killer of the runaway. The shock of his friend's confession and the idea that the place is just a dream make him doubt his love as well as the town; he returns to New York, but when there he finds himself constantly haunted by the Scotch Girl's memory. He returns to find Brigadoon and the lassie.

We agreed that the story plus the music certainly add up to a terrific production. We asked, "What about the chorus? . . . From the story it sounds as though the principals have everything to do."

Carl smiled and said, "You know we always pick our musicals to give our large chorus lots of work. "Brigadoon" is a happy blending of large chorus (75), good principal roles, and, what's more, a dancing chorus."

We said we had read about auditions for singers, but was the chorus complete. "Not yet," was the reply, "and I'd like to have as many men as possible join up. I'm planning rehearsals only once a week for the men and that shouldn't be too hard on anyone's schedule."

We both chirped, "I know a man who sings!!!" Mr. Roth laughed with us and advised our telling any gentlemen interested in joining the chorus to call Ruth Roman at 3-1875 any afternoon for all particulars.

"Why no," said Carl. "Remember this production combines a musical as well as a dramatic director and Bob Nellis is up to his ears with "Happy Birthday". We're holding off try-outs till late in February."

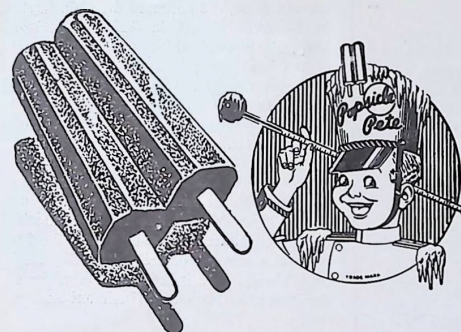

PROGRAM NOTE

"Happy Birthday" was written by Anita Loos as a vehicle for her friend Helen Hayes who, after having played long engagements in "Victoria Regina" and "Harriet," was weary of heavy drama and eager to return to carefree comedy.

Originally titled "Cocktail Bar," and later "The Birth of Addie Bemis," it finally opened as "Happy Birthday" at the Broadhurst Theatre in New York in October 1946, under the auspices of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein 2nd. This team, which has written the books and music for such outstanding musicals as "Oklahoma," and "South Pacific," has also been successful as producers of several hit plays. "Happy Birthday" turned out to be one of their happiest sponsorships. This was the longest run achieved by Miss Hayes in New York, incidentally, even surpassing "Victoria," with 565 performances.

Anita Loos, the play's author, is best known for her phenomenally best-selling novel of the 20s, "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes," and its sequel, "But They Marry Brunettes." Miss Loos, who in recent years has been one of Hollywood's most active screen play writers started selling her writing at the age of 12, when her script for "The New York Hat" was accepted by D. W. Griffith for \$15, and made into a film starring Mary Pickford and Lionel Barrymore.

For many years I have felt that the hope of the American stage lies in good, progressive Community Theatre. For that reason, I have centered my attention and studies along this phase of theatre-work. With the decrease of the road shows, Community Theatre, has creased in importance with each succeeding season.

Consequently the day is gone when fairly good amateur plays, wherein the efforts of the actors and technical crew were accepted in the spirit of an effort adequately done, were good enough to satisfy their audiences. Today the public needs and demands a production of professional calibre.

Therefore we at the Little Theatre have been working hard to give you, our public, an ever-improving professional standard of performance. To do this we must have people who are willing and able to donate the many talents that are required in the realm of theatre. And with these thoughts in mind, we at the Little Theatre are increasing our efforts to bring you the very best in theatre. We feel sure that you will enjoy our coming Children's Theatre production "The Forest Ring" and also our next Arena production.

I should like to say a word in regard to casting. Many people have spoken to me about this most important feature of our

work. Many considerations arise in the selection of a person for a role. First and foremost, of course, is the fact that the person must fit the role. He must be the type for the part. His acting experience and his versatility are all factors which must also be considered.

I have met and auditioned a number of people who have a great deal of talent, but whom we have not used to date. Availability is also a major consideration in this regard, whether the person could give the time and effort to the creation of the character. Then too, perhaps the role might not be the correct one for the person. However as soon as the right part comes along, be assured that these people will be put to good hard work. I know from long experience how frustrating it can be to come to a tryout or reading and not be cast. But please, and this I urge you, do not become discouraged, and keep on coming. In this way we know those who are anxious to work, and, with each succeeding reading, you will learn more and increase your opportunity for further work.

With the addition of the children's shows and the arena plays, more and more opportunity for actors of ability arise and will give many more people a chance to appear in a production.

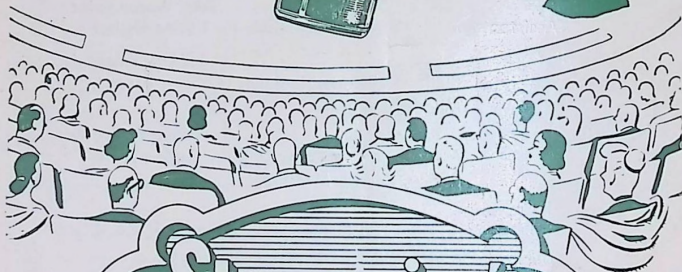

Jean Muir lives in New York at present. She was married in 1940 and is now "America's Most Glamorous Mother", having three youngsters, two boys and a girl. She has maintained her interest in the theatre and is soon returning to motion pictures.

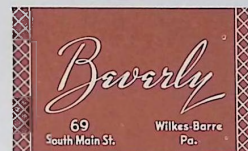

As the Riff chieftain, he woos and wins the girl to the beautiful music of such song favorites as "One Alone", "The Desert Song" and the "Song of the Riffs". Colorful, sweeping, and dynamic scarcely describe this operetta which has been chosen as the dramatic climax of the Little Theatre schedule at Irem Temple on May 4, 5, 6, 1949.

We are pleased again to welcome Leonard Heech of New York as director of The Little Theatre of Wilkes-Barre. Mr. Heech returns to us after a very successful summer with Alexander Kirkland's Summer Theatre in Ridgefield, Connecticut where he managed and produced such outstanding shows as LAURA, starring Edith Atwater, and DESIGN FOR LIVING, starring Ilka Chase.

Last year, Leonard Heech set forth a three-fold objective for Little Theatre. First, that as a civic enterprise it should promote and maintain goodwill in the community which it serves. Next, that it should act as a service organization, stimulating the cultural, recreational and social welfare of Wyoming Valley. Finally, that it should present productions of merit in the most entertaining and most proficient manner possible.

It is no small tribute to Mr. Heech's leadership that last year's season so successfully met the objectives set forth. His varied experience in all phases of the theatre includes work with other community theatres, professional stock companies and radio productions. 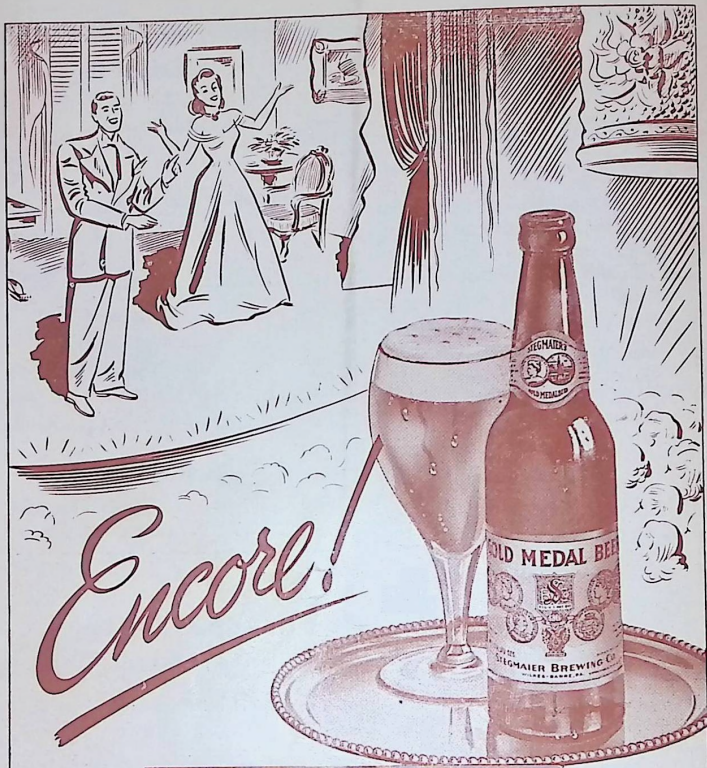

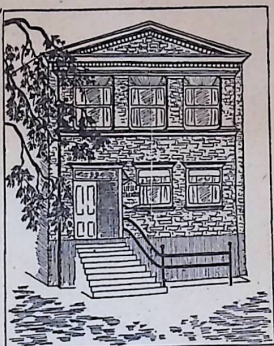
