

MRS. M. DICK PASSES AWAY IN THIS CITY

Deceased was Widow of
One of Founders of Bos-
ton Store—Private Fu-
neral Rites Tomorrow

Mrs. Mignonette Dick, 60, widow of Alexander Dick, one of the founders of the Boston Store and a pioneer merchant of Wilkes-Barre, died yesterday afternoon at 2:30 at her home, Marion Apartments, North Franklin and Jackson streets.

Private funeral services will be held from the home on Friday afternoon at 2, with Rev. Mariyn D. Keeler, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiating. Interment will be in the Forty Fort cemetery.

Mrs. Dick was born in West Pittston, the daughter of the late James and Maria Ann Williams Waddell, on November 23, 1870. A resident of Wilkes-Barre for many years, Mrs. Dick was active in civic, charitable and philanthropic circles, and was known as one of the leading clubwomen in the Wyoming Valley.

In 1928 she was elected president of Ladies' Auxiliary of Irem Temple. Mrs. Dick was singularly honored at a luncheon in October, 1937, when she was feted by members of the board of Nesbitt Memorial Hospital Auxiliary in recognition of her services to the women's board as treasurer for 23 years.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Alexander Dick, who died in 1908. She was a member of First Presbyterian Church, city, and was long active in its affairs.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Helen Dick Newell, Wilkes-Barre; Mrs. Dwight K. Fisher, Kingston; two sons, Alexander W. Dick, Kingston; Gilbert W. Dick, New York; a sister, Mrs. Harry C. Demison, Wilkes-Barre; grandchildren, Mrs. Austin King Howard, Mary Edwards Newell, Alexander Dick, James Gilbert Dick, Robert Hale Dick; great-grandchildren, Ward King Howard and Newell Dick Howard.
